

Weekly Reflections:

12th Sunday of Ordinary Time Year A **"Do not be afraid..."**

We have all kinds of fears...some real, some unfounded. While some are fearful of the threat of terrorism today, some are just fearful of the problems that the future might bring. While some are fearful of the dangers that drugs can do to our community, some are just fearful of the calories in their diet. Some are afraid of getting hurt and causing people to be hurt. Some are afraid of being rejected and we are afraid of not being secured. While it is normal to have these fears, it is immaturity to let these fears control our lives. For we know what these fears can do to us even to our being a disciple of Jesus today.



In the Gospel, Jesus commanded His disciples: "What I tell you in the dark, speak in the daylight; what is whispered in your ear, proclaim from the roofs." Jesus knew that the disciples would face being ridicule, persecution and even death as they carry out the mission of proclaiming the gospel. But Jesus urged them as he urges us today, "Do not be afraid of those who kill the body but cannot kill the soul; rather, be afraid of the one who can destroy both soul and body in Gehenna."

Do not be afraid and remain faithful to the Gospel whatever the consequence may be. This is the challenge of Jesus for us today, if we want His Words and His presence to be known and felt in our world today. Let us be proud that we are catholic and therefore not afraid to practice it in public. For you do not know – you might be the first Gospel that some will be able to read.

Inaugural Damien and Marianne Catholic Conference in Honolulu Set for October 20 – 22, 2017

An exciting convergence of education and entertainment awaits Christians of all denominations and ages at the inaugural Damien and Marianne Catholic Conference at the Hawai'i Convention Center from October 20 to 22, 2017.

The conference is fully endorsed and approved by Bishop Clarence (Larry) Silva, who serves as President of the Saint Damien and Saint Marianne Commission. The conference is sponsored in part by the With Grateful Hearts Campaign.

"We want to honor the lives of Hawai'i's two saints in exciting, new ways and help others see the positive impact we can have in our parishes, congregations, and communities across the state," said Makana Aiona, President of the Damien and Marianne Catholic Conference, a nonprofit organization established in 2016.



"Our goal is to educate, inspire, and empower leaders in our community, now and for the next generation," added Aiona, who previously served as Coordinator of Young Adult Ministry for the Diocese of Honolulu, and is now a teacher at Damien School. "We want to create lasting, life -changing experiences so that at the conclusion of the three-day conference, every participant will leave refreshed, renewed, and reenergized for service. We see this becoming an annual event that will attract those from outside Hawai'i and provide educational opportunities for the people of Hawaii who may not be able to travel to similar regional or national conferences on the mainland."

The conference will include informative sessions on leadership development, faith formation, spirituality, youth and young adult programs, and social services, led by local, national, and international speakers. One of the keynote speakers will be Sister Helen Prejean, C.S.J., author of "Dead Man Walking," which is based on her work as a spiritual advisor to two convicted murderers on Death Row at the Louisiana State Penitentiary. The 1993 nonfiction book explored the moral issues related to the death penalty and have implications for today.

Other keynote speakers that have been lined up include: Cardinal Soane PatitaPainiMafi, the first-ever cardinal from Tonga and the youngest member of the College of Cardinals; Dr. Edward Sri, theologian, bestselling author and well-known Catholic speaker who appears regularly on EWTN television; Paul J. Kim, international speaker and musician known for his ability to connect with youth; and Jackie Angel, Catholic musician, singer/songwriter, guitarist, speaker, and youth minister.

In addition, conference attendees will also have an opportunity to meet the Katie Mahoney and Audrey Toguchi, last two surviving individuals who received miracles from both saints.

New phone system was installed and the phone and internet services were all moved into a central location in the front office. We recently experienced a power outage but were able to continue to work thanks to a battery backup that came as part of our systems upgrade. \$18,084.39

Water heating issues: We are experiencing water heating issues especially on the 3rd floor where our priests reside. According to G. Callo and G. Nachor who were asked to look into the problem...the building was built at a time when galvanized pipes were standard. Those now need to be removed and replaced with copper. The maintenance committee will be working to develop a plan of action on how to best address this issue. Currently the plan is to install two tankless water heaters, one on the 3rd level and the other in the dungeon.

Driveway potholes: Earlier this fiscal year we began working with a parent from the RE program who wanted to do something to help the parish. She worked for Glover and was going to utilize their equipment and volunteer labor of her co-workers to repair our driveway. Unfortunately, she became ill and is now unable to help us so we must begin again. In the meantime, Fr. Will and some volunteers have patched the holes.

Church in need of painting: Our Church is in need of painting but we have not had the funds available to even begin looking into how much this project will cost.

Our **Maintenance Supervisor** is out on leave with no definite date of return. Thankfully some members of the parish have stepped forward and have been cutting the grass, weed-eating, etc. Mahalo to everyone who is helping!

"The (three) sacraments of Christian initiation lay the foundations of every Christian life" <u>Catechism of the Catholic</u> <u>Church</u>, no.1212. Indeed, the initiation sacraments can be compared to climbing up Diamond Head Crater. To do the climb, one needs to be prepared when starting out, primarily by being hydrated. Then one needs the strength to climb up the 3/4-mile path. Finally, one reaches the summit and can enjoy the magnificent view in every direction.

This corresponds to the sacraments of initiation. The hydration of Baptism starts a Christian on the path. The gift of the Holy Spirit received in Confirmation gives the strength needed to make the journey. Then finally, earth is joined to heaven at the summit when one receives first Holy Communion.

Notice that what completes our membership into the Body of Christ is not Confirmation. Rather, it is receiving First Communion. The truth is that the first two sacraments (Baptism and Confirmation) are what prepare us for Eucharist. From our own experience we know that Eucharist does not prepare us for Confirmation. It is the other way around.

The sacraments that initiate us into the Christian life are first of all Baptism, then Confirmation, and finally, First Holy Communion.

Please pray for those in our parish who are working to help us transition into the Restored Order of Sacraments.


