THE ASSUMPTION OF THE VIRGIN MARY

On the 15th of August the Church keeps the Solemnity of the Assumption of Mary into heaven. In the rest of the United States and most of the world it is a day of obligation. We are special in Hawaii and we have no obligation to attend Mass on that day. But as a sign of your devotion to Mary I would encourage all of you to attend one of the masses. We are adding a Vigil mass at St. Joseph and another at Malia on August 14 at 7 pm.

We should all feel a sense of satisfaction after we have completed a good job. Mary after completing her job on earth in an excellent manner was called back to God. She has already been taken up into heaven, body and soul, and thus is a gift of hope for us. The feast of the Assumption celebrates that fact. Mary, servant of God, is a symbol for Christians. Mary also embodies the Church, and she embodies what it means to be a disciple. One thing that we should remember is the fact though Mary was sinless she was never freed from suffering; neither are we. We are not freed from something; rather, we are freed for something. We are freed to live in the kingdom of God. Mary did experience the darkness of faith, as all of us have in some way or other. She endured the anxiety of a mother who most of the time did not understand the reckless behavior of her Son in challenging the authorities and its consequences. She was the mother of sorrow who accompanied Jesus her Son all the way to the foot of the Cross. She did not understand many of the things happening to Jesus but she believed and trusted in God. She always was the humble handmaid of the Lord who made her 'fiat' to Angel Gabriel. But because she did a good job of living her call to the fullest she was exalted above all creatures and enthroned Queen of heaven and Mother of God.

Through her Assumption Mary becomes an image for our future. In an eminent way she already shares in her Son's triumph over death, anxiety, darkness and pain. As a beautiful human being, she is with God and as such constitutes an image for us who hope that when our time comes God will say: "Well done! ... Come share your master's joy!" Mathew 25:21.

May Mary Assumed into Heaven bless and protect each and every one of you all the days of your lives!

Meet Fr. Joseph Hennen

Fr. Joe: I was born in 1940 in Southwestern, Minnesota. If you are familiar with the show Little House on the Prairie, that was my life, growing up on a small farm with my family. I was ordained in 1967, and I spent most, if not my entire life working with young people. I worked especially with at-risk teens and young people using drugs.

August 10: Nineteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time, Year A

Readings: 1 Kings 19:9a,11-13a; Romans 9:1-5; Matthew 14:22-33

First Reading: 1 Kings 19:9a, 11-13a

The prophet Elijah having fled to Mount Horeb afraid for his life, is hiding in a cave when the Lord asks him to go outside where God would reveal himself. In the past, God had genuinely revealed himself in the powerful forces of nature. Now, however, God shows himself veiled in the gentle breeze, perceptible only to the attentive listener. This passage is a warning for us to seek God as he is, not as we would like him to be.

Responsorial Psalm: Psalm 85:9, 10, 11-12, 13-14

Psalm 85 is a prayer of thanksgiving for forgiveness and restoration. The prayer is also a petition for help to rebuild the kingdom and expresses confidence that God will restore his people fully. Response: "Lord, let us see your kindness, and grant us your salvation."

Second Reading: Romans 9:1-5

Paul in this passage laments that although the Israelites were privileged in the flesh so that Christ might come from them, this very privilege prevented them from receiving him. Paul's own expression of concern for his brother Jews echoes Moses' desire to sacrifice himself for the forgiveness of the Israelites (Ex 32:32). Here and subsequent chapters (9-11), Paul struggles to understand the meaning of Jewish resistance to the message of Christ. The point here is not that Jesus was handed over to crucifixion by the Jewish leaders, but that Paul had continually experienced rejection of his own preaching of the Christian way by Jews wherever he went.

Gospel: Matthew 14:22-33

In the Gospel traditions, Jesus walking on the water occurs in close connection with the multiplication of loaves and fishes (see also Mk 6:34-52 and Jn 6:1-24). This is one of the few instances where John's Gospel parallels the account in other Gospels. In understanding these miracles, it is important to see them as highly symbolic actions. The multiplication of loaves was done not just to satisfy human hunger, but to identify Jesus with the God who gives and sustains life, echoing God's providing manna for his people in the desert (Ex 16). Thus Jesus' victory over water identifies his work as Messiah, overcoming the forces of evil and bringing creation to its fulfillment. Walking on water is part of Jesus' intensive training of his disciples, in which he strives to convince them of the nature of his power, and that they are called to share in it. That is why Jesus invites Peter to come across the water as a sign that the disciple, in union with Jesus, also possesses power over the forces of evil and the only reason for faltering is lack of faith.

Insert 2—The Ministries of Adult Initiation Specialized Ministries in the Initiation of Adults

While all the people of God have a share in ministering to catechumens and candidates, the rite calls for a number of specialized ministries within the assembly.

