



May this feast keep us faithful to our baptismal calling as children of our heavenly Father, just as Jesus was faithful to his mission which started at his baptism at the Jordan River.



Sunday Reflection:

Baptism of the Lord (C) January 10, 2010 Is 42:1-4, 6-7 or Is 40:1-5, 9-11, Ps 29:1-2, 3-4, 3, 9-10 ,Acts 10:34-38, Lk 3:15-16, 21-22

It's a cliché, but true, that to finish well depends on making a "good beginning." Hello, I'm Father Greg Friedman, and this is the "Sunday Soundbite" for the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord.

A month or so ago we heard "the beginning of the Gospel of Jesus Christ, the Son of God," proclaimed on the Second Sunday of Advent. Those words sound like a title and, in a way, they are Mark's "title" for his Gospel. All that will follow—from Christ's Baptism to the announcement that he is risen—is, for Mark, the "beginning" of the Good News about Jesus. The continuation of the story is up to us who have received this Good News.

As the liturgical season of Christmas ends today, we begin to reflect on a weekly basis on what it means to live the Good News that Jesus Christ has been revealed as Son of God. Much of our reflection will come from Mark's Gospel.

Today he presents the dramatic scene in the waters of the Jordan River, as Jesus is baptized by John. The Spirit descends on Jesus, and a heavenly voice claims him: "You are my beloved Son; with you I am well pleased." From the Jordan, Jesus will begin a mission of healing and exorcism. Just as the Spirit hovered over the primeval waters at the dawn of Creation described in the Book of Genesis, so now the Spirit is at work in Jesus—and in each of us, become new creations in Christ through our own Baptisms.

Is 62:1-5 Ps 96:1-3, 7-10 Jn 2:1-11 **New Start** New start? Well, why not? The year 2010 is beginning and it is not uncommon to find people reflecting on what has been and, at the same time, looking ahead with the intention to change in

one way or another. Persons may resolve to make personal changes, changes in family life and to try a new approach in various facets of their lives. Christians, who take seriously their following of Jesus, will reassess their lives in the light of the Gospel.

St. John in his First Letter reminisces on his personal encounter with Jesus. He writes, "Something which has existed since the beginning, that we have heard, and we have seen with our own eyes; that we have watched and touched with our hands: the Word, who is life." (1 Jn 1: I-2ft)

John speaks of Jesus, the Word made flesh. The incomparable experience and witness of John to whom Jesus is Son of God, Savior, the One who is Life, the One who is Light. He witnesses to Jesus who is the Way, the Truth, the Life.

In our belief and acceptance of Jesus we not only cling to him but also listen intently to his words since they are the words of life. Love is at the heart of the teaching and actions of Jesus. He solemnly said in response to a question from a lawyer, "You must love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your mind and with all your strength. You must love your neighbor as yourself."

These words of love are central to any new start in Christian living. We ponder these words, we realize ever to quickly that we can always go one step further—there is no end to love. These two commandments are interwoven as John teaches so clearly in his First Letter, "We can be sure that we love God only by keeping his commandments."

John goes further to teach that if we say that we love God and do not love our neighbor, we are liars. Love embraces God and neighbor.

Our new start may well begin in deep silence in the Lord's presence. Who is altogether central in the depths of my heart? Who is special in the depths of my soul as I stand alone before the Lord? Who do I first seek with all my mind and intelligence? Who do I commit myself to without reserve? The questions refer back to the first of the two great commandments. Next we turn our attention to 'Love your neighbor as yourself'. Ask the same questions, do I love my neighbor? The parable of the Good Samaritan (Lk 19: 29-37) may both tell us who is our neighbor and how we are to treat our neighbor. To reflect on this parable is to begin a new way of loving. If it so happens that a person cannot specify how s/he should now live then turn to the Beatitudes (Mt 5: 1-10) as a simple and practical means of how to live out the two great commandments of the Lord.

Christians, who really take to heart the teaching of Jesus, may find the Beatitudes a more direct and easily understood way of fulfilling the great commandments of the Gospel. They point out the principles, the stances, the directions basic to Christian life and inspirational and basic on how to live the Gospel.

God blesses those who depend solely on him. God bless those who are gentle.

God blesses those who are compassionate. God bless those in whom fairness reigns. God blesses those with a forgiving heart.

God blesses those whose hearts belong to him God blesses those who spread peace on earth. God blesses those who stand firm.

These eight challenges for life may be expressed more succinctly as:

- Be trusting
- Be gentle
- Be compassionate
- Be just
- Be merciful
- Be pure of heart
- Be reconcilers
- Be courageous.

The Lord has invited us to a life of heartfelt love for God and our brothers and sisters. The Beatitudes are means of expressing this love in a manner that is both human and divine. Truly a new start for 2010.



As of the writing of this Bulletin, I have not yet received an answer. Also, there is a Novena to Blessed Mother Marianne which customarily starts on January 13th. Due to the fact that I will be gone the week of Jan. 17th (see following article) we will begin the Novena on her Feast day, Saturday, Jan 23rd and end on Sunday, January 30th. I am deeply grateful that you have joined in praying that through the intercession of Mother Marianne I will be cured of leukemia. I ask you to join with me during this week of the Novena. During the Novena, we will celebrate Mass every week day at 5:15.



FR. JOE GONE TO NEW JERSEY

As many of you know, prior to coming to Malia, I started and was in charge of an adolescent substance abuse treatment program in New Jersey, Daytop-NJ. There is a newly elected Governor of New Jersey. He has invited me to do the Benediction at the swearing-in ceremony. His inauguration and swearing-in ceremony is scheduled for Tuesday, Jan 19th. The new Governor is a strong advocate to giving treatment to adolescents rather than putting them in jail. His request for me to do the Benediction is not only a personal honor but also a strong message to all the people of New Jersey. I have accepted the invitation (they also paid for the ticket!). I will be gone from Sunday afternoon, Jan 17th until Friday evening, January 22nd.



BISHOP'S VISIT

Bishop Larry Silva will have an official visitation of the Malia parish the weekend of Jan 30 - 31. He will celebrate the 5:15 pm Mass on Saturday and the 9:00 am Mass on Sunday. He will also celebrate the 4:00 pm Spanish Mass on Sunday afternoon. Following the Saturday evening Mass he will have dinner with the Self -Study Team (the chairs and secretaries of the parish committees and three atlarge parish members).
