

Life is Changed Not Ended—Part 2

God has Created each person for eternal life:

In the face of death, the Church confidently proclaims that God has created each person for eternal life and that Jesus, the Son of God, by his death and resurrection, has broken the chains of sin and death that bound humanity. (OCF 1)

One of the most welcomed liturgical changes after Vatican II was the transformation of the former Requiem Mass into what was popularly called the Mass of the Resurrection and is now named the Funeral Mass. The color of the vestments changed from black to white.

More importantly the prior emphasis upon forgiveness and remission of the sins of the deceased was balanced by the comfort and even the joy of our faith in Christ's victory. Both forgiveness and joy are needed in a celebration of Christian burial.

A few years after these changes in the funeral liturgy were made, I was sitting at lunch with a fellow member of the faculty—a priest who prided himself on being “traditionalist.” He was bemoaning what he called the “hypocritical cheerfulness” of the new funeral liturgy. Having buried both a good friend and a former teacher within the previous three months, I was forced to disagree with him. Though neither the friend nor the teacher had been perfect people, I knew they had been men of faith for whom their love of Christ had been very real. In celebrating their deaths we were not being hypocritical but continuing the best of authentic Catholic tradition.

For Good Friday is only half the story of redemption and is incomplete without the glory of Easter. In the same way, the reality of death and grief is incomplete for Catholics without the comfort and hope of faith.

After the death of someone we love rituals are meant to put us in touch with the painful, even wrenching reality of loss—not to cripple us but to set us free to find consolation in our faith.

Catholic funeral rituals express our continuing love and care for the deceased, and these rituals can begin that inward letting-go which will hand over the deceased to God's mercy. These same rituals seek also to help us put our own lives back together again with new hope for the future.

When celebrated with honesty, the funeral rites for a Christian are neither “hypocritical cheerfulness” nor a denial of death.

The loss and the pain that we pass through are part of the rites, but so too is our faith in Christ's victory and the knowledge that his love conquers even death.

“At the death of a Christian whose life in faith was begun in the waters of baptism and strengthened at the Eucharistic table, the Church intercedes on behalf of the deceased because of its confident belief that death is not the end nor does it break the bonds forged in life.” (OCF 4)

June: 22 Twelfth Sunday in Ordinary Time Year A

Readings: Jeremiah 20:10-13; Romans 5:12-15; Matthew 10:26-33

First Reading: Jeremiah 20:10-13

In this reading Jeremiah faces many difficulties as a prophet. The reading therefore expresses a fearful cry of anxiety: People are plotting to kill him. There is terror on every side. Even his former friends have betrayed him and are watching for him to speak treason. No one will listen to a hurtful truth; they simply want to express their wrath on this messenger of bad news. In spite of his fears, Jeremiah proclaims his trust in the Lord: "for he has rescued the life of the poor from the power of the wicked."

Responsorial Psalm: Psalm 69:8-10, 14, 17, 33, 35

The Responsorial Psalm expresses the pain of an individual in the midst of oppression as well as the suffering of the entire people of Israel at the hands of conquering enemies. Yet the psalmist cries to God with hope for help. "Lord, in your great love, answer me."

Second Reading: Romans 5:12-15

Paul in this passage expresses his understanding of how the Original Sin entered the world through Adam. In so doing Adam lost for himself and all his descendants the gift of sharing God's life. Just as through Adam's disobedience sin entered the world, so too through the obedience of Jesus Christ, the Second Adam, we have been freed from sin and death and now share in God's grace.

Gospel: Matthew 10:26-33

This passage from Matthew is a selection from the teaching of Jesus to his disciples before sending them out to every place he intends to visit. They should not worry about the powers of this world nor anyone who can kill the body. Rather they should fear him who can destroy both the soul and body in Hell. In other words, they must be willing to endure any suffering and even death rather than to do something that would imperil their eternal salvation. Jesus finally exhorts the disciples not to be afraid or concerned, because the Father cares for them more than he would care for the sparrows.

Questions:

Can there be a church funeral for someone who is baptized as a Protestant?

Funeral rites may be celebrated for baptized non-Catholics at the discretion of the local bishop (*OCF 18*) unless the deceased would not have wished this or a minister of his or her own faith is available.

