



May, the Month of Mary, our Mother

When Jesus saw His Mother, and the disciple whom He loved standing near, he said to His Mother, "Woman, behold your son." Then he said to the disciple, "Behold your Mother!" And from that hour the disciple took her to his own home. John 19:26-27

Mary became the Mother of all human beings, the moment Jesus told John the apostle to Behold His Mother, the Blessed Virgin Mary. Since then, we have a true Mother in Mary.



The Month of May is traditionally dedicated to Mary in many cultures. May is considered the season of the beginning of new life and the start of summer. That makes a logical time for the celebrations of Mary, who brought life into the world. She is the greatest woman to ever have stepped foot on this earth. She serves as the perfect example of motherhood for our modern world. She is our model of love and mercy. No one in history has been more obedient to God than Mary. As a 15 year old girl she faithfully said "Here I am Lord, the servant of the Lord, let it be with me according to your will" (Lk 1:38). She risked her life in order to say "Yes" to have Jesus in her womb. Mary put Jesus ahead of Joseph and even her own life. **Because of her "yes," she is present at almost every major event in the life of Jesus:**

His conception (Luke 1;2)

His development in the womb, including the fetal development of John the Baptist (Lk1:43)

His birth (Lk:2:7)

Offering Him to God (Lk2:22)

Early childhood (Lk2:22-38)

His confirmation at 12 years old (Lk 2:49)

His start in public ministry and the first of His miracles (Jn 2: 1-12)

His death on Calvary (Jn 19:26)

The birth of the Church at the Pentecost (Acts 1:14)

Again we see Mary clearly spells out her role in eternity: "My soul magnifies the Lord, and my Spirit has rejoiced in God my savior. For he has regarded the lowly state of his servant; henceforth all generations will call me blessed." (Lk:146-48)

Jesus is magnified by Mary's soul. A soul is eternal and not limited by life on earth. Mary reinforces her eternal ministry by saying all generations will call me blessed. Being in relation to Mary's eternal soul does not draw focus away from Jesus. It magnifies him. That is the greatness of Mary.

Blessed Mother's role is not ended with Jesus. That was the beginning of her important role. She will continue to play an ongoing role in service to Jesus in the spiritual battle with Satan and his evil angels. She continues to be with us at every moment as she was present at almost every major event in the life of Jesus. The Month of May exhorts all of us to honor Mary with special devotions, hymns & prayers. Let us be like Mary to bear Christ into the world through ordinary daily life.

Sunday Reflection

Fr. John M. Mbinda

May 3, 2009: Fourth Sunday of Easter, Year B

Readings: Acts 4:8-12; 1 John 3:1-2; John 10:11-18

First Reading: Acts of the Apostles 4:8-12

This passage comes immediately after the healing of the cripple that led to the arrest of Peter and John by the religious leaders. Since they wanted to know by what authority they had performed the healing on the cripple, Peter responds that the healing of this man is proof that Jesus is risen from the dead, and is the source of salvation for all.

Responsorial Psalm: Psalm 118:1, 8-9, 21-23, 26, 28, 29

Psalm 118 refers to the Israelite nation, oppressed by other nations and yet favored by God. Early Christians, as in the first reading, saw these words as typifying the Jewish reaction to Jesus as the fulfillment of God's saving work. Response: "The stone rejected by the builders has become the cornerstone."

Second Reading: 1 John 3:1-2

These verses intend to make a link with the first reading. The world (human society) "did not know him" (God). Therefore the unbelieving world rejected and crucified God's revelation in Christ. We have accepted that revelation and so through our baptism we are children of God. We are called to recognize the full dignity of what we are now, and live accordingly, for that is the seed of what we will become.

Gospel: John 10:11-18

In this Gospel, Jesus follows a long Hebrew Scripture tradition that frequently depicted God as a shepherd, beginning with Gn 49:24. Psalm 23 is the most familiar. The great king David had been a shepherd, and is referred to as shepherd of the people in Ps 78:70-72. Later leaders were often corrupt and called unfaithful shepherds by the prophets who gave voice to God's promise that he would shepherd his people. Jesus is therefore the fulfillment of that promise when he tells the parable of the good shepherd. He intends to show that different from other shepherds, he is the good shepherd who literally lays down his life for the sheep. This image has two applications. The first application connects laying down one's life with the defense of the sheep against "wolves," a traditional image of false teachers. The second application speaks first of the inner life of the Church (the shepherd knows the sheep by name) and then of the Church's missionary outreach: the other sheep who are not yet members of this fold: the Gentiles. The mission of the Church is both to defend the sheep from wrong ideas about salvation which comes through Christ alone; the second aspect of the Church's mission is the unity of the Church, so that there will be one flock and one shepherd.

"Thank you for saying yes to Jesus...thank you for choosing to gather at this year's Big Island Youth Day (BIYD)" Fr. John "Freddy" Quintero said as he began his message to the young people during morning mass. One hundred-fifty youth and young adults said "Yes," to attend BIYD on Saturday, April 25th at St. Theresa Church in Mountain View. It is not often that the young people get thanked for attending a "church-event" and many of them were taken by surprise. Fr. John "Freddy" geared his message along the lines of our event's theme, "We have seen the Lord."

He was very animated in his homily as he used volunteers and props like balloons to illustrate how sometimes we don't always walk in the way of Jesus. He said, "Imagine that this balloon represents drugs, alcohol, and sexuality without commitment. See how our youth volunteer is trying to steady himself on this balloon? Did you see what happens when the balloon popped? At any given moment these things that give us false happiness will burst from under us and then where does it leave us? If you walk with Christ and truly testify that Jesus is the Way, the Truth, and the Life, you will not fall but have a stable foundation."



Father John Freddy also spoke about wake up the "sleepwalking Catholics," as he fondly challenged the youth to become more conscience of why they are participating in faith. He gave examples of young boys who like to wear their pants lower than usual. He asked one young man, "Why do you wear your pants so low?" The young man replied, "It's the newest fashion." In a conversation with some of the participants, one individual makes this observation: "Do they wear baggy pants because it is fashionable? Wearing baggy pants is risking embarrassment for at any moment one could accidentally step on the leg of one's pant or one's friend or frienemy may just "accidentally" step on one's pant leg and one could be left for all the world to see. Did he just go from cool to fool? Hmmm? Publicly proclaiming by action or deed that you love the Lord Jesus with your heart and soul may risk being a mockery or the loss of some "so called" friends but it comes with much grace."



Following Mass with Deacon Tom Adams, Father Salvador Bringas, the hosting pastor, and Father John Freddy, the youth gathered for lunch and spent the remainder of the afternoon visiting the carnival-style activities. There were booths set up from each parish that either had a game, trivia on the event theme, or information. There was even a huge waterslide for the participants to have fun with. In addition, Frank Chargualaf and his praise




