

Frequently Asked Questions on Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament

What happens as we contemplate the presence of Christ in the Blessed Sacrament?

Answer: When we contemplate Christ present in the Blessed Sacrament we are given the opportunity to thank Him for his passion, death, and glorious resurrection, the marvelous saving act that brought about our redemption. Christ draws near to us, more intimate with us than we are with ourselves. He strengthens our share in his divine life, the life that transforms us into his likeness and, in the Spirit, he gives us access to the Father. As Pope John Paul II reflected in his encyclical letter: "It is pleasant to spend time with him, to lie close to his breast like the Beloved Disciple (cf. Jn 13:25) and to feel the infinite love present in his heart. If in our time Christians must be distinguished above all by the "art of prayer," how can we not feel a renewed need to spend time in spiritual converse, in silent adoration, in heartfelt love before Christ present in the Most Holy Sacrament? How often, dear brothers and sisters, have I experienced this, and drawn from it strength, consolation, and support!"

### **Sunday Reflection:**

### August 16, 2009: 20th Sunday in Ordinary Time (B)

Prv 9:1-6; Ps 34:2-3, 10-11, 12-13, 14-15; Eph 5:15-20; Jn 6:51-58

The hectic pace of modern life often makes mealtimes a hurried event—lunch at one's desk or fast food eaten on the run, meals worked around the soccer games, with one or more family members absent. Only at big family celebrations like Thanksgiving, anniversaries, or perhaps a summertime picnic, does our meal-sharing bring us together to nourish our spirits and strengthen our relationships.

Today we continue our five-week look at the sixth chapter of John, where Jesus is portrayed as the "Bread of Life." In this Sunday's Gospel, Jesus' words, "whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood," parallels "This is my body..., this is my blood," found in the other three Gospels to mark the Last Supper institution of the Eucharist.

Recalling what happens when we share a special meal together in various settings *outside of Mass* can help us understand the Eucharist. In any of our special meals, we begin with a time of gathering. We catch up on news and tell stories. We share the meal and then take our leave, promising to keep in touch. At Mass, we do the same: gather, tell stories of faith, share a sacred meal, and are commissioned to go forth.

As we continue doing what Christians have done for 2,000 years in memory of Jesus, let us resolve to grow in our appreciation of this great mystery of faith.

# CONGREGATION OF THE BLESSED SACRAMENT Saint Peter Julian Eymard

#### **THE EARLY YEARS 1811-1839**

Like all of us, Peter Julian Eymard [pronounced A -mard] was conditioned by his cultural background as well as by the sociopolitical milieu of his time. Life in France during the first half of the nineteenth century forms the backdrop against which to view the gradual unfolding of Peter Julian's life story.

Years earlier, the French Revolution of 1789 had radically altered the political, legal, social, and religious structures of the country. As a teenager, the industrial revolution was changing the face of Europe. As a young man Eymard witnessed the dawning of the Age of Romanticism in art, music, and literature.

Peter Julian Eymard's road to the priesthood, as well as his life as a priest, was marked by the cross. In French society, there was a strong anticlericalism. In addition, the Eymard family was poor and Peter Julian's father was reluctant to give his blessing to his son's choice of career. His first attempt to attain priesthood ended because of serious illness. He tried again. On July 20, 1834, at 23 years of age, Eymard was ordained a priest for the Diocese of Grenoble.

In Eymard's day there was a religious movement called Jansenism. This movement focused on the gravity of human sinfulness and as a consequence stressed our unworthiness in the presence of a transcendent and perfect Divinity. In his early years as a seminarian and priest, Fr. Eymard was influenced by this reparation spirituality and he would struggle his whole life long to seek that inner perfection that would enable him to offer to God the gift of his entire self.

Perhaps it was the intensification of this growing spiritual struggle along with Fr. Eymard's desire to accomplish great things for God that led him to enter religious life. On August 20, 1839, Fr. Eymard became a member of the Marist Congregation by professing the vows of poverty, chastity, and obedience.

### **About Vocation**

### What is a vocation?

The word vocation comes from the Latin word "vocare" which means "to call." Throughout history, God has called his people. As members of God's people, we believe he calls us too. God made us and He knows why He did so. God has a plan for our lives. His plan is our vocation. For some, that vocation means marriage, for others it's in priesthood and religious life, for still others through the single life. But for all of us our vocation is to live as God desires us to live, to be holy.

