

Weekly Reflection: 31st Sunday of Ordinary Time Year B
The Greatest Commandment

Listening to our gospel today, probably the first question that arises in our mind is: “How can love be commanded? Does not love come from hearts that are free and have made it their choice to love otherwise if its just forced on somebody then it is not love at all?”

For this reason, Jesus knew that these two great commandments of loving God and loving our another cannot be separated one from the other. They safeguard the freedom of the individual by making it a personal choice to love. One loves his neighbor because he loves God and in the same way one loves God because He loves his neighbor. One knows neither can stand on its own

Why cannot one love God without loving his neighbor? St. John in his letter tells us: How could they say that they love God who they cannot see and at the same time refuse to love their brothers and sisters who they do see? Love of God without love of neighbor is empty if not hypocrisy.

And why cannot one love his neighbor without loving God? Love of God gives us the strength to love others even when it is difficult or not practical. It is easy to love those who love us in return, but how can we love those who hurt us? The love of God gives us the ability to love others without counting the cost or expecting anything in return.

And we can do this, because God has love us first and unconditionally!

It's National Vocations Awareness Week!

As Catholics, we firmly believe that God has a plan for our lives! He calls some to marriage, some to the priesthood, and others to religious life. Some remain as generous single people. Fully living our own vocations—and teaching young people how to discern God’s call—is a serious duty, but a joyful one.

Today begins National Vocations Awareness Week. During this week, please pray about how God is calling you to live your vocation more deeply. Encourage the young people to in your life—children, grandchildren, students, friends, Godchildren — to be open if God Calls them to priesthood or consecrated life.

The main Catholic Vocations: A vocation is a call from God to pursue holiness in a specific way, involving a public and permanent commitment.

Marriage: Most people are called to marriage—a vowed union of a man and a woman who promise to love their spouses and to joyfully welcome children.

Priesthood: Priests bring Jesus to people and people to Jesus through preaching and the sacraments. They are ordained to devote their lives to serve the people of God.

Consecrated Life: Both men and women make vows of poverty, chastity, and obedience when they join orders such as the Franciscans, Benedictines, Dominicans, etc.


Needed: Men of Heroic Virtue

An Irish priest in America once told the story of how he was recruited from his native land. A bishop from Western Europe came to his seminary, which trained men for the missions, and painted a picture of comfortable rectories in a beautiful, peaceful country dotted with grand basilicas. Another bishop, from the American South, promised something different: remote, rural parishes, barely adequate rectories, few Catholics, and an oppressively hot climate. The Irish priest said that he and nearly every other classmate chose the latter.

Real men rise to challenges. And the Church needs brave men to answer the call to the priesthood. Being a priest should never be a vocation of last resort for men who could not marry or “make it” in the world. It is a vocation for strong men who love Jesus, who are striving for virtue and purity, and who are willing to lay down their lives for His Bride, the Church.



Thankfully, despite the very grave failings of too many clergy, the Church in America has some 40,000 priests, the vast majority of whom serve their people faithfully. During Vocation Awareness Week, let’s pray for our faithful priests—and encourage promising young men in our parishes to seriously consider the priesthood.



Prayer Practices of Future Priests


Figuring out one's vocation is rarely easy. The most essential element of discernment is forming a loving relationship with God through *prayer*. Thus it's no surprise that a 2017 CARA survey of recently ordained priests revealed a rich and diverse prayer life before they entered seminary, as the chart below shows.

This prayer life intensifies when men enter the seminary. They attend daily Mass and pray together the Liturgy of the Hours, and many seminaries now have community Holy Hours as well. All seminarians have a spiritual director who "coaches" them in their prayer life and spiritual formation.






Discernment Group on Facebook




YOUNG ADULT MISSION: COMPLETE!