Funeral rites may be celebrated as well for those who are not baptized or who are not Christian, if they have been enrolled as catechumens or merely expressed a desire to become part of the Church. The rites may be celebrated in an adapted form even for the non-Christian spouse of a Catholic. There is a new prayer for such services. (*OCF 398-36*)

Can there be a church funeral for children who die without baptism?

The rites for the funerals of children are extensively revised in the new *OCF*. The bewilderment and pain of loss are acknowledged, and the bereaved are encouraged to seek the compassionate presence of

Christ who “still sorrows with those who sorrow.” (*OCF 239*) And so “funeral rites may be celebrated for children whose parents intended them to be baptized but who died before baptism.” (*OCF 237 & Canon 1183*)

In addition, there is a *Rite of Final Commendation for an Infant* for use “in the case of a stillborn or a newborn infant who dies shortly after birth.” (*OCF 318*) In these difficult pastoral situations parents and family will now have a better chance to mourn the hopes and dreams that they have lost with their baby and to entrust everything in faith to God.

Can there be a church funeral for a suicide?

Yes, previous laws denying Christian burial in certain situations have been revised. The new rite contains two prayers for use when the deceased committed suicide. (*OCF 398-44 & 45*)




St. Joseph Cardinal Basketball 3rd Annual Golf Classic

Four Stages of Canonization in the Roman Catholic Church:

Recently Bishop Larry Silva announced that the Theological Consultors of the Congregation for the Causes of the Saints enunciated that the miraculous cure of Audrey Toguchi was accomplished through the intercession of Blessed Damien. This means that the cause of Father Damien has moved into the final stages in which the Cardinals and Bishops of the Congregation for the Cause of Saints will give their final opinion on the subject, and then pass it on to the Holy Father for his final approval. However, the process of canonization is not a simple task to achieve and can encompass many years. This work falls under the responsibility of the Congregation for the Causes of the Saints which we have been hearing more about these past several years as Father Damien has moved along the process toward sainthood. The Sacred Congregation for the Causes of Saints is a Congregation of the Roman Curia made up of Cardinals and Bishops who oversee the process of the canonizations of saints.

There are four Stages of Canonization in the Roman Catholic Church:

Servant of God, is the title given to a deceased person of the Roman Catholic Church whose life works are being investigated in consideration for official recognition by the Pope and the Roman Catholic Church as a saint in heaven.

Venerable means a person has been posthumously declared as heroic in virtue during the investigation and process leading to canonization;

Blessed or Beatification is a recognition accorded by the church on a dead person's accession into Heaven and the capacity to intercede on behalf of individuals who pray in his or her name.

Saint refers to a person who has been officially recognized by the Church as a model of virtue. The church on her part teaches that it does not make anyone a saint. Rather, it recognizes a saint. Once a person has been declared a saint, the body of the saint is considered holy.

The final two stages of the process require the Congregation to assess two individual miracles; one is to achieve the stage of Blessed and the second miracle to achieve Sainthood. According to the Vatican web site, the recognition of a miracle must follow the new rules laid down in 1983 by John Paul II's apostolic constitution *Divinus perfectionis Magister*. This legislation established two new procedural stages: the

diocesan and the Roman congregation.

First, the bishop of the diocese where the prodigious event happened opens an inquiry on the presumed miracle in which the depositions of the eyewitnesses questioned by a duly constituted court, as well as the complete clinical and instrumental documentation inherent to the case.

Second, the Congregation examines the documents sent by the diocese before pronouncing its judgment on the matter.

This leads us to the definition of miracle. A miracle is an event that goes beyond the possibilities of nature either in the substance of the fact or in the subject. There are three degrees of miracles, which the congregation must distinguish:

The first degree is represented by resurrection from the dead.

The second degree concerns the subject: the sickness of the person who is involved must be judged incurable; in its course, it can even have destroyed bones or vital organs.

The third degree is recovery from an illness that treatment could only have achieved after a long period but happens instantaneously.

Once the congregation has all the necessary elements, they will move on to the next step or stage of the process of canonization.

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

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

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
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
