

What is the Rosary?

Pastor's Corner

The Rosary is primarily a scriptural prayer. This can be summarized by the traditional phrase used by Pope Pius XII (papacy: 1939-1958) that the Rosary is "a compendium of the entire Gospel" (AAS 38 [1946] p. 419). The Rosary draws its mysteries from the New Testament and is centered on the great events of the Incarnation and Redemption. John Paul II called the Rosary his favorite prayer, in which we meditate with Mary upon the mysteries, which she as a mother meditated on in her heart (Lk. 2:19) (Osservatore Romano, 44; 30 Oct. 1979).



Why the Rosary in October?

The month of October each year is dedicated to the Most Holy Rosary. This is primarily because the liturgical feast of Our Lady of the Rosary is celebrated annually on October 7th. Pope St. Pius V (1504-1572) introduced this feast in the year 1571 to commemorate the miraculous victory of the Christian forces at the Battle of Lepanto against the Turks on October 7, 1571. The pope attributed the victory more to the "arms" of the Rosary than to the power of cannons and the heroism of the soldiers who fought there.

The practice of dedicating the month of October to the Holy Rosary developed toward the end of the 19th century. Pope Leo XIII (papacy: 1878-1903) strongly promoted the increase of devotion to the Blessed Mother by encouraging the constant use of the Rosary. Many other popes have contributed to help increase devotion to the Rosary by their writings. In the recent past, Pope Paul VI (papacy: 1963-1978) devoted the last section of his Apostolic Exhortation MARIALIS CULTUS (on the Veneration of Mary) to the Angelus and the Rosary (MC 40-55). In this document, he wrote that "the Rosary retains an unaltered value and intact freshness." (MC, 41)

Development of the Rosary

The development of the Rosary is traced to the High Middle Ages (1000-1200s AD) where it came into being in various medieval monasteries as a substitute for the Divine Office for the lay monks and devout lay persons who did not know how to read. Instead of the 150 psalms, they would pray 150 "Our Fathers" counting them on a ring of beads known as the crown or "corona." With the growth of popularity of Marian devotion in the twelfth century, the "Psalter of the Blessed Virgin Mary" developed and replaced the 150 "Our Fathers" with 150 "Hail Marys."

The 150 "Hail Marys" were subsequently subdivided into 15 decades, with each decade referring to an event in the life of Jesus and Mary. The Rosary was further divided as the episodes in the history of salvation into the joyful, sorrowful and glorious mysteries. The origin of the Rosary then known as the "Psalter of the Blessed Virgin" was attributed to St. Dominic (1170-1221). The Dominican pope, St. Pius V, did much to further the spread of the Rosary. The same Pope St. Pius V, in 1569 officially approved the Rosary in its present form with the Papal Encyclical on the Rosary. More recently, on October 16, 2002, Pope John Paul II declared that the following year (2003) would be the "Year of the Rosary." For the first time in centuries, Pope John Paul II made a change in the Rosary by adding 5 new mysteries called the "Luminous Mysteries" or "Mysteries of Light." These include: 1) The Baptism of the Lord; 2) The Wedding at Cana; 3) The Proclamation of the Kingdom; 4) The Transfiguration; and 5) The Institution of the Eucharist.

During this month of October, let us consider this beautiful prayer of the Rosary as a means that we too can use in order to draw closer to Jesus and Mary by meditating on the great mysteries of our salvation. Our parish is greatly blessed with the various groups that recite the Rosary daily before Mass, and the ongoing weekly noven groups throughout the year. Father John M. Mbinda

Sunday Reflection

October 5, 2008: Twenty Seventh Sunday in Ordinary Time, Year A

Readings: Isaiah 5:1-7; Philippians 4:6-9; Matthew 21:33-43

First Reading: Isaiah 5:1-7

In the first reading, the prophet Isaiah poetically tells of a song about a friend who had a vineyard. Isaiah uses this poetic imagination to capture the attention of listeners concerning the friend's love and care for his piece of land. But then comes disappointment. At harvest time the owner discovers only wild grapes. At the end of the song, God becomes the owner of the vineyard and the listeners are now the vineyard and are identified with the house of Israel. The point of this poetic language in Isaiah is to contrast the tender care, which God lavishes upon his people with their ingratitude and negative response.

Responsorial Psalm: Psalm 80:9, 12, 113-14, 15-16, 19-20

Psalm 80 extends the image of the vine to signify God's people, and asks God to care for it once again. Response: "The vineyard of the Lord is the house of Israel."

Second Reading: Philippians 4:6-9

Paul's final words to the Philippians are beautifully expressed. These words are not just a pious bit of farewell advice. There is a deep sense of urgency in his parting exhortations. The catalogue of virtues outlined here should underlie a faithful Christian life. These virtues are intended to help Christians to be a sign of God's love before other people.

