



Pastor's Corner



Bishop Larry Silva: On the canonization of Blessed Damien

We thank God that on July 3, the Holy Father signed a decree confirming that the healing of Audrey Toguchi from cancer was indeed a miracle performed by God through the intercession of Father Damien. In effect, this means that Father Damien will be canonized, that is, declared a saint to be venerated perpetually by the universal Church. The only formalities that remain are a consistory of the cardinals (perhaps in February?) at which the Pope will formally declare before them his intention to canonize Father Damien; and, of course, the actual Canonization Mass.

The Diocesan Father Damien/Mother Marianne Commission has already been talking about possible canonization activities. There will be a pilgrimage to the canonization for those who are able to go, and we will have local celebrations as well.

I am sure the residents of Kalaupapa are delighted to hear that our beloved Father Damien will soon be canonized. It is he and Mother Marianne who will be the ones to tell the story of Kalaupapa for centuries to come.

The Church canonizes saints to set and example for us, because we are all called to holiness. Our diocesan strategic plan, the Road Map for Our Mission, identifies addressing the issue of homelessness as one of its goals. Father Damien addressed the very same issue in Kalaupapa. He himself built many homes for those who could not do so for themselves. We pray that Father Damien will inspire us all to reach out to those who are most in need in our community to make a real difference in their lives, to serve them with the love of Christ. We also pray that the Lord will raise up young men and women like Damien and Marianne, and call them to serve the Church as religious, priests and deacons.

It is my hope that we will soon embark on a restoration of our beautiful Cathedral of Our Lady of Peace. It is 165 years old this year, and is the venue of Father Damien's ordination as a priest. Part of the plans for renovation call for a shrine to honor Father Damien, and another to honor Mother Marianne. I have already obtained permission to receive a significant relic of Father Damien for veneration in the Cathedral. I am working on obtaining a relic of Mother Marianne as well. Just as people go to cemeteries to honor their loved ones who have died, so we venerate relics of the saints.

It is God who created the miracle of Father Damien. It is God who accomplished the healings, through his intercession, that allowed his cause for sainthood to move forward. It is God who will renew us all with his love as we thank him for this great honor which will be paid to our brother and friend, our beloved Father Damien.

Sunday Reflection

Rev. John M. Mbinda

July 20: Sixteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time, Year A

Readings: Wisdom 12:13,16-19; Romans 8:26-27; Matthew 13:24-43

First Reading: Wisdom 12:13, 16-19

This passage from the Book of Wisdom deals with questions of faith on God raised by some Jews living in the Greek world. They wondered why God does not show his mighty power by stopping evil in the world. They also wanted to know why God deals with leniency on those who disobey, and leads them to repentance. The author of the Book of Wisdom responds that God does not need to "prove" himself. His almighty power is shown most perfectly in his forgiveness of sin. By showing forth his power in his loving kindness and forgiveness, God inspires us to do likewise. By his patience, God encourages us to have the patience to forgive, to be reconciled.

Responsorial Psalm: Psalm 86:5-6, 9-10, 15-16

Even in deep distress, the psalmist recognizes that no one has greater power and mercy than the Lord, and this thought restores his confidence. Response: "Lord, you are good and forgiving."

Second Reading: Romans 8:26-27

Paul in this brief passage reminds us that the Spirit comes to help us in our weakness. When left to ourselves, we are tempted to pray according to the flesh by trying to manipulate God to serve our own ends. The Spirit of Christ ensures our submission to the Father in union with Christ. Our true prayer arises only out of this submission.

Gospel: Matthew 13:24-43

In the shorter Gospel passage, Jesus in the parable of the wheat and the darnel teaches about the growth of his kingdom. In spite of appearances to the contrary, the parable responds to the Apostles' apprehensions over the enmity of the Pharisees and the defection of some disciples. Jesus underlines the fact that his followers in the kingdom must remain fully in the human arena, and that patient efforts in imitation of God's patience will bring about its fulfillment. The growth of the wheat and weeds together in the field addresses the obvious fact of the presence of wicked people even within God's kingdom on earth. The early Church came to recognize unfaithful members in its midst, and questioned how this could be possible in the kingdom of God. The answer, derived from these words of Jesus, is to await God's final judgment in patience.

