Pastor's Corner

St. Benedict, Abbot

The feast of St. Benedict falls on July 11. He is the patron of our present Pope. Our Diocese has taken as a priority the promotion of vocations to priesthood and religious life in a serious way. In fact we say a special prayer at every Sunday Mass for vocations. St. Benedict is considered to be the father of western monasticism. He was born at Nursia in Umbria around 480. After schooling at Rome, he turned his back on the world and became a hermit. He lived in Subiaco. Soon disciples followed him there. When he had sufficient numbers he went with them to Monte Casino, where he founded a monastery. That monastery exists even today. He wrote his Rule, which established the spirituality and way of life of monastic communities ever since. His 'Rule' was widely adopted by monasteries and religious orders all across the Western world and thus he has been recognized as the 'father of monasticism in the West.' Even today, there are scores of monastic orders and congregations both men and women who take St. Benedict as their patron and are called 'Benedictines'. He died in 547 and ever since the end of the eighth century he has been venerated in many places. Let us pray to St. Benedict so that he intercedes for us and continues to inspire young men and women to embrace religious and priestly vocations. St. Benedict Pray for us!

Life is Changed Not Ended—Part 4

The vigil: ties of friendship

We believe that all the ties of friendship and affection which knit us as one throughout our lives do not unravel with death. (OCF 71)

Members of the community should console the mourners with words of faith and support and with acts of kindness. (OCF 10)

American Catholics can be proud of our tradition of support for mourners. Paying respects at the funeral home or wherever the deceased is laid out is a well-established custom. Even when we might not have known the deceased personally, a professional or personal connection with a member of the family makes us abruptly adjust our schedules just to pay a visit and say a few kind words or provide a shoulder to lean on.

*The Order of Christian Funerals* calls us not to end but to expand this long tradition. The individual conversations which lie at the heart of our "visitation" are crucial and allow even those who have little connection with the deceased to give their support. Yet there remains a core of family and friends who need something more, who need to gather, to share, to remember, and to let God's Word bring meaning and hope to their grief before they come to the funeral liturgy.

For these mourners the new *Order* expands the possibilities given in the previous rite. That rite called for a priest to lead a service of scripture, homily, and intercession at some point during the wake. The *Order* keeps that format and encourages the mourners to proclaim the scriptures if they can. (OCF 15) A family member or friend may speak in memory of the deceased (OCF 62), and non-biblical readings may be used in addition to those from scripture (OCF 23). Appropriate music such as a well-known psalm or hymn is also encouraged. One of the services from the *Liturgy of the Hours* may be substituted as well. Moreover, any Catholic, ordained or lay, can lead the service.

Such a service is a challenge to many customs associated with fraternal or military organizations or various ethnic traditions. Yet it is open to many adaptations. Within the context of the visitation many of those customs would be effective preludes to the vigil itself.

Within the service a speech in memory of the deceased could include reciting a favorite poem or explaining a drawing done by a grandchild. If the Rosary is still a popular devotion, there might be a place for reciting a "Hail Mary" in the service of

## Sunday Reflection

Rev. John M. Mbinda

### July 6: Fourteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time Year A

Readings: Zachariah 9:9-10; Romans 8:9, 11-13; Matthew 11:25-30

#### First Reading: Zechariah 9:9-10

The prophet Zachariah in this passage looks forward to the restoration of the kingdom of Israel by the Messiah. Zachariah writes very shortly after the return from the Babylonian exile around 520 B.C. He compares the anticipated Messiah to both the meekness of David (v 9) and the majesty of Solomon (v 10). Further, his rule will be from sea to sea, as that of Solomon, and it will be characterized by true and lasting peace.

#### Responsorial Psalm: Psalm 145:1-2, 8-9, 10-11, 13-14

Psalm 145 is simply a song of praise and thanksgiving for the goodness of God shown in his works. Response: "I will praise your name for ever, my king and my God."

#### Second Reading: Romans 8:9, 11-13

Paul in this passage contrasts the "flesh" and the "spirit." For Paul, "flesh" stands for the way a person goes when he or she depends totally on the self, without reference to God's gift of the Spirit. "To live in the Spirit" means to be open to God's initiative in our lives, so that God may lead us in his way. This life in the Spirit is closely associated with the resurrection of Christ. The Spirit brings forth new life in the one who is dead to the "flesh." Such life by the Spirit witnesses to the resurrection of Christ and the promise of our own rising to life.

