Pastor's Corner

Rev. Thomas Purayidathil Ph.D.

Over the past several months I have been evaluating our social ministry program. During that time I have enlisted the help of staff and a committee of volunteers headed by Linda Tolmie to analyze the program and make recommendations for my consideration. One of the biggest areas of concern has been the operation of the Thrift Shop. We are faced with increases in rent and utilities as well as an increased demand on the time required of our maintenance personnel. We were also recently informed by our insurance company that we should no longer sell or even give away "any items which use electricity to function," "children's items," and "equipment powered by gasoline, electricity, or other motor fuels."

Over the past 21 months our Thrift Shop has operated at a loss each and every month with the loss for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2007 nearing \$17,000 and our current year-to-date loss at nearly \$16,000.

A recommendation has been made to me by the committee that has been reviewing our Social Ministry program that we suspend operation of the Thrift Shop as soon as possible. After prayerful consideration of this recommendation I must agree that this is the best course of action at this time. We have sent a letter to Mr. Rick Barbatti, property manager for Sai Baba, LLC informing them of our decision to close at the end of this month and terminating our month-to-month lease agreement.

The committee continues to meet and develop a strategic plan for our Social Ministry program and we will be looking for a Social Ministry Coordinator in the near future to work with the committee and myself in implementing our Social Ministry program. I wish to thank all of you who have given time and treasures to help fulfill the mission of our Thrift Shop and a special thank you to our volunteers who have selflessly given hours each week and have assisted in its operation.

April 13 Fourth Sunday of Easter Year A

Readings: Acts 2:14a, 36-41; 1 Peter 2:20b-25; John 10:1-10

First Reading: Acts 2:14a, 36-41

In today's first reading Peter witnesses to the crowds to accept faith in Jesus the Risen Lord as Messiah. In response to that preaching, the people ask what they must do. Peter tells them that they must repent and be baptized in the name of Jesus for the forgiveness of sins. They will then receive the Holy Spirit who confirms the follower of Christ in the life and mission of the Christian community.

Responsorial Psalm: Psalm 23:1-3a, 3b-4, 5, 6

Psalm 23, though its origin is of later date, has been attributed to David who started as shepherd boy before his call and anointing as a warrior-king (1 Sam 16). Here the term "Shepherd" is applied to the Lord God. Response: "The Lord is my shepherd: there is nothing I shall want."

Second Reading: 1 Peter 2:20b-25

Peter's exhortation in this passage is not meant to condone unjust systems like the slavery of that time. Rather, he urges individuals living in such situations to follow the example of Christ, who suffered in order to free them from sin. Peter speaks about the paradox of Christ's suffering by whose wounds we have been healed. The bottom line is that the death and resurrection of Christ leads us, like lost sheep back to the Shepherd, who gives us the fullness of life.

Gospel: John 10:1-10

In the Gospel passage, Jesus responds to the objection of the Pharisees by challenging them on their self-importance. Referring to the role of the shepherd and Jesus gives three criteria for true authority: 1) his followers recognize him; 2) he gives his life for them and they are united to him; and 3) this recognition by faith is God's gift. In this passage, the true shepherd is contrasted to a thief and a stranger whose voice is unfamiliar to the sheep. Jesus also compares himself to the only one gate to the safe enclosed area where the sheep are protected. Therefore, it is easy to guard, and only legitimate shepherds can gain access. Jesus is the only one who can delegate others to care for his flock in his name. Thieves can get in only by violence, breaking down the walls.

Three Minute Liturgical Catechesis

Article 23:

You Are What You Eat

Have you ever seen that poster that pictures a whole array of junk food with these words: “You are what you eat?” It’s intended to make us think a little more about what we put into our mouths.

Centuries ago St. Augustine had a similar goal and used similar language. “Receive what you are,” he wrote. “If you are his body and members of him, then you will find set on the Lord’s table your own mystery. Yes, you receive your own mystery” (*Sermo 272: PL*

38, 1247, cited in Pope John Paul II’s Encyclical Letter on the Eucharist, *Ecclesia de Eucharistia* # 40)

This is a fundamental insight into the meaning of the Eucharist. There is an intimate connection between the body of Christ we receive from the altar and the body of Christ that comes to the altar. The core mystery of the Eucharist lies in this connection between the sacramental body and the mystical body of Christ that is the Church.

