

No man serves or honors God by any exterior acts, even how solemn or pious it may appear, unless these acts proceed from an intention and a will to honor, please and love God.


Just like when one asks what part of the Mass they can be late to constitutes a mortal sin. This is looking at the Mass as a mere "obligation". And such attitude is legalistic and immature. The real spirit and right motive behind coming to Mass is to show our dependence on a God whom we honor, respect, and love. Moreover, our Sunday worship of God must overflow into love for our fellow men. To express our love for God at Mass, while remaining indifferent or hating our neighbors, is a contradiction and certainly not the spirit of what participating in the Eucharist means.

And for Christ, love is the fulfillment of the Law. All the laws must be interpreted in the light of the law of love. And our observance of the law must be animated therefore by love.



Saint Valentine of Rome

St. Valentine taught us about the importance of love and the Sacrament of Marriage. He believed in these things to deeply that he was martyred for them near the year 269 AD. He was imprisoned for trying to marry Christian couples. Although we live in different times, where marriage and love is not forbidden to us, we must remember that things weren't always this way. We must remind ourselves that all we have is precious. St. Valentine's day is the perfect opportunity to reflect on what we have been given in love and through love. Celebrating St. Valentine's Day is a tribute to the saint later titled as the Patron Saint of Lovers. His devotion to God and his commitment to supporting love and marriage set a wonderful example for us.

Aggregation of the Blessed Sacrament -Submitted by Fr. Poli Ty, SSS Blessed Sacrament Aggregates

The Aggregation of the Blessed Sacrament is a public, universal and international, association of Christ's faithful affiliated with the religious Institutes founded by St. Peter Julian Eymard – the Congregation of the Blessed Sacrament and the Servants of the Blessed Sacrament – and recognized by the Church.

It stems from the long tradition of our religious families which gave life to a 'public association of lay faithful' in order to share the same Eucharistic spirituality and mission with the laity drawing inspiration from St. Peter Julian Eymard.

Aim: Guided by the *Project of Life*, the Christian vocation of an Aggregate is to give witness to Christ in the midst of our human society and, starting from the Eucharist, source and summit of all Evangelizing, try to permeate evangelically all human realities. Organized on an international, national, and local level, they take active role in the actions of the local Church in fostering solidarity, human dignity and holistic human development. Members of the Aggregation engage in a formation process and make public promises to live their lives centered on the Eucharist.

THE PROJECT OF LIFE

The Project of Life intends to be the rule of life for the members of the Aggregation of the Blessed Sacrament. It lays the foundation of Eucharistic Life for the lay people associated with the Congregation of the Blessed Sacrament and the Servants of the Blessed Sacrament.

It stems from the long tradition of our

religious family, which starting from Fr. Eymard, gave life to a "Public Association of lay faithful" called aggregation of the Blessed Sacrament, in order to share the Eucharistic mission with the laity.

It is offered for all those, who moved by the Holy Spirit, feel themselves as belonging to the one spiritual family which draws inspiration from St. peter Julian Eymard.

MEMBERSHIP

Membership to the Aggregation of the Blessed Sacrament is open to:

- All (male and female) baptized Catholic
- At least 18 years of age
- Living a coherent Christian life
- Free choice and prayerful discern-
- Application is made with the Local * Director of the Aggregates. Once assessed as a suitable candidate, the person is admitted to the formation program.

FORMATION PROGRAM

The formation program of the Aggregation is divided into:

- Initial Formation which is the formation program in preparation for eventual admission as full member of the Aggregation. This period extends to a period of 6 months. At the end of the initial formation, the Rite of Admission is celebrated with the candidate mak- * ing the Promise of Commitment.
- On-going Formation initiatives of formation and meetings arranged for them at the local level. This also include personal formation by study and reflection.

Period of Discernment

- It is also the period of discernment for the candidate in view of the possibility of embracing a Promise of commitment. Discernment involves prayer for guidance from the Holy Spirit and is central part of the candidate's first year formation. Candidates first discern the call to embrace the charism of St. Peter Julian Eymard and to live a fully Eucharistic lifestyle.
- Fidelity to the monthly formation
- Fidelity to participation in the celebration of the Eucharist (Sunday Eucharist) and daily personal prayer – mediation on the word of God
- Growing desire and providing time for adoration of the blessed sacrament (at least an hour of adoration every week.)
- Involvement in church or community service
- Personal readings on the life and works of Fr. Eymard.

The Importance of Music and Singing

Music that blends both spiritual and artistic excellence, is liturgical – it is sacred. Such music has the ability to <u>cultivate</u>, <u>strengthen</u>, and <u>deepen</u> the spiritual experience of those gathered for worship. The musi-

cal tradition of the Church is a treasure of immeasurable value.

Sacred music imparts spiritual truth to one's mind, heart, and soul. It displays a dimension of meaning and feeling that mere words cannot. Music makes prayer more pleasing, promotes a sense of congregational unity, and confers greater solemnity upon the sacred rites. When deciding which parts of the Mass are to be sung, preference is given to those which are more important, especially those which the priest, one of his assistants, or a cantor is to sing in alternation with the people, or which all are to sing together.

Singing is an expression of joy. In Colossians 3:16, St. Paul exhorts the faithful assembled in expectation of their Lord's return to sing together. He says, "Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly..., singing psalms, hymns, and spiritual songs with gratitude in your hearts to God." Our relationship with God is one of love, and whether we sing loudly or softly, on pitch or out of tune, sing! St. Augustine very rightly says that, "it is natural for a lover to sing." We might also remember the ancient proverb that tells us "those who sing pray twice." So sing your praise, your love song, to God – He will surely be pleased.

Lector Ministry | **John 1:1-5**

During the Mass, God speaks to His people, gathered at a particular time and place. For each of us gathered to hear his Word, each will hear the message uniquely, as the Holy Spirit touches each soul. It is a miracle of transformation. To work this miracle, God has chosen instruments: He uses LECTORS. When a lector reads the scripture, it is as if the book disappears. The lector is the mouthpiece of God. God uses the voice of the lector to say something modern. Even as the words are old, the proclamation is always new.

Lectors understand the mission of their work. To prepare for each liturgy, the lector reads the scripture ahead of time to establish a personal encounter with the word of God. It is from this encounter, through the lector, that the people of God may also encounter the divine Word. - Fighting Fair Tip: Keep it current. One couple has the rule of thumb that any issue older than the milk in the refrigerator is no longer game. Recurring arguments usually mean that there's something behind the present problem that irks the other.
- ◆ Today is the celebration of World Marriage Day. It's a great time to reconnect with your spouse. Take advantage of the short, cold days to spend time together. Talk, dream, or just be in each other's presence. Pray to rekindle your love.
- High school biology is good but not sufficient for the more important medical decisions we make in life. Learning Natural Family Planning as a couple can update and deepen your

- knowledge of how the female body works. Consider taking an NFP class together.
- ◆ "You are the salt of the earth... You are the light of the world," Jesus says to his disciples (Mt 5:13, 14). Married love is salt and light. It brings joy – flavor – to a world that is too often bleak. It shines the light of hope on weary hearts. Rejoice in your marriage today.

- Sometimes spouses have different conversation goals. Be aware of your styles of communication as well as the direction of your conversation whether you want to vent, bring clarity to a problem, or get a new viewpoint on a tough situation.
- "Taking time to rest is not a waste of time." (Susan Vogt) Give yourself a break today or tomorrow – from kids, a chore, worries. It doesn't have to be long to refresh. Take your cue from God, our Creator, who rested on the seventh day.
