

Frequently Asked Questions on Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament

Question: Should priests encourage the faithful to pray before the Blessed Sacrament?

Answer: .

Pope Paul VI urged that the faithful "should not forget about paying a visit during the day to the Most Blessed Sacrament in the very special place of honor where it is reserved in churches in keeping with the liturgical laws, since this is a proof of gratitude and a pledge of love and a display of the adoration that is owed to Christ the Lord who is present there. Pastors should see that churches and public oratories where, according to law, the holy Eucharist is reserved, are open every day at least for some hours, at a convenient time, so that the faithful may easily pray in the presence of the Blessed Sacrament."

September 13, 2009 | 24th Sunday in Ordinary Time (B)

Is 50:4-9; Ps 116:1-2, 3-4, 5-6, 8-9; Jas 2:14-18; Mk 8:27-35

In the 1930s, a young writer in New York City was struggling to publish a novel. As World War II broke out in Europe, he looked into his own heart as well as the headlines and produced a soul-searching examination of human violence and war. Unfortunately, his novel remained unpublished for years.

The author? Thomas Merton, the most prominent Catholic author of the twentieth century. His wartime novel, My Argument with the Gestapo, was finally published years after Merton became a Trappist monk and had written many spiritual books.

Merton's insight into war and peace are echoed in today's second reading from the Letter of James. There, the author explores where wars and conflicts originate. He tells us that violence starts from within the human heart. But from God comes the possibility of peace.

Jesus offers us the way to peace in the Gospel today, inviting us to put ourselves last, as servants. Let us "cultivate peace" in our hearts, our communities, our world.

But notwithstanding all this variety, there is a proportionately common element, the norm of which is given in Christ. All are held to self-abnegation, humble service, generosity towards the needy, and patience in adversity.

St. Peter Claver

(1581-1654)

A native of Spain, young Jesuit Peter Claver left his homeland forever in 1610 to be a missionary in the colonies of the New World. He sailed into Cartagena (now in Colombia), a rich port city washed by the Caribbean. He was ordained there in 1615.



By this time the slave trade

had been established in the Americas for nearly 100 years, and Cartagena was a chief center for it. Ten thousand slaves poured into the port each year after crossing the Atlantic from West Africa under conditions so foul and inhuman that an estimated one-third of the passengers died in transit. Although the practice of slave-trading was condemned by Pope Paul III and later labeled "supreme villainy" by Pius IX, it continued to flourish.

Peter Claver's predecessor, Jesuit Father Alfonso de Sandoval, had devoted himself to the service of the slaves for 40 years before Claver arrived to continue his work, declaring himself "the slave of the Negroes forever."

As soon as a slave ship entered the port, Peter Claver moved into its infested hold to minister to the ill-treated and exhausted passengers. After the slaves were herded out of the ship like chained animals and shut up in nearby yards to be gazed at by the crowds, Claver plunged in among them with medicines, food, bread, brandy, lemons, and tobacco. With the help of interpreters he gave basic instructions and assured his brothers and sisters of their human dignity and God's saving love. During the 40 years of his ministry, Claver instructed and baptized an estimated 300,000 slaves.

His apostolate extended beyond his care for slaves. He became a moral force, indeed, the apostle of Cartagena. He preached in the city square, gave missions to sailors and traders as well as country missions, during which he avoided, when possible, the hospitality of the planters and owners and lodged in the slave quarters instead.

After four years of sickness which forced the saint to remain inactive and largely neglected, he died on September 8, 1654. The city magistrates, who had previously frowned at his solicitude for the black outcasts, ordered that he should be buried at public expense and with great pomp.

He was canonized in 1888, and Pope Leo XIII declared him the worldwide patron of missionary work among black slaves.

Comment: The Holy Spirit's might and power are manifested in the striking decisions and bold actions of Peter Claver. A decision to leave one's homeland never to return reveals a gigantic act of will difficult for us to imagine. Peter's determination to serve forever the most abused, rejected, and lowly of all people is stunningly heroic.