It is instructive to note that when Christians in the first thousand years of our history spoke of the mystical body, they meant the sacrament. The real body of Christ, they believed, was the community of believers. In the past thousand years we have reversed the language, so we talk about the sacramental body as real and call the Church the mystical body of Christ. One could defend either pattern. The point is that these two forms of Christ’s body are so closely linked that we can interchange their names.

This link also points us to the purpose of the Eucharist and the real meaning of Communion. St. Thomas Aquinas, in the thirteenth century, taught that

Confirmation rehearsal will be held on Wednesday, April 23, 2008 at 6:00 p.m. at St. Joseph Church. Candidates and their sponsors should attend the rehearsal.

As we prepare to finish this year's Religious Education classes, please continue to be conscientious about your child's attendance at class. Each week important

material is presented to our students. When your child misses a class, he/she misses the relevant subject matter which insures their preparation to receive the Sacraments. If your child is preparing to receive First Communion or Confirmation, they may only accumulate a total of four unexcused absences before they will be required to repeat the class.

Finally, thanks to all of our wonderful catechists, helpers, parents and students. You have made this year a spiritual, fun-filled experience for all us here in the Hilo Roman Catholic Community. As I begin to prepare for next year, I welcome your comments and suggestions as to how we can make our program more faith-filled and how we can spread the "Good News" to more families in our community.

the goal of the Eucharist is the unity of the Church. Christ did not give us this sacrament to turn bread and wine into his body and blood. It does that, but the purpose of the Eucharist is to transform us into his body.

We became members of Christ's body when we were baptized. The Eucharist renews and strengthens the unity of the body of Christ. When we come to the table and share the body and blood of the Lord, we are committing ourselves to live as the body of Christ. St. Augustine put it this way: "You reply 'Amen' to that which you are, and by replying you consent. For you hear 'The Body of Christ' and you reply 'Amen...' Be what you see, and receive what you are."

In his apostolic letter titled *The Day of the Lord*, Pope John Paul II insists that it is important "to be ever mindful that communion with Christ is deeply tied to communion with our brothers and sisters. The Sunday Eucharist gathering is an experience of brother-

hood, which the celebration should demonstrate clearly, while ever respecting the nature of the liturgical action" (*Dies Domini*, # 44).



Receiving Communion brings us into an intimate union with Christ, but that intimacy can never exclude those around us. When we share the body and blood of the Lord, we are united not only with the head of the body but also with every member of the body of Christ. That's the purpose of the Eucharist, and that's why we call it Communion.

Sister Stephen Marie Serrao, OSF Celebrates 60th Jubilee

Sister Stephen Marie Serrao, OSF, is a “Hilo girl” and proud of it. She can regale listeners with stories about growing up in the household of Joseph and Gloria Serrao, fleeing up Waianuenue Avenue to escape the 1946 tsunami, going from ten years at St. Joseph School to Hilo High for her junior year, and the manner in which she told her parents that she was going to enter the Sisters of St. Francis in Syracuse, NY. And then there are all the endless convent stories!

Marie Serrao entered the convent on September 8, 1947, much to the surprise of many people who knew her. At her Investiture on March 2, 1948, she received the Franciscan habit and her religious name, Sister Stephen Marie. It is for this occasion that she celebrates her Diamond (60th) Jubilee this year with fellow Hiloan Sister Helen Agnes Ignacio (who is visiting her sister, Marguerite Carvalho presently).

Over the past 61 years, Sister has taught, counseled and administered in schools in New York, Florida and Hawaii as well as served as founding Director of Volunteers in St. Francis Medical Center West in Ewa Beach. Wherever she has been missioned, she has won the hearts and trust of the people with whom and to whom she has ministered, and she continues to do so today in our elementary school and in her role as spiritual advisor to the Secular Franciscans. Although rarely at a loss for words, Sister exemplifies the message of St. Francis of Assisi, “Preach the Gospel at all times, and when necessary, use words,” for she truly *lives* the spirit and charism of St. Francis each and every day.


St. Patrick’s Day ‘Washboard’ Band
