Pastor's Corner

Three Minute Liturgical Catechesis

Article 17: **We All Give Thanks and Praise**

How many of you know when the Eucharistic Prayer begins? The first part of this central prayer of the Mass is a variable section called the Preface. That term does not mean that it is a preliminary section like the preface of a book; it comes from a Latin word that simply means a proclamation. In the preface we proclaim our praise of God, focusing on one or several aspects of God's wondrous works on our behalf.

The Preface itself begins with that standard dialogue that we all can recite in our sleep: The Lord be with you. And also with you. Lift up your hearts. We lift them up to the Lord. Let us give thanks to the Lord our God. It is right to give him thanks and praise.

This simple ritual dialogue tells us a couple of very important things about the Eucharistic Prayer. The first is that the prayer involves us all. Though the priest proclaims most of the prayer alone, right at the beginning we are reminded that we have a part to play. Notice the plural terms: We lift them up to the Lord. Let us give thanks to the Lord.

This is not a private prayer of the priest but a communal prayer that he proclaims in our name. As we move through the prayer, we continue to respond to what the priest proclaims. We sing the Holy, Holy at the end of the Preface. We sing the Memorial Acclamation after the account of the Last Supper. And we affirm and conclude the whole prayer with our Great Amen. This is a prayer that belongs to us all. We offer it to the Father together, united with Christ our head.

The second thing the preface dialogue reminds us is the Eucharistic Prayer is a prayer of thanks and praise. "Let us give thanks to the Lord our God. It is the right to give him thanks and praise." This is also reflected in the very name of the prayer; the word Eucharist, you may recall, comes from the Latin for thanksgiving. We gather every week to thank God for all the gifts we have received from the hand of the Lord. We praise God for God's goodness and love, revealed to us through Jesus Christ.

This central prayer of the Mass, then, calls for our full attention and participation. We need to listen carefully to the words of the Eucharistic Prayer and make them our own prayer by responding with the sung acclamations. We need to truly lift up our hearts and give thanks and praise to God.

This will be easier if we take a few moments before we come to Mass to recall some of the reasons we have to be grateful to God. We always give thanks for our salvation through Christ, but we should also be thankful for the many blessings we receive each week. Perhaps we should take a few moments each night to reflect on the blessings of the day. If we give God thanks each day, then we might be better prepared to do that together here on Sunday.

Second Sunday in Ordinary Time Year A

Readings: Isaiah 49:3,5-6; 1 Corinthians 1:1-3; John 1:29-34

First Reading: Isaiah 49:3, 5-6

This passage from Isaiah reflects the call of Israel as servant of God. Israel's role is not merely to announce, but to bring the good news of God's salvation to the ends of the earth. A nation that had once been humiliated and enslaved is now restored and especially chosen for this holy mission.

Responsorial Psalm: Psalm 40:2, 4, 7-8, 8-9, 10

Originally this was a psalm of thanksgiving for one who had been rescued from the danger of death. Here the psalm expresses the readiness to do God's will, hence the response: "Here am I, Lord; I have come to do your will." The psalmist is also prepared to praise God by proclaiming God's power and mercy.

Second Reading: 1 Corinthians 1:1-3

At the beginning of his First Letter to the Corinthians, Paul affirms the foundation of the solution to the many problems the Christians in Corinth encounter: awareness that they are sanctified in Christ and called to be in one body in Christ. If they truly realize their dignity in our relationship with Christ, they must act accordingly.

Gospel: John 1:29-34

This passage is John's account of Jesus at the river Jordan. But unlike the other three Gospels, John's does not record the event of Jesus' baptism, but only alludes to it in the words of John the Baptist. It is said that John the Evangelist did not want to say anything that might seem to subordinate Jesus to John the Baptist. For that reason, the Evangelist portrays John the Baptist's role as one of giving witness to Jesus. The reason why John was baptizing in the Jordan is given in that light, "that he might be made known to Israel." The sign by which John recognized Jesus became the key point of John's testimony: the descent of the Spirit in the form of a dove upon Jesus.

Social Ministry


Happy New Year




