March 15: Third Sunday of Lent, Year B

Readings: Exodus 20:1-17; 1 Cor. 1:22-25; John 2:13-25

First Reading: Exodus 20:1-17

The Decalogue in this passage is a brief, easily memorized summary of the entire law of God, and indeed has been traditionally used as such in religious education. The first commandment sets the rest of the commandments within the context of the covenant. The law is seen as the means of faithfulness to the covenant God has made with his people. Although the commandments are in accord with what we may perceive as natural law and with any reasonable ethical system, they also rise above nature. They are expressions of the personal will of God as the way to live in union with God. In the commandments, we have an example of God elevating nature to be an expression of God's love and wisdom. Keeping the commandments is therefore the foundation upon which a life of Christian love, which goes beyond mere laws, is to be built.

Responsorial Psalm: Psalm 19:8, 9, 10, 11

Psalm 19 sees the harmony of the universe, expressed in God's law, as a powerful sign of his love. Response: "Lord, you have the words of everlasting life."

Second Reading: 1 Corinthians 1:22-25

In this passage, Paul briefly explores the problem of divisions among Corinthians as caused by a search for worldly wisdom — using reason to argue one's own way as more "perfect" than that of others. Paul's solution is to disregard both the arguments of the Jews who rely more on signs (miracles) and Greeks, who rely more on wisdom. Rather, Paul calls for a patterning of one's life on the cross which is self-giving in terms of self emptiness to the point of death. This is viewed as foolishness to the Greeks and a scandal to the Jews.

Gospel: John 2:13-25

John places the incident of cleansing the temple at the very beginning of Jesus' ministry, while the other Gospels show it as part of the events immediately preceding the passion. The cleansing of the temple, explicitly connected to the Passover, gives the theme of God's salvation in Christ. Just as the Passover event was the destruction of the bonds of slavery in Egypt and the passage to a new life as God's people in the Promised Land, so the meaning in this passage is that the material physical temple would be destroyed, and the new life of God's true temple would be built up.

Fr. John M. Mbinda What is the Chrism Mass?

On Thursday, March 19, 2009, at 6.30 pm, Bishop Larry Silva will preside over the Chrism Mass at Saint Jo-



seph Church. What is the Chrism Mass? The Chrism Mass is a gathering of the whole diocesan family: clergy, religious, and laity around their shepherd – the bishop. At this celebration, the bishop blesses the oil of catechumens, the oil of the sick, and the oil of Chrism. Under normal circumstance, this celebration presided over by the bishop takes place on Holy Thursday morning. In some unique pastoral situations as in the Catholic Diocese of Honolulu, where parish communities are spread throughout the various islands, the celebration of the Chrism Mass in our case takes place earlier in one parish for the two Vicariates on the Big Island. Last year the Chrism Mass took place at Saint Michael Church in Kona. This year the Chrism Mass will take place in Saint Joseph Church, Hilo.

At the Chrism Mass this year, Bishop Larry will bless the oil of catechumens, the oil of the sick, and the oil of chrism. These oils form an important part of the sacramental life of each parish community, and that is why each parish on the Big Island will be represented at the Chrism Mass by the pastors, priests, deacons and laity. We use the oil of catechumens for adult catechumens and infants in preparation for baptism, the oil of the sick for anointing those who seek healing and wholeness, and the Sacred Oil of Chrism for post-baptismal anointing, confirmation, the ordination of priests, and the consecration of altars. The three oils are basically olive oil, but to the Sacred Chrism is added balsam or oil of flowers with the scent of sweet perfume. One early church writer described the perfume of Chrism as "the Easter aroma, God's grace incarnate through the sense of smell!"

Only the bishop may consecrate the Sacred Chrism, therefore in a very special way the Chrism Mass every year highlights the bishop's pastoral ministry and our union with him. Since he is not able to baptize and confirm everyone in all parishes of the diocese, his ministry is symbolically present in the chrism which the priests and deacons use throughout the year. In recent years, the Mass has also acknowledged the ministry of priests and deacons. At the Chrism Mass, the bishop invites them to renew their commitment of service and ministry in the diocese. At the end of the Chrism Mass, representatives from each parish come forward to receive their oils ceremoniously.

The holy oils are then solemnly received into each parish during the Holy Thursday Mass of the Lord's Supper. The oils are placed in noble and dignified containers and stored close to the baptismal font in an ambry - a wall safe, often with a glazed door so that the oils are visible to the community. Through the liturgy of the Church, Christ acts to strengthen and protect, to heal and restore, to set apart and seal for ministry. The Chrism Mass each year serves to make these realities available to the community of faith.

