Life is Changed Not Ended—Part 5

The funeral liturgy:

At the funeral liturgy the community gathers with the family and friends of the deceased to give praise and thanks to God for Christ's victory over sin and death, to commend the deceased to God's tender mercy and compassion, and to seek strength in the proclamation of the paschal mystery. (*OCF 129*)

The center of the funeral rites is the funeral liturgy itself which if at all possible should include the celebration of the Eucharist. At no other point in the series of rites does the difference between common American practice and authentic Roman Catholic tradition become more obvious.

We can understand the difference by asking ourselves what a Roman Catholic funeral is not meant to be. First, it is not a memorial service. The focus is not on the deceased and on keeping his or her memory alive. Instead the service focuses upon God and the wonders that his grace continues to work among humankind. Second, the homily is not a eulogy in which a mere human being tries to interpret the meaning of the deceased's life. Rather, "the homilist should dwell on God's compassionate love and on the paschal mystery of the Lord." (*OCF 141*)

Nor is the funeral liturgy a dirge as in the old Requiem Mass. Christian faith affirms that neither human sin nor grief nor the absurdity of life can prevail over the power of Christ's death and resurrection.

And so, unless the vigil was held in the church, the liturgy begins at the entrance to the church with the reception of the body. Just as in Baptism the deceased first shared in Christ's victory, now he or she is welcomed for the last time into the assembly with holy water (and a white cloth) and with the lighted Easter candle placed near the coffin.

God's Word is spoken again. The Eucharistic Prayer in which we offer everything back to the Father is proclaimed. All the baptized share in the one bread and the one cup. So important is Communion that when a priest is unavailable, the new *Order* encourages Communion from the Reserved Sacrament. No one should be deprived of the closest possible unity "with Christ, with each other, and with all the faithful, living and dead." (*OCF 143*)

The liturgy usually concludes with the Final Commendation and Farewell. The medieval rite had ended with an Absolution. The 1969 rite and the new *Order* ask us to say farewell in Christ. The reality of the final separation can no longer be denied since the deceased and the mourners will soon leave the church. Yet the whole assembly sends them forth, affirming in gesture and song our belief that the Good Shepherd will lead us all one day home to the new and eternal Jerusalem, the city of endless life and peace.

Sunday Reflection

Rev. John M. Mbinda

July 13, Fifteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time - Year A

Readings: Isaiah 55:10-11; Romans 8:18-23; Matthew 13:1-23

First Reading: Isaiah 55:10-11

The prophet Isaiah in this passage tells us that moisture comes from the heavens to water the earth so that it will be fruitful; it returns to the heavens only after accomplishing its purpose. In a similar way, God expects that his word will make us fruitful. In other words, his word works infallibly even when human obstacles seem to frustrate it.

Responsorial Psalm: Psalm 65:10, 11, 12-13, 14

Psalm 65 presents material abundance as a motive for praise and thanksgiving to God the Creator. Water, in all its manifestations, destructive as well as life-giving and cleaning, is a powerful symbol of God's word. Response: "The seed that falls on good ground will yield a fruitful harvest."

Second Reading: Romans 8:18-23

Paul in the second reading considers the sufferings of the present as nothing when compared to the glory that awaits us. Therefore we should be willing to endure anything. Paul speaks of creation as being in bondage because of Original Sin. When Christ comes in glory, everything will achieve the purpose for which it was originally created. While we wait, we must be filled with joyful hope.

Gospel: Matthew 13:1-23

In this Gospel passage, Jesus refers to common farming practices quite familiar to his audience. The purpose of the parable of the sower is to show the power of the seed (the word of God) in bringing forth an abundant harvest. Jesus also wants to show that in spite of the difficulties that face various contexts in which the word of the kingdom is proclaimed, the harvest will be abundant nevertheless. In the longer version of the Gospel, the question and answer about the purpose of the parables intends to emphasize the gift of understanding given to the disciples, in contrast to others who do not understand fully. Jesus' mission is not an overwhelming success in human terms, but in the light of the final judgment, those who do receive his word are blessed because they form the kingdom. The quotation from Is 6:9-10, which is associated with Isaiah's call to be a prophet, encourages the disciples to be strong in proclaiming the message of the kingdom even in the face of inevitable unpopularity. God does not cause the hardening of their hearts. Rather, his kingdom will be established even in spite of their rejection.

World Youth Day 08

About the WYD08 logo

The logo distills the essence of the theme for WYD08 and highlights the promise made by Jesus to set fire upon the Earth by the power of the Holy Spirit which inspires the pilgrims who come to Australia, to believe and witness to Him.

Central to the logo is the Cross raised in victory, representing Christ and the life of witness which the Holy Spirit enables. It is the passion of the heart of Christ, poured out into the world from the Cross, which consumes the young people of Sydney, of Australia and of the world. The whiteness of the Cross indicates that Jesus is the light of the world.

The flames of the logo represent the Descent of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost in tongues of fire. They evoke the Sacrament of Confirmation and the gifts of the Holy Spirit. The colors of red, orange and yellow flowing throughout symbolize the Trinity and Unity of God. They also bring to mind the colors of the Australian outback.

The blue of the logo represents the oceans that surround Australia, the waters of Baptism, the sea of humanity and Mary, full of grace.

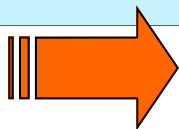

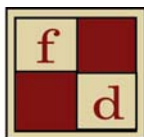
