An Interview with Fr. Paulson

We would like to give our parishioners a little information about your background; where were you born and where did you grow up?

I was born in the Southern part of India and at the age of fifteen I moved to the North-Eastern part of India, right at the foothills of the Himalayas until I was thirty-five. For more on my background please visit our St. Mary Parish website: http://stmary-wc.org.

I am the seventh of nine children, seven boys and two girls. My parents have passed on now but they are very proud of us. I have a brother who is also a priest, who is the principal of a high school in India and is currently leading a group of students on exchange to California.

What type of schooling did you attend?

I attended Salesian Schools all the way through college where I earned my bachelor's degree. Also I earned my MBA in Human Resources and finally my doctorate in Education Administration.

What do you like to do in your leisure time?

I really enjoy hiking. I climb a 14K every year. I climbed places like Mt. Whittney, Mt. Shasta and Mt. Diablo. Other than that, I like to read everything.

What is your favorite kind of foods?

I eat all kinds of food and like pretty much everything. I do like Italian and also like Filipino food, especially bangus, or commonly known as milkfish.

Name someone you admire.

That would have to be Mother Theresa. I met with her many times and I have been to her tomb twice. I also had said Mass for some of her sisters.

How did you know you wanted to be a priest?

Funny thing happened, I woke up one day and I had a Roman Collar on. No, I am just kidding. I guess, when I was young, I was an altar server, I think that was what sparked my interest to be a priest. I always had the desire and when I would speak about it to my parents they took me to a Don Bosco School in the eighth grade. My brother and I left home to become priests on the same day...he went to the Carmelite order and I to the Salesians.

What do you think is the biggest challenge facing our church to-day?

I think the church is fighting materialism and to some great extent a sense of relativism among people. Also, I think the church isn't doing enough for the young people as far as spiritual development and faith formation. Furthermore, I think the church also has yet to find its voice in the context through current issues.

Sunday Reflection

Fr. John M. Mbinda

May 17, 2009: Sixth Sunday of Easter, Year B

Readings: Acts 10:25-26, 34-35, 44-48; 1John 4:7-10; John 15:9-17

First Reading: Acts of the Apostles 10:25-26, 34-35, 44-48

This passage is a brief summary of the whole of chapter ten. Peter's visit to Cornelius and his subsequent conversion marks a turning point in the attitude of the early Christian community. God himself demonstrates that salvation is for all, Jews and Gentiles. By God's gift of the Spirit independent of the decision of the apostles, God forces them to recognize in act (rather than merely in theory) the basic equality of all peoples in the face of God's love and call.

Responsorial Psalm: Psalm 98:1, 2-3, 3-4

Psalm 98 reinforces the message of the first reading, that God's love is universal, and that he chose a particular people in order to make possible his salvation for all peoples. Response: "The Lord has revealed to the nations his saving power."

Second Reading: 1 John 4:7-10

God's love is not something we can earn or deserve. God's love for us is the starting point. God has loved us first overwhelmingly. Thus our motive for loving one another is not done in order to gain God's favor. We love because God has already loved us without our meriting it and without preconditions.

Gospel: John 15:9-17

This passage continues the theme of union with Christ begun in last Sunday's Gospel. Here Jesus draws out the implications of "living in him." The most profound spiritual activity is love, which seeks full union with the beloved. And if love is true, the lover becomes transformed into the beloved in a way that in some sense they are no longer two but one. The test of love is obedience (faithfulness). To keep God's commandments is to show clearly that a person loves Christ. Love leads a person to sacrifice a personal point of view and put oneself confidently into the will of the other without any pre-conditions. Jesus himself has done this by conforming himself to the will of the Father; and by becoming a human being like us in all things except sin. He has died on the cross for us and rose to show us how much he loves us. Jesus now commands that we too love one another in a genuine manner.

What are some of your hopes for the future? For your parish or for your personal ambitions?

For my parish, I hope to see a finished grotto honoring Mother Mary. It should be completed because before I left, it was near completion. 

Progress On The Parish Hall



Dear Parishioners of St. Joseph's Hilo,

Aloha from your forty plus member Parish Hall Team and in particular the nine members of your Implementation Sub-Team. When your TEAM last provided you the parishioners with a progress report we informed you that we had received permission from the Diocesan Planning and Building Committee to proceed with the complex process of selecting the Architectural Firm for our parish and to proceed and complete the Design/Schematic phase of the Architectural Contract for the new Parish Hall before having to represent to the Diocesan Planning and Building Committee.

