The 2017 criteria to be a nominee includes:

Parishioners will have an opportunity to nominate a person whom they feel is deserving of this honor by completing the official nomination form attached below and placing this form in the ballot box located in the church starting Feb 18, 2017 at 5:00 pm mass and ending on March 1, 2017 after 12:15 pm mass.

Fr Will is selecting a committee to review all ballots and submit recommendations to him. Fr. Will's decisions are final. The Island Treasures honorees will be announced on March 19, 2017 at the 11:00 am St. Joseph Feast Day Mass and recognized at the Celebration after mass.

#### **DIOCESE OF HONOLULU 2017 LENTEN REGULATIONS:**

#### FASTING

• In the dioceses in the United States, Catholics aged 18 through 59 are bound to fast on both Ash Wednesday (**March** 1<sup>st</sup>) and Good Friday (**April 14**<sup>th</sup>).

• To *fast* means to consume one full meal a day at most, although taking of other, smaller quantities of food at the other customary mealtimes is permitted. Food and drink between meals (excepting water and medicine) is not permitted on fast days.

#### **ABSTINENCE FROM MEAT**

• Catholics aged 14 and up are to abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday, all Fridays of Lent, and Good Friday.

• To abstain means refraining from eating beef, veal, pork, or poultry at least, although eggs and milk products are acceptable. The consumption of fish and shellfish is permitted, thought the penitential character of the abstinence should be kept in mind.

#### EASTER DUTY

• All the faithful, after they have been initiated into the Most Holy Eucharist, are bound by the obligation of receiving Communion at least once a year. This precept is to be fulfilled during the Easter Season unless it is fulfilled, for a just cause, at some other time during the year. This period is extended to include all the weeks of Lent and the Easter Season up to Trinity Sunday (June 11<sup>th</sup>).

#### LENTEN PRACTICES

• The faithful are encouraged during Lent to attend daily Mass, receive Holy Communion, participate in penance services, and receive sacramental absolution; to take part in public and private exercises of piety, give generously to works of religion and charity, perform acts of kindness toward the sick, aged, and the poor; to practice voluntary selfdenial, especially regarding food, drink, and worldly amusements; and to pray more fervently, particularly for the intentions of the Holy Father.

• Ash Wednesday, the first day of Lent, falls this year on **March 1**<sup>st</sup>. It is a day of Penitential Prayer, Abstinence and Fasting. These ashes come from the burnt palms and branches blessed on Palm Sunday last year. As the priest applies the ashes to a person's forehead, he speaks the words: "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return" or "Repent and believe in the Gospel." Ashes symbolize grief that we have sinned and caused division and our desire for true conversion.

#### Schedule of Masses on Ash Wednesday : 6:00 am ; 12:15 pm and 7:00 pm.

• Funeral Masses may not be celebrated on Holy Thursday, Good Friday, or Holy Saturday, nor on the Sunday of Lent. When pastoral reasons require that a funeral be celebrated on these days, only a Funeral Outside of Mass may be held.

To afford the faithful opportunities to participate in Lenten prayer services, pastors are encouraged to have such prayer services at least twice a week, including the Way of the Cross on Fridays, Exposition and Benediction, Evening Prayer, and evening Masses. A homily or instruction should be included.

#### BLESSING OF THE OILS AND CONSECRATION FO THE CHRISM

• In order to allow participation of Catholics throughout the islands, the Sacred Oils will be blessed during the Chrism Mass to be celebrated in several locations. All are encouraged to join in one of the following celebrations:

# THE SACRED PASCHAL TRIDUUM

• "Since Christ accomplished his work of human redemption and of the perfect glorification of God principally through his Paschal Mystery, in which by dying he has destroyed our death, and by rising restored our life, the sacred Paschal Triduum of the Passion and Resurrection of the Lord shines forth as the high point of the entire liturgical year" (Universal Norms on the Liturgical Year and the Calendar, #18). Three major liturgical principals may be of help here:

- The Triduum may be viewed a single liturgical action that occurs over a period of three days.
- The Triduum is not part of Lent, but in its entirety, celebrates the Easter event.
- The entire focus of the Triduum is on the Triumph of the Cross and the Resurrection.

# MONTHLY HOT MEAL FOR THE HUNGRY-FEBRUARY 16, 2017

Hot Meals are served every third Thursday of every month. Our volunteers come to set up and start cooking in the morning and by 11am the first plates are filled to be brought to the home bound. By 11:30 there is a line of hungry people. These are not just the homeless, they are from all walks of life. If you are hungry, you are welcomed.

The Hot Meals Committee chose the third Thursday of the month after checking with the other soup kitchens. No one served on the third Thursday so this became our day to feed the hungry. I say hungry because as most people would *assume*, they would think of the "hot meals" as only for feeding the homeless. But it's not just the homeless that are fed, it's whomever that is hungry. We have people that run out of things to eat and they are not homeless. We have families that run out of government assistance and they need to feed their family. We may even have a person that is passing by that is looking for something to eat and has no money to go to McDonald's or other fast food places. They are also welcomed!

The Stations of the Cross are a 14step Catholic devotion that commemorates Jesus Christ's last day on Earth as a man.

The 14 devotions, or stations, focus on specific events of His last day, beginning with His condemnation. The stations are commonly used as a mini pilgrimage as the individual moves from station to station. At each station, the individual recalls and meditates on a specific event from Christ's last day. Specific prayers are recited, then the individual moves to the next station until

all 14 are complete.

The Stations of the Cross are commonly found in churches as a series of 14 small
