

THE HOLY SEASON OF LENT

On February 25, with Ash Wednesday we begin the season of Lent. Lent is a special time of purification and enlightenment not only for catechumens preparing for baptism but for all of us who will renew our commitment to our baptismal life in Christ at Easter. Baptismal life unites us with Christ and through him to the Most Holy Trinity. We know that the life of the Trinity is centered on Love. Through Christ we are united to God and the love-life of God present in the Trinity. The human vocation is to live this life of love every moment, freely receiving and freely giving the Love living in us. We need to celebrate Lent as a parish community as well as individual families. Families celebrate Christmas, birthdays, marriages, anniversaries etc. But the idea of celebrating Lent in the family may seem strange to us. Lent is a time when we can recall the great love and mercy of God who gave his Son for us. That should be enough reason to celebrate. Though Jesus' love for His Father and for us led him to the death on the Cross, he rose from the dead and won our salvation for us. This is good news for us! That is the reason why we should celebrate Lent not only as a Parish community but also in our families. To fast, pray and give alms are the three practices Christ invites us to during Lent. They help us get in harmony with the language of love and open our hearts more fully to the joy of Easter. So let us celebrate this Lent, let us take up this Lenten journey with all the enthusiasm and reverence we can muster. It may be good to have a short discussion in the family with all the members of the family, to see how each one can celebrate this Holy Season with spiritual profit that will extend from the family to the parish community. So let us begin our Lent with a prayer on our lips "Lord, cleanse me of my hard-heartedness. Help me embrace your infinite mercy and love in my life." Amen.

2009 Lenten Regulations:

ABSTINENCE:

- All persons who have completed their 14th year are bound by the law of abstinence from meat.
- Complete abstinence is to be observed on Ash Wednesday and the Fridays of Lent, and Good Friday during the Triduum.
- The faithful will not lightly excuse themselves from this obligation. On days of complete abstinence, meat and soup or gravy made from meat are not to be eaten.

FAST:

- All adults are bound by the law of fast up to the beginning of their 60th year. According to Canon 97, #1, a person who has completed the 18th year is an adult.
- The day of fast during Lent is Ash Wednesday (Feb. 25) the day of fast during the Triduum is Good Friday (April 10).
- The faithful will not lightly excuse themselves from this obligation..

February 22, 2009: Seventh Sunday in Ordinary Time, Year B

Readings: Isaiah 43:18-19, 21-22, 24b-25; 2 Cor. 1:18-22; Mark 2:1-12

First Reading: Isaiah 43:18-19, 21-22, 24b-25

The context of this passage is the exile in Babylon that was brought about by sin. That exile is about to end, and Isaiah tells the Hebrews not to remember “events of the past,” referring to the first Exodus in Egypt. The point is that a new Exodus is about to take place and from hence the second Exodus would be the focal point of remembrance in Jewish liturgy. Israel’s new liturgy would now be characterized by a confession of sins, for it is the Lord who wipes out their sins.

Responsorial Psalm: Psalm 41:2-3, 4-5, 13-14

Psalm 41 is a prayer of thanksgiving to the Lord who heals and restores his people to health. The attitude of gratitude for what God does for us leads to praise of God for his healing." Response: "Lord, heal my soul, for I have sinned against you."

Second Reading: 2 Corinthians 1:18-22

The first part of this reading concerns Paul’s reasons for not visiting Corinth as he had planned. It appears that he had to reassure them of his love and concern for them. But Paul concludes with a statement that sums up the role of the Trinity in the Christian life. God the Father has fulfilled his promises to us in Christ, the Son of God, and through him we worship the Father by joining our wills (our "Amen") to his. This unity of will with Christ is accomplished by the Holy Spirit, who is the "down-payment" or guarantee of our salvation.

Gospel: Mark 2:1-12

The healing of the paralytic in this passage sets the stage to focus on the primary barrier to participate in the kingdom of God, namely sin. The power of Jesus’ word is here shown by the multitudes attracted to him. Yet, the very effect of his teaching that attracts crowds, can be an obstacle or a challenge to the faith of those who see him. Jesus perceives the creativeness of those who struggle to bring in the paralyzed man as a sign of faith. Their faith influences Jesus’ response to the sick person’s need. Here physical healing is presented as a sign of the forgiveness of sins. But the scribes interpret Jesus’ words of forgiveness as blasphemy and harden their hearts against him. The stage is now set for trial to begin because Jesus "blasphemes" as expressed in Mk 14:64. That will lead to his death. Thus Jesus heals the paralyzed man as a sign of the ultimate messianic miracle – the forgiveness of sins through his death on the cross.




Paul and the Cross

Because of Jesus, the Cross is no longer a sign of death but a pledge of life

The Cross of Jesus stands at the heart of St. Paul's theology and his apostolic message to his communities. Virtually all aspects of Paul's reflections on the Christian life make their way ultimately to Jesus Crucified.

