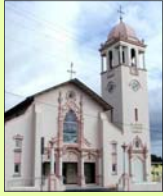

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

This is hypocrisy, about which the Lord reproaches the religious leaders and the teachers of the Law in this Sunday's Gospel.

Let us pray to the Lord for the gift of a simple heart. As we keep his commandments, let not this observance be a reason to look down on others. Faith itself is a gift of God, and we are able to come close to God primarily because of his grace rather than our own personal merits.

Frequently Asked Questions on Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament

QUESTION: What significance does this reservation of the Eucharist have for the life of Catholics?

ANSWERS: "Eucharist is reserved in churches or oratories to serve as the spiritual center of a religious community or a parish community, indeed of the whole church and the whole of humankind, since it contains, beneath the veil of the species, Christ the invisible Head of the church, the redeemer of the world, the center of all hearts, 'by whom we exist.'" "He is in the mist of us day and night, He dwells in us with the fullness of grace and of truth. He raises the level of morals, fosters virtue, comforts the sorrowful, strengthens the weak, and stirs up all those who draw near to Him to imitate Him, so that they may learn from his example to be meek and humble of heart, and to seek not their own interest but those of God."

Sunday Reflection:

August 30, 2009 | 22nd Sunday in Ordinary Time (B)

Dt 4:1-2, 6-8 ; Ps 15:2-3, 3-4, 4-5; Jas 1:17-18, 21b-22, 27; Mk 7:1-8, 14-15, 21-23

Many years ago I took part in a group dynamics exercise. We were told to stand in a circle, join hands, and prevent Joe, outside the group, from breaking into the circle. We did that task well. So well that when Mary, also outside the circle, tried to break in, we kept her out too. The group leader processed the experience for us, reminding us that he'd told us only to keep Joe out. The leader explained that human beings sometimes get so caught up in the details of a system of behavior that they forget its original purpose.

The same thing often can be said for religion. The laws and structures of our religious life, as noted in today's first reading, are an important way we relate to God. But as Jesus points out in the Gospel, when human beings go beyond the original purpose, and burden others with practices the law never intended, then the connection with God is severed. Lip service to external structures and laws can replace a commitment of the heart.

There is a place for law and for structure within our lives as Christians. But we must always keep the purpose in mind. If we center on the person of Jesus Christ, and his law of love, we should have no trouble doing just that.

Scripture

- For what great nation is there that has gods so close to it as the LORD, our God, is to us whenever we call upon him? (Deuteronomy 2:7)
- LORD, who may abide in your tent? Who may dwell on your holy mountain? Whoever walks blamelessly and does justice; who thinks the truth in his heart and slanders not with his tongue. (Psalm 15:1-3)
- Be doers of the word and not hearers only, deluding yourselves. Religion that is pure and undefiled before God and the Father is this: to care for orphans and widows in their affliction and to keep oneself unstained by the world. (James 1:22,27)
- He responded, "Well did Isaiah prophesy about you hypocrites, as it is written: 'This people honors me with their lips, but their hearts are far from me; In vain do they worship me, teaching as doctrines human precepts.' You disregard God's commandment but cling to human tradition." (Mark 7:6-8)

Reflection

- "Who may dwell on (God's) holy mountain?"
- How close is God "to us whenever we call upon him"?
- Who is a "doer of the word"?
- Does Jesus quote Isaiah to indicate he is more concerned with actions than observing the letter of the law?

It is impossible to pray to a personal God—that is, love a personal God—and remain indifferent to your suffering brethren. It is impossible. Anyone who prays without suffering for his suffering brothers is praying to a pole, a shadow, not to the living God. Because if you pray to the living God, you who are living, he, the Living One, sends you to your living brothers and sisters.¹

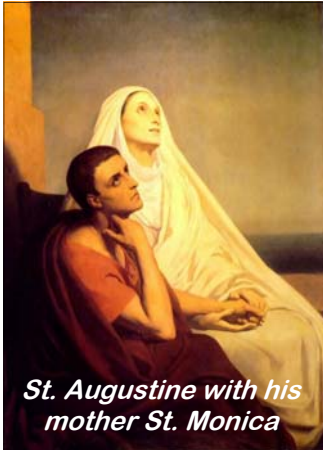

"Pray as though everything depended on God. Work as though everything depended on you."

St. Augustine

St. Augustine (354-430)

A Christian at 33, a priest at 36, a bishop at 41: many people are familiar with the biographical sketch of Augustine of Hippo, sinner turned saint. But really to get to know the man is a rewarding experience.

There quickly surfaces the intensity with which he lived his life, whether his path led away from or toward God. The tears of his mother, the instructions of Ambrose and, most of all, God himself speaking to him in the Scriptures redirected Augustine's love of life to a life of love.

