



SUNDAY, MAY 30, 2021 THE MOST HOLY TRINITY—SOLEMNITY

All of us were born into this world as sons and daughters, and dependent upon our parents or guardians for our existence. No matter how our life stories have unfolded, we are all connected to a biological, “natural” family in some way. But it is an earthly connection only, one that is temporary and finite.

Our celebration of the solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity helps us remember that we are also connected to a family that is eternal and infinite. God himself is a family, a communion of persons: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. God created us in his image, as his children, and we were made to be members of this divine family. Humanity rejected this offer, falling out of right relationship with God through sin and disobedience. As such, we were destined to be kept from the divine inheritance because we were no longer rightful heirs.

Jesus came to reunite us to the Father and repair our relationship. Those who are baptized into Christ become children of God by adoption – by grace we are configured to the reality of Jesus’ Incarnation – thus making us both children and heirs to the promises of God. When we are baptized in the name of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, we are clothed in a white garment as a sign of the dignity with which we have been clothed by the Holy Spirit. We have taken the name “Christian,” much as one who is adopted takes on the name of his or her adopted family. This is a permanent adoption that cannot be changed or diluted. As the *catechism* says, “Baptism seals the Christian with the indelible spiritual mark ... of his belonging to Christ. No sin can erase this mark, even if sin prevents Baptism from bearing the fruits of salvation. Given once for all, Baptism cannot be repeated” (CCC 1272).

No sin can erase this mark, but just as some children are estranged from their earthly parents, some children of God stray away from their heavenly Father. But he is always calling his children back to himself, no matter how far they stray. This is because we were made for eternity with him. We are invited into the fullness of relationship in the Trinity. Because we are children of God, we are also heirs of God – meaning that we inherit not only good gifts from God, but God himself. We are given Jesus Christ as our brother, so that we might share in his union with the Father in the power of the Holy Spirit. We are given the Holy Spirit, so that we might know God as our Father and Jesus as our Lord.

It is an inheritance that we have begun to receive in this life, and we will continue to receive for all eternity. Through our celebration of the Most Holy Trinity, we praise God not only for who he is, but for who we are in him.

The Examen: A Daily Prayer

St. Ignatius Loyola's Examen is an opportunity for peaceful daily reflective prayer. It invites us to find the movement of God in all the people and events of our day. The Examen is simply a set of introspective prompts for you to follow or adapt to your own character and spirit.

Begin with a pause and a slow, deep breath or two; become aware that you are in the presence of the Holy.

The spiritual practice of the daily examen has 16th century origins in Ignatius of Loyola yet offers a framework for prayer that continues to resonate even more than 500 years later. The focus of the daily examen is on finding God's presence in your life so that you can be grateful and so that you can listen for His guidance.



There is no designated way to go through the prayer or even length of time needed to complete it; in fact, just 10 minutes should be enough time. In the approach outlined below, the daily examen is practiced at the end of the day.

1. Prepare your heart and mind. Center yourself by lighting a candle or taking a few deep breaths. Allow yourself to feel the presence of the Holy Spirit.

2. Review the day with gratitude. Think back through the

events of your day, noting the joys and delights. Think about the people you interacted with and what you shared with each other. Don't forget the little pleasures! Then, thank God for these experiences.

3. Pay attention to your emotions. Notice the points in your day where you felt strongly. What is God telling you through your feelings? Feelings of frustration may indicate that you need to change course on a certain project. Feelings of worry about a friend's situation might later prompt you to send a comforting note.

4. Select a part of your day to pray over. What one part of your day stands out most to you? It can be positive or negative. Lift up a prayer of gratitude, intercession, repentance, whatever the case may be.

5. Pray for tomorrow. Ask God to guide you through tomorrow's challenges. Turn your anxieties over to God and pray for hope.

Seat assignments for June will remain the same. REPEAT: Seat assignments for June will remain the same.


Minor adjustments will be made when seats become available.