Gospel: Matthew 21:33-43

In the Gospel passage, Jesus tells the parable of the tenants to the chief priests and elders. Foreign absentee landlords controlled much of the land in Judea and Galilee in the time of Jesus. The tenant farmers, who rented these lands, naturally resented these rich and powerful landowners. The killing of servants and the son of the vineyard owner may be explained by the fact that members of the Zealot party in Israel occasionally stirred up opposition against foreign domination that became violent, just as the action of the tenants in the parable. Killing the heir of the property might be a way of getting possession of it. By law, in the absence of an heir, ownership would fall to the first occupant. The workers forget that the owner, upon return, could give his land to others. In the parable, the chief priests and elders realize that Jesus was referring to the Jewish people who have rejected Christ, and are therefore unfaithful to their "chosen" status. The kingdom itself would therefore be taken away from them and given to the Gentiles. The parable also becomes an explanation of Jesus' eventual cruel death.

October 7: Our Lady of the Rosary

Pope St. Pius V established this feast in 1571. The purpose was to thank God for the victory of Christians over the Turks at Lepanto—a victory attributed to the praying of the rosary. Clement XI extended the feast to the universal Church in 1716.

The purpose of the rosary is to help us meditate on the great mysteries of our salvation. Pius XII called it a compendium of the gospel. The main focus is on Jesus—his birth, life, death and resurrection. The Our Fathers remind us that Jesus' Father is the initiator of salvation. The Hail Marys remind us to join with Mary in contemplating these mysteries. They also make us aware that Mary was and is intimately joined with her Son in all the mysteries of his earthly and heavenly existence. The Glorys remind us that the purpose of all life is the glory of the Trinity.

The rosary appeals to many. It is simple. The constant repetition of words helps create an atmosphere in which to contemplate the mysteries of God. We sense that Jesus and Mary are with us in the joys and sorrows of life. We grow in hope that God will bring us to share in the glory of Jesus and Mary forever.

Tuesday October 7 is the Feast Day of Our Lady of the Rosary. Please consider attending our regular weekly Rosary(6:30 pm) and Novena (7:00 pm) to honor Our Lady of the Rosary on her Feast Day.

An Interview with Fr. Joe Carroll

We are so blessed to have priests who model for us the ways of Christ. Men who love God and God's people with their hearts and souls to bear witness to Jesus. We were honored this past week with the presence of an old friend; Fr. Joe Carroll had come to assist Fr. John while Fr. Thomas was on vacation. Many of you parishioners may remember Fr. Joe when he resided here on the Big Island. I had the pleasure of sitting down with Fr. Joe for a very brief interview.

Chrislyn: Thank you for taking time to sit down with me, Fr. Joe. I have the joy of delivering the stories of our visiting priests with others. So, let me begin with asking, where were you born? Where did you grow up?

Fr. Joe: I was born and raised in Ponca City, Oklahoma.

Chrislyn: What did you do as a child?

Fr. Joe: Well, that was so long ago. I did what all children do, play of course!

Chrislyn: What do you like to do in your leisure time?

Fr. Joe: I like to read. I am an eclectic reader. I enjoy reading everything.

Chrislyn: Do you speak any foreign languages?

Fr. Joe: Very poor English. Ha, just kidding. I do not speak any foreign languages.

Chrislyn: Name someone you admire from your life.

Fr. Joe: My old pastor, Fr. Jim McNamee. He was pastor when I was first ordained in 1955. He was my mentor in Tulsa, Oklahoma. I was ordained in the same cathedral where my mom and dad met and were married.

Chrislyn: If you hadn't become a priest, what would you have been?

Fr. Joe: Well, I would have been a plumber. Plumbing was all I knew. I was raised in a plumbing shop with my father. If not a plumber then I would have been a Carmelite lay brother.

Chrislyn: Father, what do you think is the biggest challenge facing the Church today?

Fr. Joe: I think the biggest challenge facing the church today is putting Vatican II into action as originally intended by the bishops of the church. I also think that young people need challenges that give them responsibility to our church. They

also need challenges that are suitable to their time and strength. These young people have the time and energy. We need to show them the responsibility of being Christlike and encourage them to share their good works with others.

Chrislyn: Finally, for my last question, what is your favorite Bible passage and why?

Fr. Joe: My favorite passage would be found in the book of Acts, Chapter 10. In this chapter, Peter was moved by a dream to meet Cornelius, a centurion of the Cohort called Italica. Cornelius was moved by a visit from a messenger sent by God. God wanted these two men to meet. God's message to Peter was that Peter was not to judge what was clean or unclean. What God places before us, we are not to determine as "unclean." Meaning, God shows no partiality. I think this is amazing because Peter was with Jesus for three years, living right by Jesus' side and now, only then he realized what Jesus was teaching all along. This passage gives us hope to understand what Jesus really means. This passage shows us that as Peter was convinced, so should we be convinced by the power of God. This is when we can become witnesses to Jesus.

Chrislyn: Well thank you so much Fr. Joe for visiting us and for helping us out here at St. Joseph. God bless and until we see you again....

Thank you, as in Mahalo; from Fr. Joe Carroll:

It's been awhile----! It is good to get back here to St. Joe's, in "Far-away-Hilo-Town," once more. The warm and friendly family style hospitality remains the same. A lot more people seem involved in more parish activities where the laity has more responsibility.