Having been so deeply immersed in creature-pride of life in his early days and having drunk deeply of its bitter dregs, it is not surprising that Augustine should have turned, with a holy fierceness, against the many demon-thrusts rampant in his day. His times were truly decadent—politically, socially, morally. He was both feared and loved, like the Master. The perennial criticism leveled against him: a fundamental rigorism.

In his day, he providentially fulfilled the office of prophet. Like Jeremiah and other greats, he was hard-pressed but could not keep quiet. "I say to myself, I will not mention him, I will speak in his name no more. But then it becomes like fire burning in my heart, imprisoned in my bones; I grow weary holding it in, I cannot endure it" (Jeremiah 20:9).



Q & A ABOUT VOCATIONS

QUESTION: "I know a lot of guys that I think are holier than me. Could I still have a vocation to the priesthood?"

ANSWER: Yes. God's call, as evidenced in the Scripture, is not based on our holiness. Rather, his call is for our holiness. God calls us not because we are holy, but he calls us to make us holy. We see that this is what God did with all the Saints (i.e. Peter, Paul and Augustine) and he does so with us. Therefore, the main question is not who is more holy than I, but rather, how is it that I am called to be holy. For some, that being made holy comes through the gift of being a priest.

QUESTION: "I think God's calling me to the priesthood but sometimes I feel attracted to girls."

ANSWER: Attraction to girls is a normal thing and is not an obstacle to the priesthood. But like all of our attractions, we need to learn how to direct them properly. Our attractions are not obstacles but they can become obstacles if we allow them. A husband for instance, even though he is married, may be attracted to other women. This can be an obstacle to his marriage. As men, we need to learn how to love and respect women properly. This comes in time and with God's help. The virtue that helps us here is Chastity. As a priest, a man's wife is the Church. He must be faithful to her, and he must love her as Jesus did. With this in mind, the priest's attractions are directed accordingly.

Beheading of John the Baptist

The drunken oath of a king with a shallow sense of honor, a seductive dance and the hateful heart of a queen combined to bring about the martyrdom of John the Baptist. The greatest of prophets suffered the fate of so many Old Testament prophets before him: rejection and martyrdom. The “voice crying in the desert” did not hesitate to accuse the guilty, did not hesitate to speak the truth. But why? What possesses a man that he would give up his very life?

This great religious reformer was sent by God to prepare the people for the Messiah. His vocation was one of selfless giving. The only power that he claimed was the Spirit of Yahweh. “I am baptizing you with water, for repentance, but the one who is coming after me is mightier than I. I am not worthy to carry his sandals. He will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and fire” (Matthew 3:11). Scripture tells us that many people followed John looking to him for hope, perhaps in anticipation of some great messianic power. John never allowed himself the false honor of receiving these people for his own glory. He knew his calling was one of preparation. When the time came, he led his disciples to Jesus: “The next day John was there again with two of his disciples, and as he watched Jesus walk by, he said, ‘Behold, the Lamb of God.’ The two disciples heard what he said



and followed Jesus” (John 1:35-37). It is John the Baptist who has pointed the way to Christ. John’s life and death were a giving over of self for God and other people. His simple style of life was one of complete detachment from earthly possessions. His heart was centered on God and the call that he heard from the Spirit of God speaking to his heart. Confident of God’s grace, he had the courage to speak words of condemnation or repentance, of salvation.

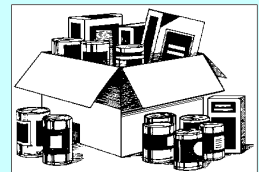


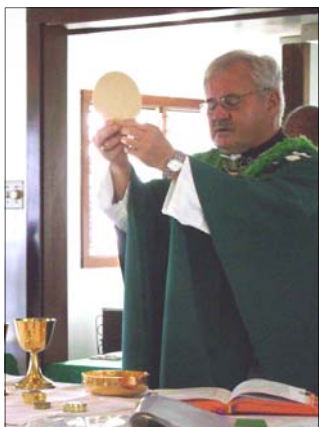

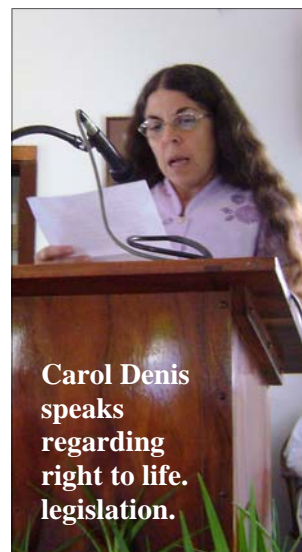
Dear Malia Parishioners,

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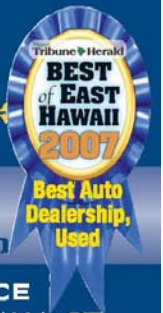
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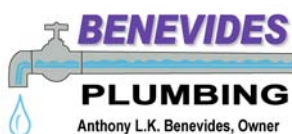
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
