



## Pastor's Corner

### Give Thanks and Praise:

#### Part 9 of 10: The Liturgy of the Eucharist / The Communion Rite

To share bread, to share drink, are natural human gestures. They are signs of sharing our lives with others. They are very human and simple ways of opening up ourselves to others, of expressing our need for one another, of showing that we all are to participate in life on earth together. The sharing of a meal is among the most ancient signs of love and friendship.

To share the Eucharistic bread, to share the Eucharistic cup, are the logical conclusion and climax of our Eucharistic celebration. The command of the Lord was to "take and eat" and "take and drink." The Eucharist was instituted by Christ to be the spiritual and life-giving food of his people.

In the earliest celebrations of the Eucharist the presider, after the people's Amen at the conclusion of the Eucharistic prayer, merely had to break the bread, after which the minister and people received the body and blood of the Lord. But the growing desire to express mutual love, unity, and forgiveness as well as to endow this part of the Mass with a more developed ritual structure resulted in the breaking of the bread and the distribution of the Eucharist being placed within a rather expanded framework. Today we can distinguish three major steps within the communion rite:

- The Preparation for Communion;
- The Communion itself;
- The Period after Communion.

## Ascension of Our Lord

Year A Readings: Acts 1:1-11; Ephesians 1:17-23; Matthew 28:16-20

### First Reading: Acts 1:1-11

This is the beginning of the Acts of the Apostles written by Luke. The passage first refers to the first book, the Gospel, that he wrote himself. This passage sums up the central content of the Gospel which is an account of “all that Jesus did and taught until he was taken up.” It refers to Jesus’ suffering, death, resurrection and appearances to the disciples. Luke describes the Ascension as a point of transition from Christ’s activity as Savior to the continuation of his mission by his disciples, who are his witnesses to the ends of the world.

### Responsorial Psalm: Psalm 47:2-3, 6-7, 8-9

Psalm 47 is a song of praise that proclaims God’s rule over all the peoples of the earth. Response: "God mounts his throne to shouts of joy; a blare of trumpets for the Lord."

### Second Reading: Ephesians 1:17-23

Paul in this passage describes the Ascension in terms of the exaltation of Christ rather than merely his departure. This is Paul’s vision of humanity in God’s universal plan of salvation. Through the death, resurrection and ascension of Christ all things in heaven and earth have been brought under the reign of God’s sovereign love.

### Gospel: Matthew 28:16-20

This is the last part of Matthew’s Gospel. It concludes with the disciples going to Galilee where they meet Jesus before he ascends into heaven. Through his death and resurrection, the Father has given Jesus lordship over heaven and earth. In turn, Jesus shares this power with the Church, the community of his disciples and sends them on a universal mission to make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Triune God and teaching them all that Jesus had taught them. To help them in their mission, Jesus promises his enduring presence always in the community of believers, the Church.

### Rites of Preparation

A number of prayers and actions help to prepare us to share the Lord's body and blood. Serving as a link between the Eucharistic prayer and the reception of the Eucharist, these rites are intended to stir up our desire for unity, to attune our minds and hearts to the deep meaning and demands of our participation in the Eucharistic meal.

**Our Father:** We begin our preparation with the Our Father, a text common to all Christians, a prayer that asks for daily bread which for us also includes the Eucharistic bread. It is also a prayer that requests the forgiveness of sins. The priest then goes on to request the Lord to grant us peace. Everyone joins in the concluding acclamation ("For the kingdom..."), a statement which has long been associated with the Our Father in the history of Christianity and which concludes the prayer on an upbeat note. As we prepare ourselves to approach the Eucharistic table, our attention is drawn to others and their desire for peace, justice, and love.

**Kiss of Peace:** This ancient liturgical gesture, brought into more prominence by the recent reform of the Mass, recalls that we are to be a people united with one another in the peace of Christ who is present among us. Our handshake, our embrace, our kiss show our willingness to live in the peace of Christ. By word and action we both find and pray for peace in one another.