#### Gospel: Matthew 11:25-30

The Gospel reading this Sunday focuses on the qualities of those who accept Jesus and become part of the kingdom of God. The contrast of the "children" with the "learned and clever" has its roots in Daniel 2, where the young men, in answer to their prayer, are granted greater wisdom than the sages of Babylon. Jesus compares his followers, in their gifted simplicity, with the intellectuals and legalists of his day who had made the law so complicated an affair that no one could observe it. In the disciples' childlike poverty, which was really openness to God, they had the key to the wisdom that had eluded the professional "wise men." For Jesus the "easy yoke" and "light burden" is the way of the cross. Carried in union with him, the cross is indeed light because it is borne with his power.

## Hospital Ministry



Through Hospital Ministry, volunteer Eucharistic Ministers take Holy Communion to the Hilo Medical Center on a daily basis. At one point, we had twenty-two registered and scheduled to take Communion to the sick, in the hospital. This past year, several have moved away, one died, and others resigned because of very good reasons (like Nelson & Virginia Jacinto, who became parents of twins this year). We need the help of parishioners to assist in this very important corporal work of mercy and ask that you step forward and say, "Yes."

The basic commitment is to provide one visit each month to the hospital. There are ministers like Bob DeMotta, John & Linda Tolmie, and Mary Ann Paulos, who provide multiple visits each month. Training and commissioning as Eucharistic ministers will be conducted and all new ministers will also receive training on hospital protocol and procedures.

This is not an easy ministry but one that always gives back more than you give. You reconnect with Catholics in all stages of their religion and their life, and you make a difference. Another great school year came to a conclusion at the end of May. There were four graduations held to honor Grade 12 (27 graduates), Grade 6 (23 graduates), Kindergarten (20 graduates) and Preschool (22 graduates).

The 2008 High School graduation class garnered numerous awards and scholarships. The Class Valedictorian was **Hannah Katibah** who is also a National Merit Scholarship Finalist. The Class Salutatorian was **Emma Pirie**.

Very successful May Day celebrations were held by the Jr./Sr. High School and the Elementary School. The King and Queen of the High School were Paul Battad and Alayna Jardin while the King and Queen of the Elementary School court were Nolan Kua and Melia Cavedoni.

With a cheerful "Vamos!" Spanish exchange student Fernando Aguirregomez corta swept the Big Island **AND** Hawaii High School Athletic Association Tennis Single Championship. The sixth annual Alumni and Friends luau, held on May 24 at the Hilo Meishoin Hall, was a success in many ways. The Class of 1958 celebrated their 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary by reminiscing and enjoying each other's company. Two exhibits of class and basketball team photos were on display to help all "Remember when...?" A solemn memorial service and moment of silence was observed for deceased class and family members.

A highlight of the evening was the assembly of the 1958 Territorial Championship Basketball Team. The coaches and team members, or their survivors, each received a plaque honoring them as members of the St. Joseph Athletic Hall of Fame, as well as a framed color photo of the Championship Banner. The awards were presented by Sr. Marion Kikukawa, school principal, and Rachele Hanohano, athletic director. Walter Victor, Jr., son of the famous Cardinal basketball coach, Walter C.K. Victor, thanked the team for making his father's dream come true.

As part of their commitment to St. Joseph School, the Alumni and Friends presented a gift of \$20,000 to the tuition assistance fund. The surprise presentation was made by Tony Phillips, president of the Alumni & Friends, to Sr. Marion.

In addition, Sr. Stephen Marie Serrao, OSF was honored for her sixty years of service as a Sister of St. Francis and regaled the crowd with tales of her *kolohe* days as a student at the old St. Joseph Girls' School.

The food prepared by Charlie Kama was *ono*; the entertainment by the musicians and dancers of Te Po'ai was top notch; and the level of enjoyment was high. ### STRATEGIC PLANNING TEAM REPORTS

This summer the school will have completed the first year of its three-year Strategic Planning initiative. It has been funded by a grant from the Hawaii Community Foundation. Initiatives that have resulted from the plan so far include this bulletin insert as a way to keep all parishioners on the island aware of activities at your Catholic school, the new Achievement Hall of Fame, and efforts to measure the success of the school as determined by students, parents, teachers and the greater community on the Big Island.