Catechumens are given *sponsors*, who accompany them and present them to the assembly at the rite of acceptance at the beginning of the catechumenate. The sponsors serve as their companions throughout this period, sharing with them their own faith and offering support as they grow closer to God and to the Christian community. Baptized candidates likewise receive sponsors from the community to accompany and support them during their period of formation.

Catechumens may choose their *sponsors* or other members of the faithful to serve as godparents. At the beginning of Lent, the godparents are called upon to give testimony regarding the catechumens. They assist the catechumens in their period of Lenten preparation for the sacraments of initiation. They accompany them at the Easter Vigil, when the sacraments of baptism, confirmation and eucharist are celebrated. Finally, they join the newly initiated throughout the Easter season in celebrating and reflecting on the meaning of the sacraments they have celebrated in the midst of the assembly.

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As leader of the local Church, the *bishop* has a special responsibility for the initiation of new members. The diocesan bishop “sets up, regulates, and promotes the program of pastoral formation for catechumens” (RCIA 12). On or near the first Sunday of Lent, he presides at the rite of election, in which the call of catechumens to the sacraments of initiation is affirmed and celebrated. If possible, he should also preside at the Easter Vigil and lead the assembly in celebrating the sacraments of initiation.

As the bishop oversees the initiation of new members in a diocese, so *pastors* are responsible in parishes for

establishing a process of formation for catechumens and for celebrating the various rites that are part of their Christian iespecially attentive to the pastoral care of catechumens, “especially those who seem hesitant and discouraged” (RCIA 13). They also approve the catechumens’ choice of godparents, and help them in their ministry. *Deacons* also “should be ready to assist in the ministry to catechumens” (RCIA 15).

Many parishes have established *catechumenate teams* to be responsible for the formation of catechumens and candidates. Members of catechumenate teams serve as leaders of the precatechumenate for adults who are just beginning a period of inquiry, and as catechists for catechumens and candidates during their time of formation in the catechumenate. They also lead the Lenten preparation of candidates for the celebration of the sacraments of initiation, and guide the newly initiated to reflect on the meaning of the sacraments during the Easter, known also as the period of mystagogy. In addition, team members take responsibility for recruiting, training and providing for the ongoing formation of sponsors; for coordinating hospitality and finding opportunities for the catechumens and candidates to be involved with other members of the community; for helping them become active in service to others; for giving them spiritual direction on an individual basis; and for working with members of the liturgy team to prepare the celebration of the various rites which are part of the RCIA. Above all, the members of the catechumenate team are to help the assembly take its rightful part in the initiation of new members.

An Invitation

If you feel called to serve in one of the specialized ministries of the RCIA, please speak to a member of the parish staff or to a member of the catechumenate team. Even if you are not prepared to take on one of these ministries, however, your willingness to be welcoming, to give witness, and to participate actively in the liturgy are vital ministries in the initiation of new members.

These are the words of the Holy Father to all young people at this year's World Youth Day, in Sydney, Australia. Pope Benedict XVI encourages a new generation to "transform the world through the power of the Holy Spirit." Bishop Larry Silva places the youth and young adults as one of the priorities in our diocesan strategic plan. And our pastor, Father Thomas, readily supports the growth of our youth and young adult ministries here in our parish community. So, can anyone guess the theme here? **The youth and young adults are the key to the future of this church and we should nurture them here and now.**

One way of achieving this goal was to take the young adults to Mauna Kea for an overnight camping trip. There were thirteen young adults who said, "yes" to Jesus' call and ventured up the mountain to deepen their faith. Anthony Rapozo and David Soares, delivered general information and guided discussions on topics such as: How should I pray? How should I read the Bible? Where in the Bible can I find topics like lust, commitment and fear? What are the differences between other Christian churches?

The campers also meditated on the sorrowful mysteries using scripture during the rosary, led by Anthony. Then they had a small camp fire where they roasted marshmallows for smores and had hot chocolate. When the morning came after a very cold evening, the young adults welcomed the warmth of the sun with a prayer service. There were times set aside for these young people for fellowship with card games and a few of them leading a "jam session." The campers gathered not only from our Hilo Roman Catholic Community but also from as far as Holy Rosary, Pahala and Sacred Heart, Pahoa.

The purpose of this event was to bond the young adults of this parish with each other, to develop a core group of leaders who could help facilitate weekly activities and to build a community who would support each other in developing a closer relationship with God, our Father. Finally, the overnight trip was a wonderful way to send forth the young adults and give confidence to them to say, "yes!" to Jesus, just like the Apostles did at Pentecost. **The young adults meet on Sunday evenings weekly from 7-9 pm right after the 6 pm mass.**
