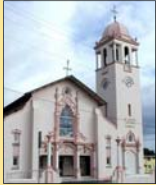

Three Minute Liturgical Catechesis

Article 26: **Sent Forth To Be Christ**

When your heart beats, it draws blood into it, and then sends it to the lungs to take on oxygen. Then the blood is pulled back into the heart and finally sent back through your body to keep you alive. If the heart only took blood in and didn't send it back out, it wouldn't do you much good.

The liturgy is something like a heart. It draws us in when we have been depleted of spiritual energy. It links us to Christ, who revives our spirits and gives us strength. Then it sends us back out into the world.

This sending forth is the final section of the Eucharist. We call it the dismissal, but that's a word that can easily be misunderstood. We might think of dismissal time at school, the time we were finally free to do what we wanted. Or we might think of soldiers dismissed from formation. Dismissal can sound like simply the end of some gathering.

The dismissal from the Eucharist is more than that. The formula of dismissal in Latin is *Ite, missa est*. That's a very difficult phrase to translate. Our current translation is, "Go, the Mass is ended," but that is a bit weak. Translated literally, the Latin means "Go, it is the sending." Perhaps a little more elegant translation into English would be "Go, you are sent." The very word we commonly use for our Sunday worship, the Mass, comes from this dismissal. The Mass is for mission; it strengthens us to send us out again.

When we are dismissed from the liturgy, we are sent forth to carry on the work of Christ in the world. We respond: "Thanks be to God." That almost sounds as if we're just grateful it's over! What it really means is that we are grateful to God for entrusting this sacred mission to us and for strengthening us through the Eucharist to be able to carry it out.

Before the actual dismissal, we hear announcements for the week. The reason they come at this point in the liturgy is that they should be telling us ways that we can carry on our mission during the week. Here we receive the information we need for our "assignments" for the Lord. Then we pray for God's blessing before we are formally sent out on mission.

Of course, in most parishes, we actually conclude with a final song that accompanies the procession of the ministers through the assembly. That means that the liturgy is not over until the song is finished. It is really scandalous in some parishes to see many people leaving early. Some leave during Communion itself. Others leave as soon as the song begins. It's time to end this disrespectful habit. Basic courtesy and respect for the Lord and for our brothers and sisters requires all of us to stay in our places singing until the final song is concluded.

Even then, we don't have to make a mad dash for the parking lot. If we care about our brothers and sisters here, some time in conversation and fellowship after Mass is certainly appropriate. Some people may have pressing obligations that require them to leave quickly, but most of us could linger a bit with one another to share our joy in the Lord. Then we go forth to bring Christ to all those we meet throughout the week.

Bulletin September 21 Twenty Fifth Sunday in Ordinary Time Year A

Readings: Isaiah 55:6-9; Philippians 1:20c-24,27a; Matthew 20:1-16a

First Reading: Isaiah 55:6-9

In this passage, the prophet Isaiah helps us to understand the total giftedness of God's love revealed throughout salvation history. Every one of us has reason to turn to God confidently seeking forgiveness, because God is not limited by our narrow ideas of justice and retribution. God's ways are not like our ways since we tend to operate on the profit motive and on merit. God operates out of his infinite loving kindness and mercy towards all.

Responsorial Psalm: Psalm 145:2-3, 8-9, 17-18

The words of psalm 145 echo those of Isaiah in the first reading. Even though the Lord created the universe in all its splendor, the greatest of his works is his compassion. Response: "The Lord is near to all who call him."

Second Reading: Philippians 1:20c-24, 27a

This Sunday we begin using Paul's Letter to the Philippians as our second reading. It is a friendly letter written from prison at Ephesus around 58 A.D. In this passage, Paul thanks the Philippians for sending him aid. He is not discouraged over his imprisonment; he says that it does not matter where he is, alive or dead, as long as he serves the Lord.

Gospel: Matthew 20:1-16a

Most likely, Matthew wrote this parable about the laborers in the vineyard in the context of his Church community in which there were many Jewish Christians. They were "first," so they thought that they should always have the place of honor and prestige - the important posts in the Church. The parable reminds everyone that we are equal in God's eyes; God is generous to all; those who come last will enjoy the same joy as those who enter first; no one can claim a special place from God.

BISHOP LARRY SILVA'S MESSAGE

Dear Brothers and Sisters:

The preparation of the road map for our mission began in 2006 as I described how blessed I am to inherit a diocese like no other. With humility I fill the shoes of the leaders who have gone before me in this special place, serving its special people. As I continue to cross our islands, I witness the dedication and commitment by our clergy, religious, lay leaders, and parishioners to prayer, work, and service grounded in our faith in the Lord Jesus. Your lives of service inspire me and it is a privilege to be your shepherd.

Recognizing that our diocese, like all others, faces challenges, we have a responsibility to move forward and prepare a road map that will guide our diocese into the future. The road map presented here is the fruit of listening sessions with people from all the islands of our diocese, carefully drawn by a Strategic Planning Committee that was very ably led by Vicar General Father Marc Alexander and Mr. Tom Papandrew, Director of Planning. A map is extremely important on any journey, but the map is not the journey.

With the publication of *Witness to Jesus: Diocesan Road Map for Pastoral, Program, and Facility Needs*, one chapter of our planning process comes to closure, and the hard work of implementing this pastoral plan becomes our top priority. Some implementation activities are already under way, and in the next several months we will be presenting some very concrete and practical strategies that will help all of us work together as one *'ohana* to move toward our goals. The appointment of ad hoc task forces and committees will take place in the first months of 2008. It is expected that the various leadership bodies charged in our road map will be active by late spring 2008 and will begin reporting to me and other diocesan leaders various milestone accomplishments and performance by fall 2008.

It is with great pleasure that I present our pastoral plan to you for your reflection, study, and prayer. Thank you for your prayers and efforts on behalf of the Diocese of Honolulu. I look forward to making the journey with you so that we can give joyful and faithful WITNESS TO JESUS!

A Message From Fr. Joe

There are an increasing number of Malia parishioners who desire to receive sacramental preparation. The Church requires specific "paper-work" in order for an individual to receive First Communion, Confirmation, or Marriage. Much of that paper-work contains confidential information such as the marriage status of the parents and other information which individuals may want to hold in confidence. Malia has no paid staff and some individuals have expressed their reluctance to release this information because they don't know who will be viewing it. Therefore, starting immediately, all paper-work required for any sacramental preparation should be given directly to me in a sealed envelope. When all the required paper-work has been submitted to me I will then inform the staff that the sacramental preparation can begin. In this way, you are assured that the information submitted will be held in the strictest confidence.

On another matter, please consider volunteering to serve on either the Finance Committee, the Liturgical Committee, or the Maintenance Committee. The explanation of each committee is in the Sept. 7th Bulletin. The sign up sheets are at the entrance to the church. We are a small parish. We need many people to involve themselves so that not everything falls on a few people. Mahalo. *Fr. Joe*

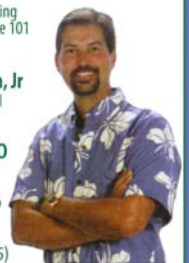