**Breaking of the Bread:** This rite, going back to the Last Supper itself, is the principal action for preparing for communion. So important was this action that in early Christianity the whole eucharistic celebration was known as "the breaking of the bread" (confer Acts 2:32). St. Paul explains the meaning of the gesture:

And is not the bread we break a sharing in the body of Christ? Because the loaf of bread is one, we, many though we are, are one body, for we all partake of the one loaf. (1 Corinthians 10:16-17)

The action therefore is one of unity. Just as the bread has become the body of Christ, so we who share this one bread, whatever be our diversity, become one body in Christ. For the breaking of the bread to appear as the significant action it is meant to be, the community must use bread that can be broken and shared. Although small breads consecrated at the same celebration may also be used, care is to be taken that at least some of the people receive portions from the large host(s) broken at this time. The routine distribution of eucharistic bread which has been reserved in the tabernacle destroys the unity of the eucharistic action. The flow of the liturgy is one of the people presenting gifts of bread and wine, the priest in the name of all proclaiming a consecratory prayer over these gifts, and the people then receiving back the transformed gifts as the eucharistic body and blood of the Lord.

Accompanying the breaking of the bread is the *Lamb of God*, a litany-song repeated as often as is necessary to fill out the rite. The text recalls that every Eucharist is a memorial of the new Passover, of Christ the Paschal Lamb who brings forgiveness and peace.

**Silent Prayer:** The celebration now offers each one of us a time for silent preparation. The priest prays quietly with the help of texts found in the sacramentary. We also have time to engage in our own prayer—a time that is not to be supplanted by the presider praying aloud.

**Invitation to Communion:** A formal invitation to receive the Lord's body and blood has long been traditional in the Church. Our present formula strikes a balance between a worthiness rooted in baptism ("Happy are those called...") a humility possessed by the centurion ("Lord, I am not worthy..."). *continued on page 5*

### **Distribution of the Eucharist**

The whole movement of the communion rite till now has been to stress our unity in Christ, since our participation at the Lord's table is not to be one whereby a number of individuals just happen to engage in a similar action at the same time. Rather, the communion is the community's coming forward together to share together in the eucharistic meal. This is a common action of the people, not just a series of individual actions.

**An Affirmation of Belief:** As a sign of service to one another a minister, saying "The Body of Christ" and "The Blood of Christ" presents the eucharistic bread and wine to the communicant. Of special significance is the invitation to receive the Lord's body since this text highlights the importance of the assembled people as the body of Christ. St. Augustine explained the meaning of the phrase:

What is meant by one bread? St. Paul interpreted it briefly: "We, being many, are one body." This bread is the body of Christ, to which the Apostle refers when he addressed the Church: "Now you are the body of Christ and his members." That which you receive, that you yourselves are by the grace of the redemption, as you acknowledge when you respond Amen. What you witness here is the sacrament of unity. (Sermon 272)

What we affirm by our Amen is that we believe that Christ is indeed present in the sacrament, in the community, and in the communicant. This is why the minister of communion does not say "Receive the body of Christ" or "This is the body of Christ."

**The Full Sign:** The restoration of the cup to all members of the assembly has been one of the most significant liturgical developments within recent years. It is true that the Church has always taught that Christ is received whole and entire even when communion is received under one form only. Nevertheless, Christ did say that we are also to "take and drink". By our sharing in the cup the sign of the meal is more apparent. Receiving from the cup is a sign of the new covenant (Luke 22:20), the guarantee and expectation of the heavenly banquet (Mark 26:29), and the sign of union with Christ who suffered (Mark 10:38-39). Although the minister may dip a portion of the Eucharistic bread into the wine (intinction), this form of communion is not generally recommended since the action of "drinking" is lost.