In our last status report we also related that aside from the complexities of the selection process the end results (that is after your Implementation TEAM completed their process and reached a consensus on the recommended selection) the recommended selection would then have to pass the "smell test" with both the Pastor and the Parish Finance Council before the Pastor could sign off and then the contract would be forwarded to the Diocese for legal review and the ultimate requirement of the Bishop's signature.

In that the Architectural Contract to be signed is a contract designed exclusively by the Diocesan Attorneys and the changes thereto are minor we have been told by Mr. Vince Vernay, Facilities Service Manager of the Diocese, that we can expect a turnaround time in Honolulu (both for the legal review and Bishop's review and signature) of approximately five (5) days. Further, in an ongoing effort to expedite the complete execution of this Architectural Contract before Fr. Tom is transferred, our Parish Finance Council has agreed to modify their normal monthly meeting with an emergency meeting for this purpose if necessary. To facilitate this accommodation we have invited the entire Finance Council to sit in on our Implementation Sub Team meetings so that they are well versed in the process and thus expedite the approval of this all important step forward in the Parish Hall process.

Your Implementation Team received the names of ten different Architectural Firms pre-approved by the Diocese and proceeded to prepare and submit a "Request for Proposal" (RFP) to nine of the ten firms (one had already been received). The "RFP's" were sent to nine-firms in late February and the nine firms were given approximately forty-five days in which to conduct their "due diligence" and respond to our arbitrary deadline of April 15th. Of the nine "RFP's" we sent out we received back only four (4) plus the one we already had in our possession we ended up with a total of five respondents.

You're Pastor, Business Manager, Diocesan Vicariate Representative of the "DPBC," and Implementation Team, along with approximately a dozen or so other interested parishioners met on April 21 to discuss the results of the various proposals ("RFP's") and narrowed down the number of "RFP's" to the top three contenders. At that meeting the Implementation Team directed this author to seek clarification of numerous points from the top three bidders. Some members of the parish who attended the meeting raised the concern that we were about to spend such a large chunk of our available Parish Hall funds on designating an architectural firm before we had raised all of the money required for the project.

This very valid concern was (paraphrased) that the Parish not end up with a set of construction plans put on a shelf after having spent substantial sums of money and not be able to build the project for a lack of the necessary funds to complete the project. In other words we do not want to repeat the 1997 fiasco. After dialoguing over this point it was decided that we would attempt to incorporate a couple of unique provisions within the scope of services that would help alleviate these valid concerns. First we included in the addendum to the "RFP's" mentioned above a proviso that the three architectural firms left

standing provide us with a three year contract and that we only pay "as we go" for each of the phases of the contract during that three years. For instance, hypothetically if we complete the design/schematic component of the Architectural Contract and collectively feel that we need to take a breath until we raise more money then we have the right to do so, at least at different phases up to a limit of three years. This is important because it gives us some breathing room if required **even though we sincerely hope it is not required.**

Second, we agreed that the entire parish as well as the TEAM needs to focus and pray with all our hearts for the generosity of our parishioners both in the weekly collections as well as in the upcoming "Diocesan Capital Campaign" so that we can complete the parish hall in a timely fashion. As you know we came together as community and we were able to pay off the new parcel of land to the tune of \$500,000.00 in record time and we are praying and hoping for a repeat performance from all of our parishioners in this instance. The TEAM agreed that when the proverbial "rubber meets the road" our parish has a long history of coming through in a pinch when needed and we should not expect anything less in this long overdue project. We are a faith based community of believers and now we need to believe with all our hearts and pray, pray, pray as never before.

Of the top three architectural firms who we sent a request for an addendum only two responded to our request for an Addendum to the initial "RFP": 1. "Lively and Associates" a Honolulu firm who has a well established and respected record with our Diocese and 2. "BCDM" a national architectural firm specializing in Catholic Church properties (including but not limited to Churches, Schools, Parish Hall's etc), "BCDM" has an extensive résumé of Catholic Church projects throughout 22 states and is currently participating in the bidding process for five major Diocesan projects which total in the millions of dollars. This provides our parish with a very unique and beneficial opportunity for our parish hall. We find ourselves in the unique position of being used to break into the overall Diocesan marketplace which for all intent and purpose is by our reckoning a real coup d'état for our parish as we are the direct beneficiaries of this strategic marketing plan by "BCDM." If we fail to raise the required funds in a reasonably prompt manner, we can reasonably predict this clear and present benefit will dissipate on an expediential basis commensurate with the absence of a sufficient flow of funds.