ST. JOSEPH SCHOOL CELEBRATES 140TH ANNIVERSARY


(Hilo, Hawaii, March 9, 2009) – Founded as a small parish school in 1869 and chartered by King Kamehameha V to teach Native Hawaiian children, St. Joseph School – and for 63 years its fraternal twin of St. Mary School – have served Big Islanders with a high quality Catholic academic education. On March 18-19 the school will celebrate its 140th anniversary with several events in Hilo.

On the evening of Wednesday, March 18 there will be a celebration at Auntie Sally's Luau Hale. If you haven't already received an invitation and would like to attend please call the Development Office at 933 -1459 (or via e-mail at sjsdevofc@gmail.com). There will be a special school mass at St. Joseph Church on Thursday, March 19th at 9:15 am. Bishop Larry Silva will celebrate the mass and will be joined by several priests representing the religious orders associated with St. Joseph and St. Mary Schools and several parishes

on the island. In addition the Marianist Brothers and Franciscan Sisters are sending representatives to the celebration.

After the mass the congregation is invited to participate with the Bishop and concelebrants on a "Walk of Remembrance" to visit the former sites of St. Joseph Girls and St. Mary Boys Schools as well as the old St. Joseph Cemetery where our founder Fr. Charles Pouzot is buried. There are two other Sacred Hearts priests and a Marianist Brother buried at the cemetery which is immediately adjacent to the old St. Mary School site. Special blessings will be said at these sites on the Walk of Remembrance.

The school plans to have more 140th anniversary celebrations in Honolulu and on the West Coast during 2009 as funds become available. Please join the St. Joseph School 'Ohana in celebrating our legacy.





Here we are Lord send us!

Twenty-five young adults travelled to Kalopa State Park for a Lenten retreat, held from February 27 through March 1. They gathered in the beauty of God's creation to listen, reflect and examine what it means to serve God and serve our neighbor.

Deacon Jerry and Aunty Rose Nunogawa presented on the retreat's theme, "Whom Shall I Send?" taken from the book of Isaiah. He shared with us a little about Isaiah the prophet and what it meant to answer to God, "Here I am, send me." Deacon Jerry presented on the importance of using the Lenten season to think about our journey of faith. He said, "Faith and salvation is for everyone. It is only a matter of how we respond to God's call to be faithful." Aunty Rose led everyone during the "timeouts" (time set aside for reflection and small group sharing). Some of the questions for the reflections were: "Where was I on my journey of faith for the 'yesterdays' of my life?"—"What does my spiritual road map tell me about my journey in the here and now (present)?" and "Where can my spiritual journey lead me in my future?"

Sr. Ruth and Sr. Marykutty ventured up the mountain to speak to the young adults about social justice and the Lenten reflection. Sr. Ruth talked about the seven principles of Catholic Social Teachings. She shared with the young adults the importance of being active in social justice issues because it is better to reach out our hands to others than just talking about it. She said, "Jesus did not only pray and preach, he ministered and cared for the weak, the outcasts, and especially the homeless. It is our duty to reach out to our brothers and sisters who are suffering just as Jesus did. Injustices are all around us especially right here in our Hilo."

Sr. Marykutty shared with the young adults about the spiritual themes of Lent. She focused on prayer as our method of communicating with God. Then, Sr. Marykutty shared about **fasting** as our means of preparing ourselves for God by stripping away the things (bad-habits) that hold us back from loving and pleasing Him. Finally, she said **almsgiving** is our demonstration of faith. "It is a way for us to share not only our monetary offerings but our offerings of time and talent to our church," she concluded.

The retreat leadership team led the participants through many icebreakers, prayer opportunities and a service project that consisted of constructing prayer cards to be shared with everyone they meet on their Lenten journey. Above all they had time spent building their community through good food and time for fellowship. The retreat ended with mass on Sunday where Fr. John spoke about the how Jesus spent time in the desert listening, reflecting and examining what his mission here on Earth was before he started his ministry. Fr. John preached "The time has come for us to make a decisive turn around and to enter into a *right relationship* with God. The Kingdom is already approaching. Lent is a time for change, a change for the better.'

The sole purpose of this Lenten retreat was to foster the young adults into active and participating members of faith. They were

challenged to select one area where they can commit more of themselves to prayer, fasting or almsgiving. Some chose attending the Stations of the Cross, participating in small Christian communities (Parish young adults or Big Island Catholic Campus Ministry) and many chose to enhance areas they were already serving in. We, as a community, began our Lenten commitments and pledge to carry them out, together, helping each other out, until April 12th, Easter, where we will meet the Lord again.