**Unity Expressed through Song:** As a vocal expression of our unity in Christ, we often sing as we share in the Eucharistic meal. By common song we express our joy in Christ, our oneness together, our mutual love. We show that the Eucharist is indeed the sacrament of the Church's unity.

### **Period after Communion**

We engage in two actions here: we pray in silence or in song; we join in a formal spoken prayer which brings the communion rite to an end.

**Silent Prayer/Song of Praise:** As people we need moments when each of us can speak with the Lord in our own way. So much needs to be said and to be heard. We need opportunities to open our hearts to Christ and to respond to his presence in our lives. We are afforded such an occasion after the reception of the Eucharist in a time for silent prayer. Yet even this has a communal dimension since the unspoken prayer of each of us will be summed up in the concluding prayer which follows.

As an alternative to silent prayer, however, we may sing a hymn of praise or a psalm. And yet adequate time for silent prayer should be provided.

**Prayer after Communion:** The communion rite comes to a close as the priest gathers up the silent prayer of all as he requests that the effects of the Eucharist may take root in the lives. By our Amen we show that this prayer is indeed the prayer of the community.

*We have prepared ourselves to celebrate the Mass as a people united in Christ, we have heard the word of Christ proclaimed in our midst, we have celebrated the Eucharistic memorial of Christ. It now remains for us to bring our celebration to an end. We will discuss the concluding rite next time.*



## Bishop Larry Silva Celebrates Confirmation

It was with open hearts that the Hilo Roman Catholic Community welcomed Bishop Larry Silva this past weekend. “Bishop Larry”, as he is fondly called, was staying at the St. Joseph rectory while he journeyed to various other parish communities around the East Vicariate to celebrate the Sacrament of Confirmation during the weekend of April 26-27, 2008.

Twenty six Confirmation candidates were present at the 6:00 p.m. Mass on Sunday, April 27, 2008 as the Bishop entered St. Joseph Church to the joyful singing of “Holy Spirit”, from the parish youth choir. The Confirmation candidates had all prepared for this evening by participating in the parish/school program. They sat ready to receive the third Sacrament of Initiation in the Catholic Church.

The inside of St. Joseph Church looked beautiful with two large red banners in the sanctuary proclaiming “Come Holy Spirit” and numerous bouquets of red anthuriums placed in front of and behind the altar and at other prayerful locations around the church.

Catechist Rochelle Augustin presented the Confirmation candidates to the Bishop. Bishop Larry came down from the sanctuary to speak directly to the candidates with his homily. Addressing the candidates, the Bishop spoke of the “gift” of the Holy Spirit that each one of them would receive that night. He encouraged them to “unwrap this gift and to share it with others”. The candidates were asked to “touch others with Christ’s love”, to accept this Sacrament of Confirmation and to “show others that life is full of love”. “You can bring His hope, His joy, His love to all that you meet” said the Bishop. Following the homily, Bishop Larry asked the candidates to renew their Baptismal Promises before he performed the Laying on of Hands, asking that the Holy Spirit come to these candi-

dates. The anointing of the Chrism followed, with the candidates and sponsors coming forward to the altar to be sealed with the Holy Spirit and joined with Christ.

As the Liturgy of the Eucharist continued, the candidates were engaged in the celebration. Several participated in the music ministry and others brought up the offertory gifts. The candidates were attentive and enthusiastic as they sang with the youth choir.

Following the Mass approximately 250 people walked downstairs to the parish meeting room to enjoy dinner with the Bishop and have a chance to speak with him personally. The evening was complete and those in attendance felt the “presence” of the Holy Spirit.

Let us hope that now our Confirmandi will go forth and make a difference in our Hilo Roman Catholic community. It is now that we will ask them to choose a ministry to become involved in. For just as Bishop Larry said, “This is a Sacrament of Initiation, you are just getting started in doing the things that Jesus wants you to do.” Let us keep the Confirmandi in our prayers as they go forth into the world. We hope that they “Catch the Fire and Make a Difference!”





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
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