The selection of the Architectural firm is not a matter of only which firm has the lowest costs, albeit cost is a major consideration. We also have to evaluate and carefully weigh the philosophical and theological compatibility, the particular firms experience, qualifications, record of achievement,

credibility, and several other important pre-qualifications.

At the Implementation Sub-TEAM meeting of Thursday, May 7th your implementation Sub-TEAM with one dissenting vote elected to recommend to our Pastor and Parish Finance Council the selection of "BCDM" as our preferred architect.

For those interested in the costs the bid price for "BCDM" was the lowest of all nine presenters at a total of \$150,000.00 for the same scope of work bid on by all other presenters. The next lowest was "Lively and Associates" whose bid was \$251,000.00 with the possibility of a reduction of some \$30,000.00 if we did not require any further design work which is considered by this author as improbable. In a best case scenario, the difference in the two bids is some \$71,000.00 and that is only if we make no changes to the design work done by our Parish Hall TEAM under the leadership of Kealii Beck. Absent that consideration the differences rises to some \$101,000.00 between the top two contenders.

It is important to reiterate that the Architectural Contract includes i) architectural services (i.e. design/schematics, construction plans, construction administrations, etc); ii) Mechanical Engineering Services; iii) Electrical Engineering Services; iv) Structural Engineering Services; v) Civil Engineering Services; vi) Landscape Architect; vii) Kitchen Consultant. The scope of the Architectural Contract does not include

topographic studies (Note: we are truly blessed in that our brother parishioner Mr. Ronaldo Aurelio has generously volunteered his time and talent and professional qualifications once again and agreed to undertake this topographic study at no cost to the parish, please take the time to express your individual appreciation when you see Ronaldo). Further, the soil study is a separate function and will have to be done by the Parish in the immediate future and will be an additional cost which is unknown at this writing.

Your Implementation Sub-TEAM is comprised of the following parishioners: Ronaldo Aurelio, Larry Capellas, Don Coloma, Richard Hudak, Sal and Joy Panem, Lei Shinoda, John Tolmie and Dick **Troelstrup.** Once again these men and women have given their considerable time and talents to help our entire parish to enable us to move forward as community and through the dedication of these and many more like them we can in time hopefully fully restore the "fullness of community" just as is depicted in the "Acts of the Apostles." These men and women identified above have come to understand that the Parish hall is much more than a mere building in which to host Wedding, Baptismal, Bereavement, and First Communion gatherings or just a place for the dozens of ministries to meet, plan, study, and learn. The parish hall is the beginning of community and a place where we can come together in formation of community to build a vibrant and exciting parish and to fully participate in the Bishop's Diocesan Road Map.

Note: Our last parish census shows that 1,179 adults and 177 children attend mass each weekend. Yet if you were to add up every single parishioner who participates in the many lay ministries within our parish (whether that be PPAC, Finance Council, the Parish Hall Team,

Home Communion, Hospital Communion, or one of our many Lay Liturgical and outreach Ministries) you would most probably be hard pressed to come up with more than 150 names. Many of our Parishioners are doing two or three or even more ministries to help carry the load.

What does this have to do with a Parish Hall? It means that the full exposure to our "Parish Community" for a full 88% of our parishioners is severely limited to just a 45 minute presence in the Church each week, which provides no true understanding of the truly Christian efforts and dedications it takes to run our various parish ministries and that is simply not the way the community Christ Jesus tells us we are called to, is or can be formed and nourished. It also means that only 12% of our parishioners are carrying the whole load of lay ministries which becomes very heavy at times and often leads to exhaustion and burn out. I humbly ask that each of our parishioners prayerfully consider the undeniable conclusions submitted by these statistics and to pray over them and then reevaluate the importance of completing this Parish Hall project in that light.

I have publically said often to anyone who asked, I have no doubt whatsoever that our parish will come together in this project and make it happen and it will happen soon. As Bishop Larry recently told me -PRAY, PRAY!




