

February 1: Fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time, Year B Readings: Deuteronomy 18:15-20; 1 Cor. 7:32-35; Mark 1:21-28

First Reading: Deuteronomy 18:15-20

In this passage, Moses predicts that after a long succession of prophets in Israel, God would send one final prophet. That prophet would speak with authority, for "he shall tell them all that I command him." In other words, the prophet would have the power to proclaim God's will in a way that would bring about the deeds that the words signify. Thus Jesus is the fulfillment of the true meaning of prophet.

Responsorial Psalm: Psalm 95:1-2, 6-7, 7-9

Psalm 95 is both a call to worship as well as a warning against neglect of the word of God. God's voice spoken through the prophets, through his Son and through his Church, has no power unless it is freely received, heard and understood, taken to heart and acted upon. Therefore we must pray that we will hear God's voice when he speaks. Response: "If today you hear his voice, harden not your hearts."

Second Reading: 1 Corinthians 7:32-35

Paul's purpose in the Second Reading is not to advise whether or not to marry. He was obviously unmarried himself. As a traveling missionary, Paul had no fixed home, and so marriage and family would have been impossible. However he regarded marriage very highly, calling it a sign of the union between Christ and his Church (see Eph 5:21-33). Here Paul holds up an ideal of detachment from the things and ways of the world, using virginity as a sign of this detachment. No matter what our state in life, the important thing is to keep our eyes firmly fixed on what is beyond, and not let ourselves become helplessly entangled in the passing concerns of this world.

Gospel: Mark 1:21-28

This passage from Mark contains a nutshell summary of the whole mission of Jesus who comes to free humankind from enslavement to the forces of evil. Jesus does this by the power of his word which is effective and authoritative. The exorcism that Jesus performs serves two purposes: 1) as an illustration of Jesus' teaching with authority; and 2) to show that without Jesus Christ all humanity is in the grip of the power of evil. This first miracle of Jesus also serves as introduction to who Jesus is and the nature of his ministry. Those who hear his word experience his power. His teaching cannot be separated from his person. He is what he teaches.



An Interview with Fr. Marc Alexander

As he bustled around our office on Friday, January 16, 2009, I was able to catch Fr. Marc Alexander for a quick interview. He is such an honored guest when he visits our

parish but he is the most difficult person to get an interview from. I managed to sit down with Fr. Marc for a few questions with the help of Fr. Thomas.

Thank you so much for sitting down with me Fr. Marc. I appreciate your visit. First, can you tell me what does the Vicar General of a diocese do? How are they appointed? What are they responsible for within the diocese?

Fr. Marc: Hi, Chrislyn. The Vicar General is the number two person in diocesan administration, like a VP or COO. The VG represents the Bishop in all matters except those reserved only for the Bishop. The Bishop appoints the VG who serves at the pleasure of the Bishop. There is no term of office – I simply serve as long as the Bishop wants me to serve. Only a priest or bishop can be VG.

Cool, Fr. Marc, how did you know you wanted to be a priest?

Fr. Marc: I was born in Japan and moved to Hawaii. My parents are both converts. My mother was Shinto and my father was Jewish. Along with my sister, we were all baptized Catholic as a family. This had a huge impact on my choice to become a priest. I grew up comfortably and wanted to make a difference and I wanted to serve the church. My family's faith taught me many values and while I was in the sixth grade, I knew then I wanted to become a priest. The idea to become a priest remained with me as I finished high school and from then I joined a seminary college in North Virginia.

Finally, Fr. Marc, what do you think is the biggest challenge facing the Church today?


Fr. Marc: Referring to our Diocesan Road Map Strategic Plan, I think leadership is the biggest challenge facing our church. I know that there are not as many priests in our diocese as we need; however, there has been increasing numbers of lay ministers who have taken on some of the ministries' responsibilities. We as a diocese need to insure that our lay leaders are trained, confident in their leadership positions and supported in their ministries.

The Eucharist is the focal point of the Catholic faith because it is Jesus present with us here on the earth today. Jesus prolongs His presence on earth and most completely fulfills His words: "Behold I am with you all days, even to the consummation of the world." (Mt. 28:20)

Pope Paul VI said that Eucharistic adoration cultivates in the soul a 'social' love by which the common good is given preference over the good of the individual. Pope John Paul II, in a letter commemorating the 750th anniversary of the first celebration of the feast of Corpus Christi, said, "through adoration the Christian mysteriously contributes to the radical transformation of the world." This is a powerful statement that affirms the awesome power of Eucharistic adoration, the power that will transform our "culture of death" into a culture of life.

Paul the Missionary Each of us possesses a missionary calling that goes with priestly ordination

Most frequently, the figure of St. Paul evinces reflection upon his great theological contribution to the Christian faith. Scarcely a major teaching of the Church does not have some foundation in the letters of Paul. As important as this perspective is, there is much more to be learned from Paul than theology.

The goal of this article is to study Paul from the perspective of his activity and thought as a missionary. There is much to be learned both theologically and pastorally about his missionary activity. We begin with a brief note on method.

The Acts of the Apostles

There are only two principal sources for the life and ministry of Paul, the Acts of the Apostles and his own letters preserved in the New Testament. Both have information on the topic at hand, but a caution is in order. When it comes to Acts, although it contains considerable historical reflection, we must remember that the author had his own theological interests, which at times led him to give emphases to certain events that might not reflect "the way things were."

Clearly, when it comes to the portrait of Paul, Acts highlights his activity as a missionary. This basic orientation coincides well with Paul's own self-understanding and his mission as it comes across in his letters. So we will use both sources for our analysis but keep an eye out for Lucan special interests.

Paul: Missionary Par Excellence

In the New Testament, Paul is clearly the missionary par excellence. Even Acts, which concentrates primarily on Peter and Paul and supplements with some other missionary figures like Philip, Barnabas and Silas, makes Paul the main hero in terms of mission. His exploits cover more than half the book, and it is from Acts that we get the notion of three missionary journeys.

In order to get at the essentials of Paul's mission, I will focus on six aspects of Paul's ministry, covering both his thought on mission and his actual activity:

- 1) The Call of a Missionary;
- 2) Universality;
- 3) Founding and Sustaining Faith Communities;
- 4) The Content, Jesus Christ:
- 5) Hope in the Face of Suffering;
- 6) Adaptability.

The Call of a Missionary

The first thing one notices about Paul as a missionary is that it is not a job. Paul is proud of being an "apostle," someone sent on a mission, even though he was not one of the Twelve. Mission activity for Paul is not an occupation. It is a ministry, a sacred task given by the risen Lord Jesus himself to extend the Gospel message to the Gentiles.

As a missionary, Paul thus had to accept the call he received. Both Acts and Paul's letters indicate that this was not what Paul was expecting. God called him to the mission in a fashion that dramatically turned his life around, but Paul freely embraced it with the same fervent enthusiasm with which he had earlier persecuted the Church.



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


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