It is important to remember that Paul's first encounter with Jesus was as the resurrected Christ. Whether we take Luke's dramatic account of the young Paul's encounter with the Risen Jesus on the road to Damascus or Paul's own autobiographical reflections later in his life when writing to the Galatians, the testimony is the same: Paul had a profound encounter, a vision, of the Risen Christ (Acts 9:1-22; Gal 1:11-24). The realization that the Christ who was risen was also the Jesus of Nazareth who had been crucified made an explosive impact on Paul's entire way of understanding reality.

The truth of these visionary experiences for Paul could only mean that God had raised from the dead one who had been crucified and one who in the eyes of the Mosaic Law should have been accursed. The notion that someone executed as a common criminal in such a heinous form of capital punishment, reserved by Roman authorities for slaves and rebels, was claimed by the early Christian community to be the beloved Son of God and Messiah of Israel was the offense that had set Paul so fiercely against the Christian movement.

Now, in an experience he could not deny, Paul realized that his persecution of the Church had been terribly wrong. From that moment on, Paul had to rethink in a radically new way his Jewish faith, his own life and his view of the world.

The Cross and a New Image of God

Paul was thoroughly in love with his Jewish heritage and would, in fact, never abandon it. He speaks confidently of his Jewish experience: "circumcised on the eighth day, of the race of Israel, of the tribe of Benjamin, a Hebrew of Hebrew parentage, in observance of the law a Pharisee, in zeal I persecuted the church, in righteousness based on the law, I was blameless" (Phil 3:5-6).

But the realization that God was saving Israel and the world through a Crucified Messiah caused Paul to rethink his Jewish heritage. In the reality of the Cross, the God of Israel and the God of Jesus Christ had defied human logic.

This is Paul's point in the opening section of his letter to the Corinthians. Paul alerts the Corinthians that he was sent to "preach the gospel, and not with the wisdom of human eloquence, so that the Cross of Christ might not be emptied of its meaning" (1 Cor 1:17).

God's wisdom, Paul realizes, runs counter to human wisdom. "For Jews demand signs and Greeks look for wisdom, but we proclaim Christ Crucified, a stumbling block to Jews and foolishness to Gentiles, but to those who are called, Jews and Greeks alike, Christ the power of God and the wisdom of God" (1 Cor 1:22-25).


The fact that God had chosen to save the world through a Crucified Christ, a condemned human being the world would despise, revealed to Paul a theology of "weakness" - a key intuition of Paul's entire perspective. To demonstrate that the power came from God and not from human prowess alone, God chose the "weak" and the "powerless" as vessels of His grace.

As stated in the beautiful hymn Paul cites in his letter to the Philippians, Jesus stripped himself of His divine status to become a servant of all, even dying on a cross, and therefore all who would follow in the footsteps of Jesus must be willing to do the same (Phil 2:5-11). This is precisely Paul's point in pleading with his beloved Philippians to put aside their differences and to take on the "same attitude" as that of Christ Jesus himself.

Here Paul's theology retrieves a fundamental motif of the Jewish Scriptures that may have been eclipsed for the pre-Christian Paul. Namely, that the God of the Scriptures, in fact the God of Israel, is the God of the poor who cares for the weak of the world: the widow, the orphan, the stranger.

Jesus himself embodied this spirit of compassion and justice in His own ministry. Here, too, Paul could find the rationale for his mission to the Gentiles -- even though outside the realm of God's chosen people, the Gentiles, too, were called to salvation. The God of Abraham was also the God of the Gentiles.

Bereavement Ministry

Loss is always painful. This is especially so when families experience the ultimate loss--the death of someone they love. Mourning is a time of pain and of growth. It can be a time for God. Our parish is conscious that because each person is unique, people will grieve differently and according to their own personality, their culture and their traditions. Our bereavement program wants to be sensitive and respectful to individual and family needs after the death of the loved one. Outreach to the bereaved seeks to reach people where they are. God cares. We care. Through the bereavement program it is realized over and over again that we can do so much for them.

What can we do to help bereaved people?

When there is a death in our congregation, we would like to be able to offer assistance from the caring people in our community. Many families may not choose to use the help and we certainly respect their wishes.

There are others who would benefit from having someone in our congregation offer to help with some of the following:

- Make phone calls to people designated by the family to give service information.
- House sit during the service
- Babysit during the service
- Help plan service
- Pick up out of town relatives at the airport..
- Write sympathy letters
- Sending sympathy cards (immediately, after six months, on anniversary)
- Visiting in the months after the death
- Reach out at special anniversaries or holidays with a card, plant etc.
- Plan an annual remembrance service
- Maintain grief library
- Pray for surviving members of the family and the friends.
- Planning Liturgy
- Graveside service
- Others (your experienced idea)


