May 10, 2009: Fifth Sunday of Easter, Year B

Readings: Acts 9:26-31; 1 John 3:18-24; John 15:1-18

First Reading: Acts of the Apostles 9:26-31

This passage is about Saul's acceptance by the early Jerusalem community of Christians after his conversion. It also exposes the internal problems that were beginning to beset the infant Church. Fearful protectionism would eventually lead to factions, especially between Jewish and Gentile Christians. These factions would create serious problems for Paul later. However, despite such problems the unity and the growth in faith of the Jerusalem community helped the Church to spread throughout Judea, Galilee and Samaria.

Responsorial Psalm: Psalm 22:26-27, 28, 30, 31-32

Psalm 22 expresses both the humiliation and the vindication of God's righteous servant, a reference to Jesus' death on the cross and his resurrection. One who has experienced God's saving works cannot keep silent, but is impelled to proclaim God's praises to all. Response: "I will praise you, Lord, in the assembly of your people."

Second Reading: 1 John 3:18-24

In this passage, John raises up two key questions. 1) How can we be sure that our faith is true? 2) How can we tell if we are really pleasing God and living in his presence? All the ways of discernment boil down to one criterion: keeping the commandment of loving one another. Conscience is not merely a good feeling or an opinion about what is right. Conscience is the measure of our own attitudes and acts against the criterion of mutual love. Faith in God and love of one another are inseparable.

Gospel: John 15:1-8

The Hebrew Scriptures frequently speak of the people of Israel as a vine or as God's vineyard, often producing sour grapes because of their infidelity (see Ps 80; Is 5; Jer 2:21; 12:10-11; Ez 15: 17; 19). When Jesus applies this image in this passage, he affirms that he is faithful in bearing the fruit of God's work, in contrast to the infidelity of the Israelites. God, at last, finds true fidelity in Jesus, the true vine, a fidelity shown by obedience even up to the cross. True followers of Jesus are attached to him just as branches to the vine. They share his life and they accomplish his work (bearing fruit). Both elements of the Christian life are essential: work depends on life, and life must overflow into action. Inactivity is a sign that there is no life, and that branch is cut away (v 6), a reference to our being purified from the traces of sin and from our deadly egotism, so that we may bear better and more abundant fruit.

Memo: Swine Flu

The Diocese of Honolulu is closely monitoring the developments surrounding the Swine Flu. Our schools have policies in place and personnel have been trained in case further action is required. We urge everyone to keep informed of the situation, remain calm and take precautions as prescribed by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). Our diocesan website (www.catholichawaii.org) will have the latest diocese-specific information. The CDC has a website dedicated to the Swine Flu (www.cdc.gov/swineflu/).

The following norms are strongly encouraged in respect to our Catholic services in schools and parishes. These norms are to be observed only during this time of heightened crisis

1. If an Extraordinary Minister of Holy Communion is feeling ill, they should not serve in that ministry during the time of their illness – neither at Mass nor visiting the homebound or sick.

2. If someone is not feeling well, they should exchange the sign of peace by a bow.

3. People should be discouraged from holding hands during the recitation of the Lord's Prayer.

4. Before and after the distribution of Holy Communion, all ministers, including the clergy, should sanitize their hands.

5. While Communion under both species is still permitted, people who are feeling ill must not partake of the cup. Given the nature of schools, it is strongly suggested that Communion from the cup be suspended. Intinction (dipping of the host into the cup) is not allowed except by a priest who is self-communicating (giving Communion to himself) due to illness.

6. Those in parish and diocesan ministries and those employed by parishes, schools and the diocese are discouraged from traveling to Mexico. If people do travel to Mexico or have recently been to Mexico, please inform your pastor or principal immediately.

From the CDC: What You Can Do to Stay Healthy

There are everyday actions people can take to stay healthy. ► Cover your nose and mouth with a tissue when you cough or sneeze. Throw the tissue in the trash after you use it.

► Wash your hands often with soap and water, especially after you cough or sneeze. Alcohol-based hands cleaners are also effective.

► Avoid touching your eyes, nose or mouth. Germs spread that way.

► Try to avoid close contact with sick people.

► Influenza is thought to spread mainly person-to-person through coughing or sneezing of infected people.

► If you get sick, CDC recommends that you stay home from work or school and limit contact with others to keep from infecting them.

We appreciate your cooperation in this matter. Working together we can help to maintain the health and safety of one another and the people we serve. Let us all join in prayer to the Lord for those who are sick, those who care for them, and that this time of challenge will quickly pass.

My Dearest Friends,

First of all, let me Thank You again for your many prayers. I am touched and deeply grateful. My Ginseng treatment program ended on April 29, 2009. It was with great anticipation and not a little anxiety that I went to my leukemia doctor for the verdict. I was already aware that something good had happened because, during the winter and spring, I was one of the rare ones in New Jersey who never had even a sniffle. That wasn't bad for someone who left Hilo with a compromised immune system! The test results were also very good. The white cell count actually went down and the swollen gland is nowhere to be found! I asked the doctor, "Is this a miracle?" He stated that the leukemia is not gone; science would not verify a miracle but, he added, "It certainly is a good sign and in July we will see if the trend continues."

I have talked with the Bishop and subsequently wrote to the Bishop requesting to return to the Honolulu Diocese on or about September 1. The reason for the extended delay is because my Leukemia Doctor wants to identify an oncologist in Honolulu who will work with him in monitoring my health. He doesn't want to do this until after the July follow-up. In addition, I intend to make a total and lengthy move to Hawaii. This entails closing a lot of doors, taking care of a lot of business, and spending some good quality time with my dear 96 year old mother in Minnesota.

In summary, you can tell that the report was excellent. Prayers are powerful. I deeply appreciate being remembered in your prayers. Please continue. Mother Marianne worked slowly but very effectively in establishing the healthcare system in Hawaii. Why would we expect that she would suddenly start moving swiftly in performing another miracle! May God bless all of you. *Fr. Joseph Hennen*