When we measure our lives against such a man's, we become aware of our own barely used potential and of our need to open ourselves more to the jolting power of Jesus' Spirit.

Quote:

Peter Claver understood that concrete service like the distributing of medicine, food, or brandy to his black brothers and sisters could be as effective a communication of the word of God as mere verbal preaching. As Peter Claver often said, "We must speak to them with our hands before we try to speak to them with our lips."



About Seminary

What's seminary life like?

A Seminary life is a life of community. It is a unique environment in which men who are thinking about being priests are gathered together to learn and discern more about their vocation. This discernment takes place through study (there are academic classes) Daily Mass and prayer, service (apostolic/volunteer work) and community life. In coming to know more about God, one another, and the priesthood, the seminarians are able to grow more certain in the plan God is calling them to.

Our Lady of Sorrows September 15

For a while there were two feasts in honor of the Sorrowful Mother: one going back to the 15th century, the other to the 17th century. For a while both were celebrated by the universal Church: one on the Friday before Palm Sunday, the other in September.

The principal biblical references to Mary's sorrows are in Luke 2:35 and John 19:26-27. The Lucan passage is Simeon's prediction about a sword piercing Mary's soul; the Johannine passage relates Jesus' words to Mary and to the beloved disciple.

Many early Church writers interpret the sword as Mary's sorrows, especially as she saw Jesus die on the cross. Thus, the two passages are brought together as prediction and fulfillment.

St. Ambrose (December 7) in particular sees Mary as a sorrowful yet powerful figure at the cross. Mary stood fearlessly at the cross while others fled. Mary looked on her Son's wounds with pity, but saw in them the salvation of the world. As Jesus hung on the cross, Mary did not fear to be killed but offered herself to her persecutors.

Comment:

John's account of Jesus' death is highly symbolic. When Jesus gives the beloved disciple to Mary, we are invited to appreciate Mary's role in the Church: She symbolizes the Church; the beloved disciple represents all believers. As Mary mothered Jesus, she is now mother to all his followers. Furthermore, as Jesus died, he handed over his Spirit. Mary and the Spirit cooperate in begetting new children of God-almost an echo of Luke's account of Jesus' conception. Christians can trust that they will continue to experience the caring presence of Mary and Jesus' Spirit throughout their lives and throughout history.

My Dear Parishioners,

Let me first thank all the Malia and St. Joe parishioners for storming heaven with your prayers, that through the intersession of Mother Marianne Cope I would be healed. While Mother Marianne is taking her time with a full healing, I certainly feel good and have been receiving very positive reports from my doctors. Returning to Hilo is a gift from God, from the Bishop, and from all of you who have welcomed me home. I pray that my health will remain stable enough so that I can remain with you for a long period of time.

While I am returning as a parochial vicar of our common pastor, Fr. Samuel, the Bishop has told me that my principle responsibility will be "the parish priest" of Malia. Fr. Samuel has asked me to function, for all practical purposes, as the pastor of Malia. We have as our goal to decluster Malia from St. Joe's. So while I will assist at St. Joe's as needed, I will mainly be at Malia. This is also in accord with my request of the Bishop. While I dearly loved ministering at both St. Joe's and Malia when I was here last August through January, the busy schedule contributed to "relapse." Both the Bishop and Fr. Samuel have been very understanding and accommodating.

During the next few months there will be more services added to the Malia schedule. We will be looking to add some weekday Masses, a Saturday evening Mass, scheduled Reconciliation Services, and other services expected in a full-service parish. We hope and pray that some of the people who had been part of the Malia parish in the past and have left for various reasons will "come home" and again grace us with their participation.

A humorous tid-bit: Before I left New Jersey to come back to Hilo, the local paper did an article on me relocating (they are hard up for news!). The columnist did a phone interview. When I told him I would be ministering at Malia Puka O Kalani he asked me to spell the Hawaiian words and what they meant. The subsequent published article stated that I would be ministering at MERRY Gate of Heaven. He didn't ask me to spell the English words! (While I hope that we are a joyful community, I prefer to be under the patronage of MARY!)
