





Solemnity of Mary, Mother of God (c) January 1, 2010; Nm 6:22-27; Ps 67:2-3, 5, 6, 8;

Gal 4:4-7 ---: Lk 2:16-21



When I was a boy, my grandmother had a huge nativity set that came from her native Italy. I loved helping her unpack it and set it up each year at Christmas time. The hand-painted figures illustrating the Christmas story were a precious treasure that my grandmother had cherished through the years. There were the usual shepherds and wise men, of course. But there were also figures of people cooking food, playing musical instruments and so on. I remember that each figure was sculpted so in such a way that the character might have been gazing lovingly on the Christ-child—even though there were too many figures to fit them all around the manger!

In today's Gospel, we revisit the familiar scene of Christ's birth, and watch the shepherds coming to find Mary, Joseph and the Infant. Saint Luke, who gives us this infancy story, tells us that Mary "cherished all these things in her heart." For the Gospel writer, Mary symbolizes the model disciple: Throughout her life she listened attentively to God's Word. She cherished it and reflected on its meaning. Her prominent place in the Gospel story leads us to believe that the Church, from its earliest days, recognized how Mary, having given her consent to bear the Word Made Flesh, continued to glorify God in all she did.

Let's imitate Mary, responding to God's love born in us, with all the love and care of a mother who treasures and savors each moment of her child's life, for as long as she lives.

Feast of the **Holy Innocents** December 28

Herod "the Great," king of Judea, was unpopular with his people because of his connections with the Romans and his religious indifference. Hence he was insecure and fearful of any threat to his throne. He was a master politician and a tyrant capable of extreme brutality. He killed his wife, his brother and his sister's two husbands, to name only a few.

Matthew 2:1-18 tells this story: Herod was "greatly troubled" when astrologers from the east came asking the whereabouts of "the newborn king of the


Sunday Reflection:

December 27, 2009 Feast of the Holy Family (C)

Sir 3:2-7, 12-14, Ps 128:1-2, 3, 4-5, Col 3:12-21 or Col 3:12-17, Lk 2:41-52

Hello, I'm Franciscan Father Greg Friedman, with the "Sunday Soundbite" for the Feast of the Holy Family. Scripture scholars tell us that the stories of Jesus' birth and the events surrounding them, can be seen as "the Gospel in miniature." Matthew and Luke have structured these stories so as to anticipate some of their Gospel themes.



The temple itself is a favorite setting for Luke. He's already pictured Zechariah, and Mary and Joseph there, and now he brings Jesus to the temple. Luke's Gospel will conclude with the disciples of Jesus in the temple, praising God.

Mary and Joseph are on a journey to Jerusalem—foreshadowing a similar journey Jesus and his disciples will make. And perhaps most importantly, Jesus' first words describe the urgency he has to be "in my Father's house." The business of the Kingdom has begun, and Jesus must be about it.

In the midst of our Christmas celebrations, we're reminded that there is "the rest of the story," which will culminate in the death and resurrection of Jesus, and the birth of the Church. Along with Mary and Joseph and all who follow him, we have begun the journey.

Jews," whose star they had seen. They were told that the Jewish Scriptures named Bethlehem as the place where the Messiah would be born. Herod cunningly told them to report back to him so that he could also "do him homage." They found Jesus, offered him their gifts and, warned by an angel, avoided Herod on their way home. Jesus escaped to Egypt.

Herod became furious and "ordered the massacre of all the boys in Bethlehem and its vicinity two years old and under." The horror of the massacre and the devastation of the mothers and fathers led Matthew to quote Jeremiah: "A voice was heard in Ramah,/sobbing and loud lamentation;/Rachel weeping for her children..." (Matthew 2:18). Rachel was the wife of Jacob/Israel. She is pictured as weeping at the place where the Israelites were herded together by the conquering Assyrians for their march into captivity.

Comment: The Holy Innocents are few, in comparison to the genocide and abortion of our day. But even if there had been only one, we recognize the greatest treasure God put on the earth—a human person, destined for eternity and graced by Jesus' death and resurrection.

Quote: "Lord, you give us life even before we understand"



`Ahahui Hale O Nā Ali`i O Hawai`i

Each year, on January 1st, the 'Ahahui Hale O Na Ali'i O Hawai'i, celebrates the Anniversary of the birth of HRH Princess Abigail Wahiikaahuula Campbell Kawananakoa on O'ahu, while sister chapters honor her at their respective churches. The Hilo Lodge, Halau O Kalakaua, would like to extend its sincere MAHALO A NUI LOA to St. Joseph Church for allowing us to celebrate her anniversary on this island of Hawai'i at the 9:00 am Sunday mass on January 3, 2010. The Princess' mother church from birth through her passing on April 12, 1945, was Our Lady of Peace Cathedral in downtown Honolulu.



The 'Ahahui Hale O Nā Ali'i O Hawai'i is a benevolent organization of Hawaiian men and women. The organization was founded by the Princess Abigail Wahīika'ahu'ula Kawānanakoa in 1918. Princess Kawānanakoa was the daughter of James Campbell and HRH Abigail Kaihelani Maipinepine of Lahaina, Maui. She married Prince David Kahalepouli Kawānanakoa Pi`ikoi. Princess Kawānanakoa's profound desire was to reach out through the islands and organize a unique society of Hawaiian men and women; to unite and uphold the morale of her people; and to gain deeper respect for each other. Its goals and objectives reflect the Princess' most important desire; "to unite her people into one cause Perpetuality of the Hawaiian Culture," while at the same time helping each other in sickness and in the loss of a loved one.

There are seven [7] lodges in the State Benevolent Society governed by a State Board of Governors of the `Ahahui Hale O Na Ali`i O Hawai`i; on the Big Island we have a chapter in Hilo and Waimea; two chapters on O`ahu and a chapter on each of the islands of Maui, Kaua`i and Moloka`i.



On behalf of the youth and young adults, we would like to wish you a Merry Christmas and a Blessed New Year!


