

## Pastor's Corner

### BAPTISM OF THE LORD

With the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord, we begin the Sundays of the Ordinary Time. The Christmas season is over and we begin the cycle of ordinary time that refers to all the other Sundays of the year under the all-embracing heading of celebrations of the "Day of the Lord".

"Every time we discover a new aspect in the person we love, we stop in wonderment. "I did not know him/her as such!" And this deeper insight and sharing in a person's self, results in greater appreciation, intimacy and love. Today we celebrate the Lord's baptism by John in the Jordan. Matthew relates Jesus' baptism as another epiphany (manifestation), declaring that the Lord Jesus is the servant (son) of Yahweh. His call in life is that of the servant as depicted in today's reading. This is an aspect of Jesus' personality, which gives us a deeper insight, into who Our Lord is. He is "the man for others." He is there for you and me.

Experiencing this in prayer, we should appreciate and love our Lord more for it. We each have our own calling in life. We must respond to it in the framework of our personal capabilities and the circumstances of time and milieu. Serious and mature people understand that only a life of service is a meaningful life. What do you consider your main calling in life and how do you fulfill it? (From the St. Joseph Sunday Missal.)

## The Baptism of the Lord

Readings: Isaiah 42: 1-4, 6-7; Acts 10:34-38; Matthew 3:13-17

### First Reading: Isaiah 42:1-4, 6-7

This first reading is taken from one of four poetic passages in the Book of Isaiah that is referred to as "The Servant Songs." The first part of this passage (verses 1-4) describes Israel as God's chosen servant people. The second part (verses 6-7) speaks of the mission for which the Lord has called them, namely to bring "light to the nations, to open the eyes of the blind and to bring out prisoners from confinement."

### Responsorial Psalm: Psalm 29:1-2, 3-4, 9-10

Psalm 29 meditates on the power and glory of the Lord reflected by the awesome natural forces of a violent storm. Such a storm became a metaphor for the psalmist to praise the glory of God who will bless his people with peace.

### Second Reading: Acts of the Apostles 10:34-38

The reading focuses on Peter's conversion to the wider interpretation of the new faith in Christ. The gospel is for all people, not just for the Jews. As a result of this experience, Peter preaches to those gathered in the home of Cornelius a Roman military officer. This inclusive approach to proclaiming the faith in Jesus Christ as "Lord of all" is blessed by the Holy Spirit coming upon the assembly while Peter is still speaking.

### Gospel: Matthew 3:13-17

The story of Jesus' baptism by John contrasts the humility of the two. Jesus fully accepted John's ministry and insisted on being baptized by him. In Matthew's version of this event only Jesus saw the Spirit descend as a dove and heard the voice from heaven. God's voice in this text confirms the messianic role of Jesus and may be interpreted best as God commissioning Jesus for his ministry.

## Three Minute Liturgical Catechesis

### Article 16: How Much Does It Cost?

As the ushers came around with the collection basket one Sunday, a small boy leaned over to his father and said, “You don’t have to pay for me, Dad. I’m under five.” Another youngster, listening to her mother complaining about the quality of the music and the preaching as they left Mass, said, “You have to admit, Mom, it wasn’t a bad show for a nickel!”

Both children share the same misconception about the meaning of the collection at Mass. They see it as the price of admission, but admission is not required here. How might we explain to them what the collection really means?

The official books tell us very little. The General Instruction of the Roman Missal, as it describes the procession with the gifts, simply says: “It is well also that money or other gifts for the poor or for the Church, brought by the faithful or collected in the Church, should be received” (#73).

Most pastors and parish finance councils, on the other hand, see the collection as absolutely essential to keeping the parish going. Its practical value is obvious. It takes a lot of money to maintain buildings and programs and to keep the light and heat and air conditioning going.

The role of the collection during Mass, however, goes beyond the practical goal of meeting the annual budget. Remember that the collection takes

place during the Preparation of the Gifts, and the money we give is carried forward as part of the procession with the bread and wine. The point of the collection, then, has something to do with preparing ourselves to enter into the sacrifice of Christ.

In our culture, money is a powerful symbol of ourselves. The process of getting it and spending it tends to dominate our lives. So when we give some of it back to God, we express our willingness to give ourselves to God.

It is not just a matter of giving God one or two percent of our income or even of tithing ten percent to God. In biblical times, the Jews made an offering of the first fruits of the harvest. It was a sign of gratitude for the harvest but also a symbol that the whole harvest really belonged to God. What we give in the collection should be a symbol of all that we have. It is a reminder that everything we own is a gift from God. Our gift in the collection is both a sign of our gratitude and a symbol that we will use all of God’s gifts as God wills.

Notice, too, that the General Instruction speaks of gifts for the poor or for the Church. We need to remember that our gifts must do more than ensure our own comfort and our own programs in the parish. At least part of what we give must go to the poor if we are really to imitate our Lord. In this way, too, what we put in the collection prepares us to share in Christ’s sacrifice, for it expresses our willingness to care for those in need and to give ourselves to others in love as he did.

## `Ahahui Hale O Nā Ali`i O Hawai`i

Each year, on January 1st, the `Ahahui Hale O Nā Ali`i O Hawai`i celebrate the Anniversary of the birth of HRH Princess Abigail Wahiika `ahu`ula Campbell Kawānanakoa on O`ahu, while sister chapters honor her at their respective churches. The Hilo Lodge, Halau O Kalakaua, would like to extend its sincere MAHALO A NUI LOA to St. Joseph Church for allowing us to celebrate her anniversary on this island of Hawai`i at the 5:00 pm Saturday Mass on January 5, 2008. The Princess' mother church from birth through her passing on April 12, 1945 was Our Lady of Peace cathedral in downtown Honolulu.



The `Ahahui Hale O Nā Ali`i O Hawai`i is a benevolent organization of Hawaiian men and women. The organization was founded by the Princess Abigail Wahiika `ahu`ula Kawānanakoa in 1918. Princess Kawānanakoa was the daughter of James Campbell and HRH Abigail Kaihelani Maipinepine of Lahaina, Maui. She married Prince David Kahalepouli Kawānanakoa Pi`ikoi. Princess Kawānanakoa's profound desire was to reach out through the islands and organize a unique society of Hawaiian men and women; to unite and uphold the morale of her people; and to gain deeper respect for each other. Its goals and objectives reflect the Princess' most important desire; "to unite her people into one cause .....Perpetuality of the Hawaiian Culture", while at the same time helping each other in sickness and in the loss of a loved one.



There are seven [7] lodges in the State Benevolent Society governed by a State Board of Governors of the `Ahahui Hale O Na Ali`i O Hawai`i; on the Big Island we have a chapter in Hilo and Waimea; two chapters on O`ahu and a chapter on each of the islands of Maui, Kaua`i and Moloka`i.