### ST. JOSEPH GOES GREEN

In order to join the "green" generation, St. Joseph School is developing a new web presence and will be communicating with its various constituencies (students, parents and alumni) with e-mails as much as possible. Currently the school uses a lot of paper, toner, postage and time to produce newsletters and announcements to these groups. We already have grades and homework assignments on-line so that parents can see in real time how their children are doing and what their assignments are. There will still be a need for some print publications like this bulletin insert and the annual report though both will also be available on-line for those who wish to view them.

### CELEBRATING 140 YEARS

This school year finds your Catholic school celebrating 140 years of service to Hawai'i youth. The school opened its doors on April 1, 1869 and was chartered by King Kamehameha V to teach English to Native Hawaiian and recently arrived immigrant children. In 1875 boys and girls were segregated and a boys' school called Maria Keola was founded. In 1885 the Marianist Brothers came to Hilo to run the boys' school and renamed it St. Mary School. Parish staff and lay persons taught the girls at St. Joseph School until the Franciscan Sisters of Syracuse (Blessed Mother Marianne Cope's congregation) arrived in 1900 to assume teaching and administrative responsibilities. The two schools were amalgamated in 1948 as St. Joseph School. After they were joined, the girls and boys were still separated in the high school as the boys occupied the mauka classrooms and the girls the makai classrooms.

A number of special events will be held during this next school year to highlight our heritage. Bishop Larry Silva will celebrate Mass on St. Joseph's Day on March 19 at St. Joseph Church. The traditional dance festival will be held that afternoon at the school, and an event is in the planning stage for alumni and friends the evening before. Throughout the next year the school expects to hold 140th anniversary receptions at various sites on the Big Island and in Honolulu. Should funds become available the school hopes to have receptions on the West Coast in various population centers where alumni live.

Homecoming and Catholic Schools Week will be January 25-31, 2009. The annual open house will be on Saturday, January 24th. In addition to madcap homecoming events, the homecoming pep rally, and homecoming basketball game (which is currently scheduled for that Saturday night), the school plans to inaugurate the Achievement Hall of Fame. This new recognition opportunity joins our Athletic Hall of Fame. The Athletic Hall is in the upper High School Building while the Achievement Hall will be in the lower High School Building.

The School welcomes parishioners from around the island to join in the 140th Anniversary celebrations of your Catholic school.

intercession. Many of the bright ideas that don't work at a funeral Mass could be very effective in the more intimate setting of a vigil.

For that is the purpose of any vigil: to watch, to wait, to prepare. Especially for those who are grieving deeply, the process must not be rushed. They need an evening of remembering and of prayer before they can face the task of giving away to God in the funeral liturgy, the one they loved.

### Questions:

*Why is the name for this rite "vigil" and not "wake"?*

"Wake" has come to be a general term for all of the activities while people keep watch with the body of the deceased until the funeral liturgy. Many of these customs, both secular and religious, are of real help to the mourners. To indicate that the principal activity for this time period is the service

in which the Word of God is proclaimed and common prayer is offered, this rite has been given the appropriate name of the Vigil.

*May the Rosary be a part of the wake?*

Yes, when the mourners would find consolation in the Rosary during this time of waiting, this devotion should be continued. Yet, the Rosary is not a part of the principal service, the vigil, which is focused on the Word of God and common prayer.

*Is music appropriate during the wake or vigil?*

Yes, many people have been very moved by music in the intimate surroundings of a funeral home. Secular music, such as school alma maters, which would be inappropriate for the funeral liturgy can be very powerful at a wake. However, during the vigil itself only religious music is appropriate; indeed the *OCF* encourages such music as an "integral" component.



### *CCH Intake Information & Referral Program helps with recent job loss.*

The Neighbors in Need Fund opened June 1 to provide help specifically for the more than 2,500 employees laid off in the past six months by major Hawaii corporations such as Aloha Airlines, ATA and Molokai Ranch.

Affected individuals can apply for funds to assist with rent, medical expenses, utility bills and gas money. Assistance is capped at \$500 per household for these emergency needs.

Individuals must have a letter from the company or the state unemployment office proving the loss of job, picture identification, some proof of income and some verification of emergency need, such as a past-due rent or utility notice.

Funds are available until July 31, 2008. Please contact the Catholic Charities Hawai'i offices: 961-7050 for assistance.

Donations to help support the fund can be dropped off at any First Hawaiian Bank. The money raised will help pay the bills of the recently unemployed.

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
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
