

#### Not Escape, but Salvation

"I have been crucified with Christ; yet I live, no longer I, but Christ lives in me; insofar as I now live in the flesh, I live by faith in the Son of God who has loved me and given himself up for me." (Gal 2:19-20)

I once overheard a discussion among some highly educated and widely read and traveled men. They were excitedly discussing the progress of humanity toward its goal, which, they agreed, was autonomy. They pointed out, happily, that with advances in technology, the human person was ever less required to rely on others. Technology, they hoped, would allow a person to fulfill even his affective and reproductive needs without involving himself in messy relationships. Are they wrong? Due to sin, weakness, and madness, a relationship can apparently require giving up what we want, suppressing with violence, open or subtle, our identity. And so we seek autonomy. But is that what we want? To be alone? Could that ever be happiness, even with wonderful technology?

Saint Paul shows how it is only through faith in Christ that personal connectedness and individual identity can be saved. It is the opposite of autonomy. "I have been crucified with Christ. I live, no longer I, but Christ lives in me." The presence of the other, this particular other, Jesus Christ, does not suppress Paul's identity but *saves* it. How? Because Christ is what he wants, and how else do we know who we are, except by discovering what we truly want. Why is Jesus what he wants? "I live by faith in the Son of God who has loved me and given himself up for me." Isn't this what we all want? To be perfectly loved so that the other even gives himself up for us? Recognizing in faith the presence of the one loving him is Paul's very identity. Because this presence shows him what he wants, it also shows him who he is. But, as Saint Paul points out, it comes through crucifixion. It comes, that is, through our wounded relationships. Our crucified relationships are the place where our identity will be saved, by recognizing through faith the one loving us. Let us not seek escape, but beg for salvation.

#### **Sunday Reflection**

#### June 7, 2009: The Most Holy Trinity Sunday, Year B

Readings: Deut 4:32-34, 39-40; Rom 8:14-17; Mat 28:16-20

#### First Reading: Deuteronomy 4:32-34, 39-40

Moses' exhortation here serves as a preamble to the Jewish law. The law was not simply a set of rules to be obeyed for good order, nor, as later tradition distorted it, a necessary condition for pleasing God. The law was the constitution of the people God had chosen as his own. Observance of the law was the way of life that corresponded to the covenant. Thus Jesus, by establishing the new covenant, did not so much replace the law as fulfill it.

#### Responsorial Psalm: Psalm 33:4-5, 6, 9, 18-19, 20, 22

Psalm 33 praises God's past works and acknowledges that he still works to save his people. Response: "Happy the people the Lord has chosen to be his own."

#### Second Reading: Romans 8:14-17

This passage sums up the meaning of the Trinity for us. It refers to our right to make the prayer of Jesus our own, since we have received a Spirit of adoption, through whom we can cry to God as Father. But union with the Trinity does not happen automatically. Our union with the Triune God makes us Children of God and co-heirs with Christ. Paul concluded that if that is the case, then we must suffer with Christ so that we may be glorified with him.

#### Gospel: Matthew 28:16-20

Jesus as risen Lord, the focal point of the renewal of all creation (v 18) sends his disciples forth on the mission that sums up the entire purpose of the Church: to make disciples of all nations. "Baptism in the name of" someone signifies belonging — immersion of one's own reality into that person's reality. Thus the Christian belongs to the Trinity, united to the Son as a child of the Father, a union accomplished and vivified by the Holy Spirit. The new covenant of Jesus is not merely a new set of laws, but a totally new way of life, founded on his continued presence. The life and activity of the Church continues (or should continue) to display and to witness the living Jesus to the world.




## Big Island Young Adult Connection 2009—Pahala

About thirty young adults of the Big Island gathered at the Pahala Plantation Cottages this past Pentecost weekend for the annual Big Island Young Adult Connection retreat. The theme for this retreat was "Where he leads, we will follow". Presenters from Oahu and from Hilo came to speak on topics such as Abortion and Respect for Life; Single Life as a Vocation; Marriage and Family; the Importance of Prayer; Answering the Call to Consecrated Life and Chastity and the Respect for the Human Body.

Frank Chargualaf, from St. Theresa on the Island of Maui, brought his praise and worship team to Pahala. Each member of the team gave a testimony to the power and grace they receive from praising and worshiping God. One young adult shared, "It is more than just singing. It is praying to Him through these songs."

Dominic Olaso from Holy Trinity on Oahu spoke about having passion for life. He spoke about the concept of the "Unholy Trinity" also known as "Me, Myself and I". Dominic outlined ways to break the hold of this self-centered focus and turn to the true majesty of our God. We must trust in His mercy and forgiveness and know that when we come to God, we are healed, fed, cleansed and then we are empowered to show that same love and mercy to others. Finally, Dominic shared how he came to help with the Pro-Life Movement. "Our ministry efforts are not only about saving souls but we are also called to save lives".

A young adult from St. Elizabeth Church on Oahu briefly spoke about the wonder and joy he feels coming from the vocation of a single person. The presenter said, "Don't stress out looking for someone to love. Love God and serve Him—God will send your special someone when the time is right. Finally, instead of spending so much time and effort looking for the right person to love, turn your actions to becoming that right person".

Sister Lusika and Sister Lisa gave witness to God's call to the consecrated life. The Sisters said, "You don't choose the work you do for God. The Lord chooses the kind of work He wants you to do." They both shared that it was God speaking to them through their fathers who loves them both so much. Both fathers knew their daughters were being called by God and both gave their blessings and encouraged their daughters to answer God's call.

Mason and Teo Matsuda led an inspiring presentation that illustrated how much God loved them and how He selected Mason and Teo for each other. They shared personal stories about the trials and tribulations that tested their relationship and how they are now blessed beyond measure because of their constant service and faithful prayer to God Mason and Teo live by this motto, "A family that prays together stays together".

Finally, the young adults heard about respect for the human body by Deb and Gary Callahan. They spoke about where the church stands on using contraceptive methods. Aunty and Uncle also shared how young people can change their mentality about being chaste. They said, "God gave us our bodies to be respected. It is our choice to live a life of holiness and chastity. This choice is a gift not a curse. We should always live our lives to honor and glorify God, especially in our choices".

The Holy Spirit truly descended on this retreat. His presence could be felt in the flow of the presentations and could be seen in the eyes of those who opened their hearts to it. The power of the Spirit was evident in the young people who came to receive God's gift of love. Msngr. Ted Mercado said in his homily, "The Holy Spirit was sent to help us live out our mission as Jesus taught us. The disciples described his presence as dynamic just like dynamite. Allow the Holy Spirit it to rock, rattle and roll you just as it did God's first disciples."