### How do I know what my vocation is?

Knowing one's vocation is a process of discovery. We discover our vocation as we come to learn more about God, about ourselves and about others. As we come to know God through our prayer, the sacraments and our living of our Christian life, we come to hear his call. We learn to hear his voice and what he is inviting us to do.

As we come to know ourselves, discovering our gifts and talents, our likes and dislikes, we come to find particular desires in our heart. A desire for a family may point to a vocation to Marriage. A desire for service and ministry may point to a vocation to Priesthood or Religious Life.

Finally, as we grow in our relationship with others, we begin to find our vocation. Often other people serve as "mirrors" to us. They help us to see ourselves, our gifts and talents. People may ask us, "Did you ever think about becoming a priest?" Such a question can help serve as a great consideration to one who is discerning.

### The Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary

"All-powerful and ever-living God: You raised the sinless Virgin Mary, mother of your Son, body & soul, to the glory of heaven. May we see heaven as our final goal and come to share her glory."

The Assumption is the oldest feast day of Our Lady, but we don't know how it first came to be celebrated. Its origin is lost in those days when Jerusalem was restored as a sacred city, at the time of the Roman Emperor Constantine (c.285-337).

After the building of the Church of the Holy Sepulchre in 336, the sacred sites began to be restored and memories of the life of Our Lord began to be celebrated by the people of Jerusalem. One of the memories about his mother centered around the "Tomb of Mary," close to Mount Zion, where the early Christian community had lived.

On the hill itself was the "Place of Dormition," the spot of Mary's "falling asleep," where she had died. The "Tomb of Mary" was where she was buried.

At this time, the "Memory of Mary" was marked only in Palestine, but then it was extended by the emperor to all the churches of the East. In the seventh century, it began to be celebrated in Rome under the title of the "Falling Asleep" ("Dormitio") of the Mother of God. Soon the name was changed to the "Assumption of Mary," since there was more to the feast than her dying. It also proclaimed that she had been taken up, body and soul, into heaven.

That belief was ancient, dating back to the apostles themselves. What was clear from the beginning was that there were no relics of Mary to be venerated, and that an empty tomb stood on the edge of Jerusalem near the site of her death. That location also soon became a place of pilgrimage. (Today, the Benedictine Abbey of the Dormition of Mary stands on the spot)

At the Council of Chalcedon in 451, when bishops from throughout the Mediterranean world gathered in Constantinople, Emperor Marcian asked the Patriarch of Jerusalem to bring the relics of Mary to Constantinople to be enshrined in the capitol. The patriarch explained to the emperor that there were no relics of Mary in Jerusalem, that "Mary had died in the presence of the apostles; but her tomb, when opened later... was found empty and so the apostles concluded that the body was taken up into heaven."

In the eighth century, St. John Damascene was known for giving sermons at the holy places in Jerusalem. At the Tomb of Mary, he expressed the belief of the Church on the meaning of the feast: "Although the body was duly buried, it did not remain in the state of death, neither was it dissolved by decay . . . You were transferred to your heavenly home, O Lady, Queen and Mother of God in truth."

All the feast days of Mary mark the great mysteries of her life and her part in the work of redemption. The central mystery of her life and person is her divine mother-hood, celebrated both at Christmas and a week later (Jan. 1) on the feast of the Solemnity of Mary, Mother of God. The Immaculate Conception (Dec. 8) marks the preparation for that motherhood, so that she had the fullness of grace from the first moment of her existence, completely untouched by sin. Her whole being throbbed with divine life from the very beginning, readying her for the exalted role of mother of the Savior.

The Assumption completes God's work in her since it was not fitting that the flesh that had given life to God himself should even undergo corruption. The Assumption is God's crowning of His work as Mary ends her earthly life and enters eternity. The feast turns our eyes in that direction, where we will follow when our earthly life is over.

The feast days of the Church are not just the commemoration of historical events; they do not look only to the past. They look to the present and to the future and give us an insight into our own relationship with God. The Assumption looks to eternity and gives us hope that we, too, will follow Our Lady when our life is ended.

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