In the longer version of the Gospel, there are two more parables. The parable of the mustard seed alludes to the persistent growth of the kingdom, and the contrast between seemingly insignificant beginnings and the final outcome. The image of the yeast is clear enough, portraying the growing power of the kingdom as both hidden and irresistible.

About the WYD Cross

The World Youth Day Cross is the most significant tangible symbol of World Youth Day. Originally the idea of Pope Paul II, the 3.8m high wooden cross was built and placed as a symbol of the Catholic faith, near the main altar in St. Peter's Basilica during the Holy Year 1983.

At the end of that year, John Paul II gave the Cross as a gift to the youth of the world, to be carried through the world, as symbol of Christ's love for humanity.

Life is Changed Not Ended—Part 6

The committal prayerful remembrance:

Whenever possible, the rite of committal is to be celebrated at the site of committal, that is, beside the open grave or place of interment, rather than at a cemetery chapel. (OCF 204)

The funeral liturgy is the center of the funeral rites but not the conclusion. The deceased's remains must be given their final disposition. This practical necessity is also a moment of deep psychological and spiritual significance. The journey of the deceased's remains ends at last in a grave or mausoleum (or sometimes in the sea or a columbarium). Inwardly the mourners need some experience of closure. They need to know that the deceased has been laid to rest. Their grief will not end at the committal, but they need to know that they have done their best and that—at least physically—the deceased occupies a new place in their lives.

Anything less than this is at least potentially a false mercy for the bereaved. In calling for the service of committal to include the *act* of committal, the Roman Catholic tradition is simply calling us to face the reality of death.

The weather might be terrible, the ground muddy, and the sense of finality almost overwhelming; but experience shows that there is something both powerful and consoling about reaching down with the other mourners to throw a clod of dirt into the open grave.

Real growth as a human being and as a Christian takes place in the real world. How we pull our lives together after a death is a very individual process.

Our prayer together at the time of death can lay a solid foundation for that process if our words and gestures bring together both the fact of loss and our faith in a loving and merciful God. In the committal, more than anywhere else in the funeral rites, ritual and pastoral care are one and the same.

Individuals and the parish community can also continue the ministry of consolation after the funeral rites are fin-

ished. Sharing a photo of the deceased from a personal album or dropping a card on the deceased's birthday or the couple's anniversary are simple ways of letting the mourners know that the person they loved has not been forgotten. Ethnic customs regarding special prayers on the month or year anniversary can also be helpful. Many parishes (and some cemeteries) have special prayers in November or at Easter during which those who have died during the previous year are remembered.

When carried out in the midst of the community of faith, the committal can help the mourners to face the end of one relationship with the deceased and to begin a new one based on prayerful remembrance, gratitude, and the hope of resurrection and reunion. (OCF 213)

Questions:

Can Catholics be cremated?

Yes. The celebration of funeral rites for Catholics who are cremated is permitted with the permission of the local bishop. The issue of cremation has always centered around respect for the human body which God's spirit enlivened for so many years and which is destined to be raised up on the last day. Burial in the earth or at sea, entombment, or even cremation can be a respectful way of placing the body to rest in expectation of its resurrection at the Last Judgement. Only when one of these means of disposition of the body reflects an anti-Christian motive is such a means forbidden by the Church.

It is important to note, however, that the *Order of Christian Funerals* is arranged so that cremation takes place whenever possible *after* the funeral liturgy and not *before*.

In 1997 the National Conference of Catholic Bishops received permission from the Holy See to allow the funeral Mass to be celebrated in the presence of the cremated remains.
